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Section I

Introduction to the Healthy Kids Colorado Survey

This report summarizes findings from the 2007-2008 Healthy Kids Colorado Survey (HKCS), which was administered in your school(s) during the 2007-2008 school year.

Background

The Healthy Kids Colorado Survey (HKCS) was developed:

- To facilitate recruitment of a representative sample for the purposes of monitoring statewide trends in school youth
- To meet the data collection and reporting needs of schools and programs receiving funding from multiple federal and state agencies

Specifically, the HCKS collects data that are commonly required by grants and programs offered through the following:

- U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration and Center for Substance Abuse Prevention, including Drug-Free Communities
- U.S. Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention programs
- Colorado Department of Education programs, including Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities
- Programs of the Colorado Departments of Human Services (Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division), Education, Public Health and Environment, Public Safety (Division of Criminal Justice and Office of Juvenile Justice) and Transportation

Survey Measures

The HKCS integrates items from: the Centers for Disease Control's *Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS);* the *Colorado Youth Survey (CYS)*, developed by the Social Development Research Group and coordinated by OMNI Institute; and additional items selected by Colorado state agencies. The HKCS contains a total of 142 items on the high school version and 127 items on the middle school version. As with previous surveys, the HKCS provides information on a wide range of youth attitudes and behaviors regarding substance use, violence and delinquency, mental health, and academic performance. The following are sample measures in the HKCS:

Substance Use

- Lifetime use of cigarettes
- Use of alcohol in the last 30 days
- Use of prescription drugs

Delinquency

- Weapon possession on school property in the last 30 days
- Age at first suspension

Personal Safety/Violence

- Riding in a car with a driver who has been drinking in the last 30 days
- Victim of verbal slurs

School and Family

- Support of teachers and school staff
- Support of parents at home
- Harassment or bullying on school property

Mental Health

- Prevalence of depression on most days over the last 12 months
- Importance of college and future aspirations
- Participation in organized community service activities in the last 30 days

Physical Health

- Average hours of television on school day
- Number of days with 20 minutes of exercise in the last 7 days
- Use of extreme weight loss methods in the past 30 days

Sexual Behavior (This section only appears in the High School survey)

- Prevalence of abstinence and sexual activity
- Use of effective birth control methods

Risk and Protective Factors

Select measures of 'risk and protective factors' based on Hawkins and Catalano's risk and protective factor framework are also included. Risk and protective factors are characteristics demonstrated by research to increase or decrease, respectively, likelihood of substance use, delinquency, and other problem behaviors. Risk and protective factors measured in the HKCS are displayed below. Risk and protective factors are reported using statistically validated 'cut-off points' that identify the percentage of youth in your community who exhibit significant levels of a risk factor, or who exhibit significant levels of a protective factor. Thus, when examining the results for risk and protective factors, keep in mind that higher numbers for risk factors represent elevated risk whereas higher numbers for protective factors represent greater protection. School and community programs that reduce risk factors and enhance protective factors have been shown to positively impact the future health behavior outcomes of youth. The following are the risk and protective factors in the HKCS:

Risk Factors (Domain: Scale)

- Peer-Individual: Peer Use of ATOD
- Peer-Individual: Low Perceived Risk of Drug Use
- Peer-Individual: Attitudes Favorable to Drug Use
- Peer-Individual: Early Initiation of Antisocial Behavior
- Family: Parental Attitudes Favorable To Drug Use
- Family: Parental Attitudes Favorable To Antisocial Behavior
- School: Low Commitment

School Administration and Resources

School: Opportunities for Pro-Social Involvement School: Dependence Pro-Social Involvement

Protective Factors (Domain: Scale)

School: Rewards for Pro-Social Involvement

The survey is administered by participating schools during the regular school year and generally requires 45 minutes for students to complete. In order to promote a smooth administration and good data quality, schools work closely with OMNI Institute to plan their school survey administration. OMNI Institute is the agency that coordinates statewide administration of the HKCS.

To support Colorado's school survey effort, OMNI Institute provides the following services:

- Monitoring common state and federal data reporting requirements of schools and programs
- Assisting school officials in planning school survey administrations
- Supplying school survey materials
- Scanning and analyzing school survey data
- Developing user friendly reports of HKCS data
- Assisting school officials and local coalition representatives in interpreting HKCS data for funders and stakeholders
- Assisting school officials and local coalition representatives in utilizing data for local program and service planning

Report Organization

Your school survey report is organized into several major health behavior topics. In each topic area, a few select survey items have been charted to illustrate overall health behavior and attitudes in the participating sample and differences between grade levels. Then complete survey results related to the health topic have been presented in table format.

Risk and protective factors are reported in a separate section at the end of the report. This organization reflects the idea that risk and protective factors work *collectively* to induce or inhibit problem behaviors in the areas of substance use, delinquency and other problem behaviors. Consider where school youth measured highest in terms of the risk factors measured and lowest in terms of the protective factors measured. These may be important leverage points for improving overall health behaviors in youth.

NOTE: Confidentiality

When fewer than five students report a behavior or attitude, these responses are reported as "Conf." for "confidential" in the data tables and as zero in bar charts. This standard policy protects the confidentiality of students taking the survey, so that no responses can be associated with an individual youth. There are times, however, when student responses are reported as "Conf." or zero at the grade level but are totaled in "All" grades. This will occur when the number across grades totals a number equal to or greater than five, and confidentiality does not need to be protected. Variation may exist between the numbers reported for individual grades and the "All" grades totals, look in the data table and you should find "Conf." reported at one or more grade levels. "Conf." signifies that the numbers were too few to count at the grade level, but could be counted as part of the larger "All" number.

NOTE: Honesty and Data Validity

Sometimes students do not pay adequate attention or do not respond honestly to survey questions. Certain techniques are used to determine when survey responses are inconsistent or dishonest. For example, a student who indicates on one question that he or she has never used tobacco, but on another question reports having smoked 10 cigarettes in the last 30 days, the answer will be considered to be inconsistent for that 'domain' of substance use. Students whose responses were inconsistent within each 'domain' of substance use (e.g., tobacco use, alcohol use) were considered 'missing' and not included in calculations of use for that specific substance. This procedure allowed us to take into account students who inadvertently responded incorrectly to questions, but were not deliberately dishonest throughout the survey. Students whose responses were inconsistent 'dishonest' and were removed entirely from the sample. These multiple steps were undertaken to ensure that the information presented in your report is as accurate a reflection of self-reported youth behavior as possible. (Note: This is not the only source of missing data. Data also may be coded as missing if a student does not provide either their age or grade.)

All surveys strive for a high overall response rate. High response rates help to lower sampling errors. However, even if overall response rates are high, the possibility remains that some students who took the survey may not have responded to every question. The extent of missing data can influence these decisions, the interpretation of the results, and the strength of the confidence in the interpretations. Therefore, for each survey item, specific information on the item specific response rate is provided. For each survey question, information on the item response rate is indicated as either above or below 60%. If the item response rate is above 60%, the student representation on that item can be more confidently interpreted as representative of the overall student respondents. If the item response rate is lower than 60%, the data should not be disregarded, but some

considerations should be addressed in regards to the representativeness of the data. While no single response rate is considered the standard, the most important consideration, overall, is how the sample of students that respond to each question is representative of the entire population.

NOTE: Use of ATOD and Drug Use

Please note that ATOD and drug use are often used interchangeably throughout this report. ATOD refers to the use of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. When "drug use" is used, this may also encompass the use of alcohol and other drugs, as may be the case when we are utilizing a name of a risk factor.

Section II How to Use This Report

How To Use This Report

This report is intended to provide schools and communities with the information and resources needed to (a) develop an understanding of youth attitudes and behaviors in your community; (b) identify any key problem areas among youth in your community; and (c) select appropriate programs and prevention activities for your community.

We recommend examining your data in multiple ways:

(1) <u>Compare the results within your report</u>: As you go through the report, pay attention to the relative percentages of youth reporting various attitudes and behaviors. Although many of these outcomes are not directly comparable and may differ in importance, noting any general patterns across these outcomes can help you identify and focus on what appear to be key problem areas or areas of strength.

With specific regard to the section on risk and protective factors, take note of the risk factors that are most elevated and/or the protective factors that are most depressed. Many prevention programs work to decrease substance use, delinquency, and other problem behaviors specifically by reducing certain risk factors or enhancing certain protective factors. However, programs may also be selected to capitalize on existing community strengths by targeting risk and/or protective factors that are currently at more desirable levels.

(2) <u>Compare your results with state data</u>: In 2005-2006, we obtained a state-wide representative high school sample, enabling us to provide an accurate picture of youth in Colorado. These state-level data may provide another valuable comparison point for your community's data and enable better understanding of the relative needs, strengths, and challenges for youth in your community. Efforts are currently underway to obtain a 2007-2008 state-wide representative sample.

(3) <u>Compare your results to previous years' data from your community</u>: As noted previously, the HKCS has a number of measures in common with previous school surveys administered across Colorado. If your community participated in the CYS, Integrated Survey, and/or YRBS in previous years, certain measures may be comparable across these surveys, enabling you to determine changes over time such as rates of youth substance use and delinquency in your community. Such data can also be used to: (a) evaluate effectiveness of previous prevention programming and identify areas of improvement; and (b) identify emerging problem areas. (4) Use this report to guide selection of appropriate prevention programs and initiatives for reducing problem areas in your community. The prevention resources listed in Appendix A provide a useful starting point.

(5) Look at the response rate and participation within your sample to get a better idea of who your data is representing. When looking at district or community reports with multiple schools it is important to determine how many schools in that district or community are represented. (Please see the note on Honesty and Data Validity in section I for more information on response rates.)

This table illustrates two important concepts:

1) The Demographic composition of the students from your school(s) who took the survey.

Example: If the number (N) of female respondents is 200 and there are 400 respondents in the total sample, then 50% of the total sample is female.

2) How each Demographic group that took the survey compares to the number of students in that group that are enrolled in your school(s).

Example: If the number (N) of female respondents is 200 and there are 800 females enrolled in the school, then 25% of enrolled females took the survey.


This second concept can be used to judge the quality of your data (e.g., how well it represents the school population). For example, if your school attempted to conduct a full census, you would want N/Enrollment for each demographic group to be close to 100% in order to accurately reflect that demographic group. Further, for your data to be representative of the school(s) as a whole, N/Enrollment percentages should all be approximately equal, regardless of sampling strategy (census or random sample); otherwise certain demographic groups are over- or under-represented in the sample.

Note: This page reflects all the students from your school(s) who took the survey, including those in grades not intended to be surveyed. The remainder of the report only shows intended grades, but the "Total" category always reflects all students who took the survey, regardless of grade.






Grade: All

The "Ever Used (Lifetime)" section of the chart shows the percentage of students who reported using the substance at least once in their lives. The "30-day Use" section shows the percentage of students who reported using the substance at least once in the past 30 days. The "Heavy Use" section measures binge drinking, which is defined as five or more alcoholic drinks in a row on one occasion, two or more times in the past 30 days, and heavy cigarette use, which is defined as a pack or more of cigarettes per day in the past 30 days.

The absence of a bar for a particular grade indicates the data for that grade are confidential, there are no cases in that response category or no respondents in that grade (see data table for details).






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




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








Number of Lifetime Sexual Partners - All Grades







APPENDIX A FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who took the HKC Survey?

The HKC Survey was administered to middle and high school students throughout Colorado who chose to participate. The survey was offered to students in English and in Spanish.

How was the survey administered?

In most cases, the survey was administered by classroom teachers during regular class periods on a specified day during the 2006-2007 school year. A contact person from each school worked with the survey coordinators at OMNI to ensure that the survey reached as many eligible students as possible.

Did the students have to participate?

No. Participation in the HKC Survey is always voluntary. Parents were notified of the survey ahead of time, and they were given the opportunity to refuse their student's participation by sending back a refusal form. Students were also informed of their right to refuse. Teachers were provided with materials to ensure that students' participation in the survey was voluntary and that all responses were anonymous and confidential. In addition, students were reminded that they could skip any question(s) they did not wish to answer, and that they could stop at any time.

Are these data representative of our student population?

The more students who participate from a certain grade, school, or district, the more representative the data will be of the population in that grade, school, or district. When the response rate is 70% or greater, one can be very confident that the data reflect the experiences of the population being assessed. As response rates decline, one can be less confident that they accurately represent the experiences of the student population.

How do we know the students were honest?

Research on student self-report of substance use and antisocial behavior indicates that students tend to be honest about their behavior and experience on anonymous surveys such as the HKC Survey. Furthermore, strategies were built into the analysis of this survey to screen for dishonest or inconsistent responses. If a student's data did not meet the criteria for honesty or consistency, it was not included in the analyses.

How were the survey questions selected?

The survey questions have been derived from extensive research over the past 20 years in the field of prevention science and related fields. They have been tested on large diverse samples of youth to ensure that they accurately and consistently measure each behavior or factor.



APPENDIX D RISK AND PROTECTIVE FACTOR SCALE DESCRIPTIONS

School Domain Protective Factors	
Rewards for Pro-Social Involvement	When young people are recognized and rewarded for their contributions at school, they are less likely to be involved in substance use and other negative outcomes.
Risk Factors	
Low Commitment	Surveys of high school seniors have shown that the use of hallucinogens, cocaine, heroin, stimulants, and sedatives or non-medically prescribed tranquilizers is significantly lower among students who expect to attend college than among those who do not. Factors such as liking school, spending time on homework, and perceiving the coursework as relevant are also negatively related to drug use.
Family Domain	
Risk Factors	
Parental Attitudes Favorable to Drug Use and Antisocial Behavior	In families where parents use illegal drugs, are heavy users of alcohol, or are tolerant of children's use, children are more likely to become drug abusers during adolescence. The risk is further increased if parents involve children in their own drug (or alcohol) using behavior, for example, asking the child to light the parent's cigarette or get a beer from the refrigerator.

Peer-Individual	
Risk Factors	
Peer Use of ATOD	Young people who associate with peers who engage in alcohol, tobacco or other drugs are much more likely to engage in the same behavior. Peer drug use has consistently been found to be among the strongest predictors of substance use among youth. Even when young people come from well-managed families and do not experience other risk factors, spending time with friends who use drugs greatly increased the risk of that problem developing.
Low Perceived Risk of Drug Use	Young people who do not perceive drug use to be risky are far more likely to engage in drug use.
Attitudes Favorable to Drug Use	Initiation of use of any substance is preceded by values favorable to its use. During elementary school years, most children express anti-drug, anti-crime, and pro-social attitudes and have difficulty imagining why people use drugs; their attitudes often shift toward greater acceptance of these behaviors. Youth who express positive attitudes toward drug use are at higher risk for subsequent drug use.
Early Initiation of Antisocial Behavior	Research shows that the early incidence of anti-social behavior also predicts greater involvement in substance use and abuse.
