Rivers to peak this weekend

Flood warning in effect for the Yampa River in Steamboat Springs

The Elk and Yampa rivers are expected to peak this weekend before high-water season floats away, Routt County Emergency Management Director Chuck Vale said.

The Yampa River measured at 5.38 feet at 1:15 p.m. Friday in Steamboat Springs and was churning at 2,780 cubic feet per second, according to the U.S. Geological Survey.

"If it comes up really big, we might have the Howelsen Hill tunnel go underwater like we did a few years ago," said Craig
