Shelton sizes up Steamboat

New public works director evaluating city infrastructure, projects

STEAMBOAT SPRINGS Since starting his new job earlier this month, Steamboat Springs Public Works Director Philo Shelton has been getting a crash course on the city.

"There's plenty to learn," position in Black Hawk before

lured him to Steamboat. "Every town has different aspects you have to learn. ... It's a good variety of work. There's usually never the same issues or problems."
