6	Detective Jerry: June 12, 2008, and the time's about 11:28 a.m. and present in the room
7	is, uh, Terri Dawn Fatka, Moody Fatka, is that the whole name?
8	Terri: Mm hmm
9	Detective Jerry: F-A-T-K-A, correct?
10	Terri: Mm hmm
11	Detective Jerry: Alright, what's your date of birth?
12	Terri: 10/27/62
13	Detective Jerry: Now are, we're, we're trying to record with this camera, but it seems like
14	our volume isn't as loud. So, I'm gonna ask you to try to talk as loud as you can.
15	Terri: Okay
16	Detective Jerry: Alright,
17	Terri: Okay
18	Detective Jerry: Umm, and we're trying, we're using a digital recorder too; so, we have
19	different methods. And, this is a new system; so, we're gonna try to make it all work. Uh, also
20	present in the room is Erick Knaus which is, umm, Terri's, uh, legal counsel, attorney, and,
21	umm, so at this point there's really no need for Miranda; you're certainly aware that, umm, the
22	information you're providing us is of, umm, uh, criminal nature. And, uh, would implicate you
23	in a criminal act; you understand that?
24	Terri: Yes
25	Mr. Knaus: Right, and you, Terri's going to wave her right against self-incrimination, the
26	Fifth Amendment, and she's going to tell a story today to you folks. Umm, before we start, I
27	wanted to just kind of talk about where I wanted umm Terri to head with this be, for specific
28	legal reasons. Umm, Terri's, wants to talk to you folks; obviously that's not something I would
29	generally encourage my clients to do. Umm, she insists on doing this to clear her conscience, to
30	fess up to her actions, umm, in regards to the allegations against her, but more over, to, umm, set
31	things right with the community and with the victims both direct and indirect victims. There's a

32	C-K. It's E-R-I-C-K. And, umm, there may be a question here about where all the money went,
33	umm, for both Pam and Terri, I think, umm, I could tell you there's not a lot of information
34	about that. As I see it, there's gonna be two (2) steps in the legal process here; Terri has told me
35	that she's going to plead guilty to the charges. Umm, there is no plea offer from the District
36	Attorney's Office; umm, I have, of course, sought to get that from Kerry St. James, but, uh, it has
37	been refused. I've offered to, uh, to use, try to utilize Terri's assistance with the State, and he
38	has denied that as well. He has informed me he does not need that to prosecute the cases; so,
39	there is no agreement at all at this stage for Terri to provide any information. And, simply, Terri
40	wanted to bear her soul. And, uh, in terms of the restitution, and what, where the money went,
41	etc., that's going to be for the second part of the legal process, the Restitution Phase, because we
42	still haven't figured all of that out, yet. So, there's going to be a lot of, umm, questions that if
43	you ask those questions that are unanswerable at this point, we just haven't done the research to
44	find out exactly where all the money went because this is a two (2) stage process for us. With
45	that, umm, I think Terri wants to start out with just kind of giving you guys an overview.
46	Detective Jerry: Okay, great, and, and that's what we'll start with, but let me just, and,
47	and, so certainly everything Erick said you understand that there's been no promises for
48	leniency?
49	Terri: Right
50	Detective Jerry: Umm, if you tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the
51	truthyou understand that?
52	Terri: Right
53	Detective Jerry: No promises have been made to you by the D.A. or the police?
54	Terri: Correct.
55	Detective Jerry: Okay. Alright, Terri why don't I ask you just to start off with, umm,
56	explain to us how this plan to take money out of people's accounts came together.
57	Terri: Okay
58	Mr. Knaus: Go ahead and start off where you're comfortable starting off; umm, Bob can
59	ask specific questions
60	Terri: At prior to that, what lead up to the taking of the money out of people's accounts.
61	Detective Jerry: Yes

62 Terri: Umm, I just would like to say that I'm here today to, umm, (begins crying) I need a tissue already, to, umm, sorry. 63 64 Mr. Knaus: It's okay. 65 (pause - 4:45 - 5:15)66 Terri: Thank you 67 (door closing) 68 Detective Jerry: Go ahead, continue. 69 Terri: Sorry, it's just scary bein' here today. Umm, but I feel in my heart that I need to be 70 here, and I know I'm gonna say I'm guilty when I go to court on the twenty-third (23rd). Umm, 71 but I just, there's, there's things that I want you guys to know as well, and I just feel like if I'm 72 gonna, umm, come out of this and move forward and, umm, pay my dues, and try to be in the 73 public for the next four (4) years, then, umm, I really, my first (1st) thing that I need to do is be 74 honest with everything. (door closing) And, and, that's what I feel in my heart; I just need to 75 come clean with everything, not hide anything. I'm tired of looking over my shoulder, and I've 76 done that for years. And, I'm ready to be a good person again, and that's why I'm here. 77 Detective Jerry: Some of the things we discussed 78 Terri: Uh huh 79 Detective Jerry: ...previously when we were talking to you... 80 Terri: Right 81 Detective Jerry: ...when we were talking to you. Okay, continue, just kind of lead us up to how this all come about 82 83 Mr. Knaus: Why don't you tell the detectives, umm, I've prepared some things, if that's 84 alright? 85 Detective Jerry: Sure 86 Mr. Knaus: And, because I've, I've heard this story, you know, I'm, umm, this is by no 87 means rehearsed, but I've prepared some things out of, uh, Terri's purview in preparation for this meeting. Umm, because I wanted what she says to you to flow naturally; this is her story. And, 88 89 and she wants to tell it. So, I'm gonna let her do that, but I do have some organization here if that's alright with you Terri. Why don't you tell the detectives, umm, first, how you feel about 90 91 your role... 92 Terri: Okay, umm, ...

93	Mr. Knaus:in this Alpine Bank incident.
94	Terri: I'm here to tell My story, that, what I've done, but it also involves someone else.
95	And, I'm not here to be telling everything on here, but for me to tell you my part, you know, it
96	involves another person; so,
97	Detective Jerry: Who's that?
98	Terri: That is Pam Williams.
99	Detective Jerry: Okay, that didn't take long. And, and, we've used the word story; this is
100	a factual, this is not a story, this is what happened?
101	Terri: Correct
102	Detective Jerry:as you saw it, correct?
103	Terri: Mm hmm
104	Detective Jerry: Okay, I just wanted to
105	Mr. Knaus: Clarify. Good.
106	Detective Jerry: Yep. Okay, this, this is not a story; this is what happened
107	Detective Bob: It's a true story.
108	Detective Jerry:in regards to the Alpine incident, correct?
109	Terri: Mm hmm.
110	Mr. Knaus: Why don't you start with telling the detectives briefly, umm, how you and
111	Pam met?
112	Terri: Umm, I moved here in eighty-four ('84) and was in high school. I was a junior;
113	Pam was a senior. And, we became good friends way back then.
114	Detective Jerry: Okay
115	Terri: Umm, we did everything together. Umm
116	Mr. Knaus: Anything unusual about your relationship that's relevant to what happened
117	later on, leading up to Alpine Bank?
118	Terri: Umm, she is just, she's always been the strong one (1) of the relationship, and I'm
119	a good follower. And, it just, my family was mad at me because I would always use my car, you
120	know, for her to go to Denver. Just, just stuff like that, that, umm, just easily influenced by her, I
121	mean, she was my best friend.
122	Detective Jerry: She was a senior when you were a junior when you moved here.
123	Terri: Right.

124	Detective Jerry: Okay
125	Mr. Knaus: And, you pretty much remained friends up until Alpine Bank.
126	Terri: Umm, up until ninety-seven ('97) is when we had our falling-out because I started
127	dating my husband Paul Fatka at that time, and umm, so, I wasn't doing things with her twenty-
128	four, seven (24/7). And, you know, I was actually doing things with Paul, and she was mad
129	about that because we weren't together twenty-four, seven (24/7), and, umm, so we had a, we
130	had a falling out in ninety-seven ('97), and we didn't talk for about a year. 'Cause I told her I
131	was tired of her leading me around by my nose. And, then, umm, probably about a year later is
132	when we ran into each other, and we just kind of started talking up, and talking again, and
133	Detective Jerry: Ninety-eight ('98) then?
134	Terri: Mm hmm, and we got our friendship back and started hangin' out again and
135	Mr. Knaus: Did that type of relationship continue at that point?
136	Terri: Mm hmm, it did, and
137	Mr. Knaus: What I mean specifically that sort of, umm, control
138	Terri: Mm hmm
139	Mr. Knaus:relationship that Pam had over you.
140	Terri: Mm hmm, definitely.
141	Mr. Knaus: And, uh, tell the detectives when you started working at Alpine Bank, and
142	how that came about.
143	Terri: I was working at Wal-Mart, and Pam asked if, 'cause she would get an incentive of
144	five hundred dollars (\$500.00) if she could get, umm, someone hired on. That was the incentive,
145	if you knew somebody, and so Pam called me and said, "So, why don't you come fill-out an
146	application." And, I did. And, umm, that's when I started working in '04 at Alpine Bank.
147	Detective Jerry: Got recruited by
148	Terri: by Pam, mm hmm.
149	Mr. Knaus: And, so let's go ahead and move into the meat of what you have to tell the
150	detectives and the world today. Why don't you start by telling, umm, how taking money first
151	started at Alpine Bank.
152	Terri: It started that fall, umm,
153	Mr. Knaus: What year was that please?

Terri: Hmm, I believe in '04. Pam and I were counting the Fed shipment in the back 154 155 area, which is behind the teller line, and umm, we were both silent. And, I just said, "I need to 156 start going to church." And, she laughed and said I'm thinking the same thing, and so one (1) 157 thing lead to another, and we kept talking about it. And, we decided how we could not put all 158 the money back in the vault. 159 Detective Jerry: Okay, were you discussing taking money and during that conversation, 160 where's the church tie into this? I'm a little confused here. 161 Terri: Because I was having bad thoughts of that I could really use that money, and what 162 came out was I really need to go to church. 163 Detective Jerry: Okay 164 Mr. Knaus: And, she said, "I know what you mean."? 165 Terri: She, yeah, she said, "I'm thinking the same thing." 166 Mr. Knaus: And, what did you take that to mean? 167 Terri: That she could use the money as well. 168 Mr. Knaus: So, then you said, "One thing lead to another." 169 Terri: Yeah, we started talking about how, and I was like there's no way 'cause there's 170 cameras all over us. There's just no way that it'd be really cool to have a big stack of money that 171 we were counting, and when we went to take the money into the vault, Pam told me that there 172 were no cameras in the safety deposit box room. That's what Detective Jerrys had told her. 173 And, she told me to put it down the front of my pants, and then we'd walk the rest of the money into the vault 'cause there was another door that she had to open get into the vault, and then we 174 175 put the, the rest in there, but I had ten thousand (\$10,000.00) in my pants at that time. 176 Detective Jerry: Okay. 177 Terri: In a bundle, mm hmm. And, then, we kept thinking we should have taken more, 178 that was just way too easy; so, we went back in and got six thousand (\$6,000.00) more. So, it 179 was a total of... 180 Detective Jerry: Same day? 181 Terri: ...sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00). I believe it was the same day. 182 Detective Bob: Now, when you say, "We went back in," who's we? 183 Terri: Pam and I. 184

Detective Bob: And, who actually took the six thousand dollars (\$6,000,00)?

185	Terri: (sigh) I believe it was money that we were bring back into the vault that the girls
186	were selling from their drawer.
187	Detective Bob: Okay, somebody, you said you took the first ten thousand dollar
188	(\$10,000.00) bundle and put it in your pants.
189	Terri: Correct.
190	Detective Bob: When you say, "Put it in your pants," your pants pocket or down the front
191	of your pants?
192	Terri: Down the front of my pants
193	Detective Bob: Okay, so it was concealed?
194	Terri: Yeah
195	Detective Bob: And, did I understand you say that Pam said, "There is no camera in the
196	vault?"
197	Terri: Correct, and in the safety deposit room
198	Detective Bob: In the safety deposit room?
199	Terri: Right.
200	Detective Bob: So, you guys went into the safety deposit room, took the ten thousand
201	dollars (\$10,000.00), put it down your pants?
202	Terri: Correct
203	Detective Bob: And how much time elapsed before you went back to get the other six
204	thousand (\$6,000.00), approximately?
205	Terri: I think, if I remember right, it was a long time ago, but I think it was only like just
206	a few hours.
207	Detective Bob: Okay, so a period of time elapsed, and then you just said, "you and Pam
208	talked, 'This was too easy, we should get more.'"
209	Terri: Mm hmm
210	Detective Bob: So, who went back into the room?
211	Terri: Pam and I because it was always dual control.
212	Detective Bob: Okay, and so it always takes two (2), to, to go back into
213	Terri: Correct.
214	Detective Bob: Is that the room where the money is kept and stored?
215	Terri: In the vault it is, yes.

216 Detective Bob: Right, so, explain to me the design of the, umm, the room. 217 Terri: Hmm, umm, it's just, I couldn't tell you the dimensions of the room, it's very small, there's just a top drawer that you pull out and it's got all the money on top, and there's a 218 219 camera above. 220 Detective Bob: Okay, so, and, and what room did you go into where they, where it 221 couldn't see you taking the money? 222 Terri: That would be the safety deposit box room before you go into the vault. 223 Detective Jerry: Okay, so you pass through that, you have to pass through that 224 Detective Bob: So, you go from the main part of the bank into the, uh, safety deposit box 225 room, then into the vault. 226 Terri: Correct. 227 Detective Bob: Prior to going into the vault on the first event you took a ten thousand 228 dollar (\$10,000.00) bundle, is that called a bundle? 229 Terri: Mm hmm 230 Detective Bob: Two (2), three (3) hours later, you and Pam go back into the, umm, the 231 vault, or, umm, was it the safety deposit room, to take the money? 232 Terri: I believe we were going back, taking more money from the, umm, (snapping 233 fingers), tellers for selling money into the vault. 234 Detective Bob: Okay 235 Terri: And, umm, two (2) people always have to be together; so, she was counting the 236 money, and I was watching her verify it. We were taking it back in; so, we have to go through 237 the safety deposit box room, and that's when I believe I stuck six thousand (\$6,000.00) more in 238 my pants. And, then we went into the vault and put the rest of the money in. So, and then we 239 split eight thousand (\$8,000.00) for each other. 240 Detective Bob: So, you had a total of sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00) that you took on one 241 (1) day? 242 Terri: Mm hmm 243 Detective Bob: And, and this was money that came from teller drawers? 244 Terri: Mm hmm 245 Detective Bob: What happens when they're, when the money comes up short? Where 246 does the accountability come back to?

247	Terri: Well, Adonna Ariano was the boss at that time, and she was gone on vacation.
248	And, Pam thought we could count the drawer for everyday like the sixteen (16) was still in there,
249	and when Adonna, or Donna, came back that umm, it'd be off, and then they would have to
250	worry abbut it and find
251	Detective Jerry: Was there not, somebody looked into that incident, correct?
252	Terri: Yeah
253	Detective Bob: And, did anything get determined? Was there blame placed anywhere?
254	Terri: No
255	Detective Bob: They just ate, wrote off sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00)?
256	Terri: Correct.
257	Detective Bob: Okay, alright, continue please. Just, and then you said, you're the one (1)
258	who tok the six thousand (\$6,000.00)? So, you took both bundles, ten thousand (\$10,000.00), six
259	thousand (\$6,000.00)
260	Terri: Mm hmm
261	Detective Bob:put them down the front of your pants, and later you and Pam split it.
262	And, where did you split it up at?
263	Terri: It was the closet where we had our purses.
264	Mr. Knaus: Okay, before we go any further, can I take a step back to clarify a few things?
265	Terri: Sure
266	Mr. Knaus: When you and I talked previously, it didn't sound like you were real sure
267	about, uh, the time frame between the first event of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) and the
268	second event of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00)
269	Terri: Right
270	Mr. Knaus: How sure are you about that two (2), three (3) hour time frame? Was it
271	even the same day?
272	Terri: I don't, I don't remember for sure. I'm thinking it was the same day; I couldn't be
273	a hundred percent (100%) sure.
274	Mr. Knaus: So, it could've been the next day?
275	Terri: Yeah, 'cause we were still counting the vault like it had the full month in it; so
276	Mr. Knaus: How did you decide on sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00)?
277	Terri: Mm, I don't know exactly.

278	Mr. Knaus: And, you mentioned Adonna was gone; she would be the one that would
279	
280	Terri: Yes
281	Mr. Knaus: And, do you recall where she was?
282	Terri: I think, no, she was just on vacation. I don't know if she was in Mexico or where
283	she was at that time.
284	Mr. Knaus: Okay, but for about how long was she gone?
285	Terri: A week, I think.
286	Mr. Knaus: And, the money has to, had to be counted everyday, correct?
287	Terri: Correct.
288	Mr. Knaus: Alright, did you count the money with Pam everyday?
289	Terri: No, umm, Pam actually took over Adonna's job while she was gone, and then, we
290	decided that it, it wouldn't look good if just her and I counted the vault; so, she actually had, I
291	believe, count on a day or two (2) with her. But, she, umm, she's a very numbers person;
292	she can
293	Mr. Knaus: Who?
294	Terri: Pam. She can say how much for the person to write down.
295	Detective Bob: So, what your saying is that, that even though was with her, does
296	not verify the correct amount?
297	Terri: No, they're just usually writing it down while the person counts out the money.
298	Detective Bob: So, Pam was the counter and was the writer? So, if Pam said that
299	that sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00) was there, assumed it and wrote it down. Now, is that
300	the correct way to do it, or normally, does you count it and then I count it, and then, we write it
301	down. Is that the correct way?
302	Terri: You usually have the counter and then, the person that is writing, you're supposed
303	to be watching for a second set of eyes.
304	Detective Bob: But not necessarily counting it yourself?
305	Terri: Right.
306	Detective Bob: So, it wouldn't be very hard if Pam was really quick with her counting for
307	to believe that there were, that sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) was there.
308	Terri: Correct.

309	Detective Bob: Alright
310	Detective Jerry: What's last name, do you know?
311	Terri: Uh,
312	Detective Bob:
313	Terri: I believe.
314	Detective Jerry: And, is there any reason to believe that could have stolen any
315	money from the bank?
316	Terri: No, huh uh.
317	Detective Jerry: Okay, go ahead Erick
318	Mr. Knaus: And, some of the days, you would count with Pam while Adonna was gone.
319	Terri: Yes
320	Mr. Knaus: And, you used the same sort of process?
321	Terri: Mm hmm, just added the sixteen (16) on there.
322	Detective Bob: Okay, alright, so that's, that happens fall two thousand four (2004).
323	What's, what happens subsequent to that.
324	Mr. Knaus: But before we move, Bob, if you don't mind, umm, he, Bob asked you a
325	question about how you split it up.
326	Terri: Mm hmm
327	Mr. Knaus: Let's talk a little bit more about that because we had that conversation before
328	too. Umm, there was a total of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00).
329	Terri: Right
330	Mr. Knaus: And each of you got eight thousand dollars (\$8.000.00), you said.
331	Terri: Mm hmm
332	Mr. Knaus: And, do you recall how it was that you divvied that up?
333	Terri: Umm, I don't know for sure because we did a lot of them, you know, split it up in
334	our purses. We could've went out to the parking lot; I don't know how the first time was
335	exactly. But later on, it was usually just half in each others purse, but, umm, and I can't
336	remember exactly how we spent the first eight thousand (\$8,000.00) either.
337	Mr. Knaus: Umm, was there a car purchased with Pam's eight thousand dollars
338	(\$8,000.00)?

339	Terri: I do remember Pam putting a couple thousand on, she bought a car from
340	for her daughter; it was a red Pontiac, maybe, that she bought for
341	
342	And, I wanted to help Pam get her name cleared
343	again, and she owed nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) on this truck. So, I told her I would help
344	her pay, I would help her pay half. And, so I gave her forty (40), forty-five hundred dollars
345	(\$4500.00) to pay off that truck, to get her name cleared.
346	Mr. Knaus: Any recollection of what you did with your remaining three thousand five
347	hundred (\$3,500.00)?
348	Terri: No, probably just little things like groceries and bills. I don't remember anything
349	distinctive.
350	Detective Bob: So the, so the, the purchase of scar by Pam was with that first
351	sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00), her eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) came from, that money for
352	the car, came from that particular, umm, event?
353	Terri: Mm hmm
354	Detective Bob: Okay, you recall that?
355	Terri: Yes, yeah.
356	Mr. Knaus: After the sixteen thousand dollar (\$16,000.00) event we'll call it or incident,
357	umm, did you guys take anymore money from Alpine Bank directly?
358	Terri: I believe it was in February of '05 is when we started taking money from people's
359	accounts.
360	Mr. Knaus: Okay, why did you decide and Pam decide not take any more money in the
361	same fashion that you did that sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00)?
362	Terri: Uh, just 'cause the Fed people came up and questioned us, and that was way too
363	scary.
364	Mr. Knaus: And, before February, did you and Pam conspire or formulate a plan on how
365	to get money from individual accounts?
366	Terri: Yes, and it was, it was when, uh, we were talking to at the drive-up,
367	she usually came through drive-up, and, umm, she just always seemed out of sorts and never
368	knew how much money she had. And, Pam said, "You know, if I, if I sign an Advice of Charge,
369	you could do it on your computer and then it'd be like we gave it back to her at the window "

370	Detective Jerry: So, when that started, just to go back, just for a sec, when that first
371	incident happened
372	Terri: Mm hmm
373	Detective Jerry:was Pam at her position that she was at she, uh
374	Terri: Supervisor then? No, but she was, uh, one of the top-ranked tellers. So
375	Detective Jerry: Who was the supervisor at the time?
376	Terri: Uh, that would be Donna.
377	Detective Jerry: Okay, so, in Donna's absence, the next in line to run the teller line would
378	be Pam, and Pam eventually
379	Terri: Went on to be a supervisor.
380	Detective Jerry:was promoted to Donna's position, correct?
381	Terri: Yeah, and then, that's when, after the vault happening, they changed the rules so
382	that an Detective Jerry and a teller, we have different fobs A and B that they'd have to go in
383	through the vault together. Not a B and B or not an A and A.
384	Detective Jerry: And that was a result of the sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00) that you two
385	(2) stole?
386	Terri: Right
387	Detective Jerry: Okay
388	Mr. Knaus: And, I'm a little confused about, we keep saying the name Adonna, and it
389	sounds like you keep saying Donna
390	Terri: Yeah
391	Mr. Knaus:Could you clarify that for us?
392	Terri: Yeah, Adonna was Vice President then, Adonna Allen. And, then, Donna Ariano
393	was our supervisor that was on vacation.
394	Mr. Knaus: Okay, Ariano. So you started to talk about, umm, with the
395	detectives, go ahead with
396	Terri: That's where it started, is with account.
397	Mr. Knaus: Was, was, was there, was there any information, I'm sorry Jerry, was there
398	any information about surveillance cameras that was relevant to your and Pam's deciding on
399	whether to take or not take money from individual accounts?


400	Terri: Umm, Pam actually talked to
401	and, umm, she found out there was a, a one (1) minute lapse in the cameras, and that where
402	Pam's station was that the left top corner is, you can't see it on the video cameras.
403	Detective Jerry:
404	Terri:
405	Detective Jerry:
406	Terri: And, she told me about that. So, I went, whenever I took money out of my drawer,
407	that's, I'd always go place it at that corner of her drawer, of her station.
408	Detective Jerry: And, you said top corner?
409	Terri: Mm hmm
410	Mr. Knaus: Do you want to draw a little sketch for the detectives?
411	Terri: Sure (pause - retrieving paper and pen, drawing 28:38 - 28:58) So, this is mine
412	down here
413	Detective Bob: And, these are teller windows? So, these represent teller windows?
414	Terri: Yeah. So, this is Pam's, and this is where I would always set it because the
415	cameras never showed that top corner.
416	Detective Bob: So, if we just call this position one (10, two (2), three (3), four (4), one (1)
417	being Terri's
418	Terri: Right
419	Detective Bob: Okay, and four (4) being Pam's window
420	Terri: Mm hmm
421	Detective Bob: And, where you're marking a little corner cannot be seen by the camera?
422	Terri: Correct
423	Mr. Knaus: Where in proximity to the counters is the camera or cameras?
424	Terri: They're, uh, umm, all here behind us,
425	Detective Jerry: Customers are out over here, right?
426	Terri:and then one's over here. Right, I think there's four (4) back here.
427	Detective Bob: Okay, so, this, this location here can't be seen.
428	Terri: Correct.
429	Detective Bob: Okay. Alright.

430	Terri: So, then she would always take the envelope of money and put it in her top left
431	drawer.
432	Detective Bob: Okay, and, and, let me ask you what monies were you putting here?
433	Terri: Monies, umm, from people's accounts then
434	Mr. Knaus: Okay, which is where you were gonna start talking about next.
435	Detective Bob: Okay, now going back to that first person that came through the drive-up,
436	tell me her name again.
437	Terri:
438	Detective Bob:
439	Terri: Mm hmm
440	Mr. Knaus: Can I get you to say, "Yes" outloud?
441	Terri: Yes, sorry
442	Mr. Knaus: Instead of
443	Detective Bob: So, she doesn't really keep track of her account. So, when
444	did you, did you, so, was the first, umm, actual Advice of Charge that was unauthorized on
445	account?
446	Terri: Yes
447	Detective Bob: Okay, and that was in February of '05?
448	Terri: Mm hmm, yes.
449	Detective Bob: Alright, and who, who, umm, wrote up the Advice of Charge, you or
450	Pam?
451	Terri: I don't remember for sure; I believe, I know she signed the signature, forged the
452	name, and then, I might have filled out the rest of the Advice of Charge, and then
453	Detective Bob: Now, when you say, "She wrote the signature, forged the name,"
454	you're referring to?
455	Terri: Pam
456	Detective Bob: Pam Williams?
457	Terri: Mm hmm, yes.
458	Detective Bob: Okay. So, this was the very first of any, and, and if I, for clarification,
459	who initiated the conversation about not keeping track of her accounts?
460	Terri: Pam

461	Detective Bob: Pam did?
462	Terri: Yes
463	Detective Bob: And, and, and by making the statement she's saying this would be an
464	opportunity for us to take money that was not authorized to be taken?
465	Terri: Yes
466	Detective Jerry: Was there any discussion prior to that contact with
467	taking from customers?
468	Terri: I don't know; I remember it just being that fast.
469	Detective Jerry: in the drive-up; she's out of sorts.
470	Terri: Well, she actually left, and Pam said, "If I sign it, do it on your computer like she
471	was still here."
472	Detective Jerry: Okay, and go ahead and explain for me how that would take place. The
473	Advice of Charge, the forgery, right, that you mentioned?
474	Terri: Yeah
475	Detective Jerry: Pam forged the name. Go from there, the process.
476	Terri: Of how we took the money?
477	Detective Jerry: Mm hmm
478	Terri: Umm, so, I would go to my station, process the advice of charge, put the money in
479	the envelope, and then, walk it to this corner.
480	Detective Jerry: Out of your drawer?
481	Terri: Yes
482	Detective Jerry: Okay, and you reconcile the drawer with the?
483	Terri: Advice of Charge.
484	Detective Jerry: Okay, so it would go on the corner, where it's out of the cameras?
485	Terri: Right
486	Detective Jerry: Can you explain to us, go ahead.
487	Mr. Knaus: Did you put the money in, in anything?
488	Terri: Umm, Pam would usually put it in her left drawer, and then, she had other papers
489	in there. So, she'd kinda compile it all together and go to the, the closet with, which that's where
490	our purses were.
491	Detective Jerry: And, it would go into a purse?

492	Terri: She'd usually split it up and put half in mine and half in hers.
493	Detective Jerry: Without you even bein' there?
494	Terri: Correct
495	Detective Jerry: You would, at the end of the day,
496	Terri: Know it would be there.
497	Detective Jerry: Okay
498	Terri: And, then, vis versa, if she did an Advice of Charge on her computer, I would
499	usually endorse it; I would usually forge the signature. So, we'd toggle back and forth like that.
500	So, then, when she would usually take the money, she could come and put it underneath, we had
501	planners, Alpine Bank planners, she could put it under there, and then, later on, I would
502	Detective Jerry: She could or she did?
503	Terri: She did, and then, I could take it to the locker room.
504	Detective Jerry: So, you, you did the locker room? Split it, put it in her purse?
505	Terri: Yeah
506	Detective Jerry: And would it be just bare cash, or was it in bank envelopes?
507	Terri: Uh, bank envelopes
508	Detective Jerry: Okay, when you did a transfer, let's go back to
509	Terri: Okay
510	Detective Jerry: You'd go here, enter the Advice of Charge, take the money out of your
511	drawer, walk it over here, is it concealed then, or is pretty normal for you guys to be running
512	bundles of cash?
513	Terri: It was usually in an envelope, yes. I think that would look worse than if I was just, if I
514	walked even a bundle of cash over there I'd probably look like I was just selling it to her.
515	Whereas, when you put it in an envelope, it's probably gonna look a little more mysterious, but
516	that's what we always did, we put it in a envelope.
517	Detective Jerry: A bank envelope, like a, if I went to the bank, took a withdrawal
518	Terri: Yeah
519	Detective Jerry:what I would get is what you had it in, running it over there.
520	Terri: Right
521	Detective Jerry: Okay. Go ahead, I guess, Erick, you can

522	Mr. Knaus: Well, so this started of with umm, do you recall the amount
523	that first time?
524	Terri: I was thinking it was around two hundred dollars (\$200.00); we started out really
525	little. I'm not a hundred percent (100%) sure, but I was thinking it was very little.
526	Mr. Knaus: And, you've had a chance to review the Advice of Charges that were
527	provided from the Police Department via the District Attorney's Office to us.
528	Terri: Mm hmm
529	Mr. Knaus: And, do you recall seeing that first Advice, Advice of Charge ticket,
530	statement?
531	Terri: I don't remember seeing it, but I've, I do know that there's a lot of Advice of
532	Charges from that actually she has signed. (36:19)
533	Mr. Knaus: Let's go to, stick with the first one.
534	Terri: Okay
535	Mr. Knaus: That first one that, uh, you had just described in February.
536	Terri: I was thinking it was two hundred dollars (\$200.00), and Pam and I each got a
537	hundred (\$100.00). It was really little.
538	Detective Jerry: Uh, and you said, when did you think that was?
539	Terri: At, umm, February, and I think her first ones show that like five hundred
540	(\$500.00).
541	(cough)
542	Detective Bob: Two hundred (\$200.00), I'm tryin' to think (all in low tone)
543	Detective Jerry: That's '05, correct?
544	Mr. Knaus: 2005?
545	Terri: Yeah, and this one for two hundred and twenty-five (\$225.00)
546	filled it out; it wouldn't have been, uh
547	(mumbling by one of the Detective Jerrys)
548	Detective Bob: Could you, uh, from your recollection, give me a rundown of all the
549	names of people that you and Pam used and Advice of Charge to take unauthorized funds?
550	Terri: Umm, yeah,
551	and
552	Detective Jerry: Any additional?



583 Detective Bob: Of the one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4), five (5), six (6) people, is that 584 correct Jerry? 585 Detective Jerry: Yeah 586 Detective Bob: Of the six (6) people we just listed, they're one (1) of I don't know how 587 many customers, do you have any idea how many customers are in Alpine Bank? 588 Terri: No, a lot. 589 Detective Bob: Could there be a thousand (1,000) customers? 590 Terri: Yes. 591 Detective Bob: Okay. How did, how were these particular, 'cause there's probably a lot 592 of customers that even more money than some of these people, how were these people identified 593 as those that you would target for the Advice of Charge, the unauthorized Advice of Charges? 594 Terri: Umm, Pam would look up their account and see they were not on internet so they 595 couldn't view their accounts online. So, she knew that, even told her, that never kept a 596 register, that never watched his account. 597 Detective Bob: So, would it be fair to say that you and Pam targeted were those that 598 really had, did not keep track on a regular basis of their account balances? 599 Terri: Correct. 600 Detective Jerry: What other factors did you guys talk about as far as these victims? What 601 else did they have in common? 602 Terri: Hmm, nothing that I can think of. 603 Detective Jerry: So, if you had someone that dealt with twelve hundred dollars 604 (\$1200.00) in their checking account, would that be somebody you targeted? 605 Terri: No, I mean, I just, just knowing their, that they weren't very aware of their 606 account, and like didn't speak very much English. So, we'd, we'd slack a lot of time for 607 and sign for while right there in front of us, just to not have to make sign. 608 And, like was shaking all the time, and never, never worried about account. 609 ended up being a felon, I believe, and never paid attention to his And then. 610 account. And then, kept telling Pam that never watched his account. 611 Detective Jerry: Okay, and that's kinda where I'm going here. It's, when I, we were 612 talking about about knowing stuff about that was a trust-funder, not, and the felon 613 part...

014	Terri: Well, would always come in and tell us how
615	before, I mean, we had relationships with these people, they
616	Detective Bob: Was he
617	Terri: Was he?
618	Detective Bob:
619	Terri: I don't know about that.
620	
621	Detective Jerry: Okay, and you just had what?
622	Terri: We had relationships with these people, and we carried on conversations. And,
623	they'd spend an extra ten minutes in the bank and just chit chat with us.
624	Detective Jerry: Okay, and in retrospect, did those conversations help you guys determine
625	who you were going to target?
626	Terri: Yes
627	Detective Jerry: Okay, so you were gathering information from these folks?
628	Terri: Yes
629	Detective Jerry: Would it be a fair statement that you were building a trust with these
630	folks?
631	Terri: Yeah, that's the part that I'm, hurts the most, I think.
632	Detective Jerry: Yeah, and I think we discussed that in our previous interview, and that's
633	what it's all about is, is the betrayal of that trust that, kind of the point I wanted to get from you
634	is did you use conversations and personal relationships in, and if you weren't going to target 'em,
635	you probably wouldn't have had those conversations. Is that a fair statement?
636	Terri: I don't know, we, I mean, we were supposed to get to know all our customers
637	Detective Jerry: And you were, and you were evaluated on that?
638	Terri:by name and their dogs and I mean, we just knew everything about all our
639	customers 'cause we just, you know, liked 'em so much.
640	Detective Jerry: Yeah
641	Detective Bob: Let me, let me just move it along here. he's a
642	businessman; actually, some of the other people are businessmen, too, but he had a fairly
643	sizeable balance in his checking account is that correct?
644	Terri: Correct.

645	Detective Bob: What was the basis for targeting him, then?
646	Terri: He didn't use the internet.
647	Detective Bob: And, was there anything that you or Pam did that prevented him from
648	having any way of looking at his account balance in his checking account?
649	Terri: He asked to be on, to be added to the internet or whatever, and uh, he filled out
650	papers. And, then we just never sent 'em down to the RCI department to actually add him on.
651	Detective Bob: Who'd he fill out those papers with?
652	Terri: Pam
653	Detective Bob: Pam?
654	Terri: Right
655	Detective Bob: And, so, you said, "We never," were you responsible for bringing his
656	papers down for getting him on the internet or was Pam responsible for that?
657	Terri: I just knew we, we both put 'em in the shredder. I mean, we did it together.
658	Detective Bob: You shredded his, that, that request to go on the internet?
659	Terri: Correct.
660	Detective Bob: Okay, now there are other ways people can check their account balance,
661	and how's that?
662	Terri: If they have an ATM card, they could go through, umm, and do, do that at the
663	ATM.
664	Detective Bob: Any other way to check your?
665	Terri: Come in and ask.
666	Detective Bob: Umm, does the bank normally mail out statements every month?
667	Terri: Yes
668	Detective Bob: Okay, so, if, if I was a bank customer, and even if I was on the internet,
669	every month I would get a statement of my checking account to balance?
670	Terri: Correct, yeah
671	Detective Bob: And, it would also have the charges and debits and credits?
672	Terri: Yes.
673	Detective Bob: What, if anything, did you or Pam do to, umm, prevent from
674	getting that information in the mail?
675	Terri: Pam would put a hold on the account.

676	Detective Bob: Okay, explain what you mean by a hold on the account.
677	Terri: It's usually just a system for the CSR's, not just for the tellers, umm, mostly for
678	higher up, supervisors and, umm, higher up people to go on the other side of the computer and be
679	able to put a stop on their statement to come to their house.
680	Detective Bob: And, why would the bank have a reason why they would want to stop a
681	statement from going to a person?
682	Terri: Uh, if they were out of town, or if they called and asked, "Hey, can you hold my
683	statement for a while, I'm gonna, I'm not gonna be here, usually is why.
684	Detective Bob: And, the statements that would have normally been mailed, that according
685	to your statement, that Pam stopped, were those at the request of
686	Terri: No
687	Detective Bob: And, why did she stop those statements from coming to him?
688	Terri: So, he wouldn't see his balance.
689	Detective Bob: Okay, so this was part of this conspiracy, we'll call it, to prevent people
690	from knowing what their balance in their account is; so, you could continue, you and Pam could
691	continue taking, taking unauthorized funds?
692	Terri: Yes
693	Detective Bob: Okay
694	Mr. Knaus: So, you started with where did you guys go from there? You
695	guys being you and Pam Williams.
696	Terri: Umm, I believe it was and probably
697	after, after that. And, was, I don't remember where she was in the, that
698	sequence.
699	Mr. Knaus: Did you and Pam typically use the same process and procedure to get the
700	money from the accounts and split them, split it up?
701	Terri: Yes
702	Mr. Knaus: Did you always split up the money evenly?
703	Terri: Yes
704	Detective Jerry: Was there ever a time where it wasn't split equally?
705	Terri: Yes, there was a time, umm, it was when Pam did a withdrawal for ten thousand
706	dollars (\$10,000.00) out of account, and what, what we have on our system is

707	called yellow hammer, and something comes up that it alerts the fraud department. And, they
708	called which works in our branch, and uh, to check it out. And, she came over
709	and asked Pam about all these withdrawals and all this stuff happening in his account. And, she
710	told her that, "Oh yeah, in all the time and he's building a house and (inaudible) is
711	busy" and all this, and she kinda got me in on the conversation as well. And, so I came over
712	and said, "Yeah, is in here all the time; it's fine." She left it at that.
713	Detective Bob: And, who was that talked to her?
714	Terri: So, that's the time that Pam kept the whole ten thousand dollars
715	(\$10,000.00) because I didn't want to do it because it was way too scary; we were just doing it
716	way too much, but she needed ten thousand (\$10,000.00)
717	Detective Jerry: When do you think that yellow hammer alert came out?
718	Terri: I don't know, but I wonder if fraud could look that up, or when that happened, I
719	don't know.
720	Mr. Knaus: Was it close to the end of, umm, your employment at Alpine?
721	Terri: Yes
722	Detective Jerry: Was it?
723	Detective Bob: So, it was '07, late '07?
724	Terri: Yeah
725	Detective Bob: Would you say?
726	Terri: Yeah
727	Detective Jerry: Would you say that was a factor on you guys deciding to end your
728	employment there?
729	Terri: No
730	Detective Jerry: It wasn't?
731	Terri: Huh uh.
732	Detective Jerry: Okay
733	Terri: It was a bunch of stuff that didn't make sense because the upper management was
734	mad at Pam and I because we didn't clean out the back area. They were building an office for
735	Pam, and Adonna came back there and was really mad because we hadn't gotten to that. So,
736	then I got mad and said, "Okay, I'll move all this stuff." Well, I was really loud, and then, she
737	called Pam and I in her office next day and wrote us up. And, I told her it was mostly me

738	making the noise, and it just never got good from then. The Detective Jerrys wouldn't talk to us
739	for a month at a time, and it just got ugly fro there, like our friends were not our friends anymore.
740	And, I just felt like we were being pushed. And then, Pam would write her an email and stand
741	up for herself. Then, she'd get called back in there and written up again.
742	Detective Bob: Answer this question, how, how much money do you think that you and
743	Pam took from these six (6) customers through the Advice of Charge?
744	Terri: Well, if I knew, I would tell you.
745	Detective Bob: Well, let me ask you this, or let me make this statement then. You've
746	read the newspapers, and there's somewhere one point two million dollars (\$1.2M). Does that
747	seem about where the figure could be?
748	Terri: We, when Pam and I discussed, we thought that that was an awful lot; we didn't
749	think that it was that bad.
750	Detective Bob: What did you think it was?
751	Terri: I, I didn't think it was even close to a million dollars (\$1M).
752	Detective Jerry: After you sat and got our discovery
753	Terri: Mm hmm
754	Detective Jerry:and sat with Erick and looked at the numbers, what do you think now?
755	Terri: I have gone through the Advice of Charges and there is a lot of and a lot
756	of that are actually their signatures, but for the most part, and being the
757	biggest one (1), I think there was only one (1) or two (2) discrepancies, it's not much.
758	Detective Jerry: How about
759	Terri: Uh, yeah, there was a lot of his own signatures on there.
760	Mr. Knaus: And, you said before that sometimes you would sign on behalf of
761	Terri: Yeah
762	Mr. Knaus: When you did that, did he actually receive the money?
763	Terri: Mm hmm.
764	Detective Bob: Was that a yes? Yes?
765	Terri: Yes, sorry, we would sign for him; he'd be right there. He was our buddy; we just
766	signed for him so he didn't have to and give him his money. That's before we even thought of
767	doing anything.

768 Mr. Knaus: So, there are some Advice of Charges in accounting, 769 accounting, and some in accounting that were actually funds that were given to those 770 clients. 771 Terri: Correct. 772 Mr. Knaus: That you and Pam did not take. 773 Terri: Right. Mr. Knaus: But, other than those, after reviewing the remainder of the AOC's, the Advice 774 775 of Charges, umm, the police have a fairly accurate... 776 Terri: Yes 777 Mr. Knaus: ...number. 778 Terri: Mm hmm Detective Bob: Who did, and I don't, correct me if I'm wrong, but I, I remember the 779 number being a hundred and thirty (130) or a hundred and forty (140) Advice of Charges, and 780 781 Pam did about thirty-five (35) or forty (40). 782 Terri: Correct Detective Bob: Is that about right, the numbers? And, I'm not trying to hold you to a 783 784 particular number, but the approximate amount. 785 Terri: I remember when Erick gave me all the information, I drove out to Pam's house 786 and we added 'em all up. Detective Bob: Mm hmm 787 788 Mr. Knaus: This was prior to a restraining order being in effect, correct? 789 Terri: Correct. 790 Mr. Knaus: Yeah Terri: There it shows all the transactions that I did on my computer, all the transactions 791 792 that Pam did. 793 Detective Bob: Okay, yours is a hundred and seventy-one (171), and hers is ninety-eight 794 (98).795 Terri: Correct. 796 Detective Bob: So, you know, umm, you did about seventy percent (70%) more than she 797 did. 798 Terri: And, I did sixty-three (63) signatures, and she did a hundred and twenty-six (126).

799	Detective Bob: So
800	Mr. Knaus: Go ahead and give these numbers orally to the detectives; I'm gonna need to
801	hang on to this sheet for my information. Will you go ahead and read what you did here in terms
802	of listing 'em out?
803	Terri: Sure. Umm, my transactions that I did on my computer Uh,
804	two (22) at sixteen thousand twenty-five (\$16,025.00). For I had thirty-seven (37)
805	transactions for a hundred and one (\$101.00). For I did twenty-eight (28) transactions for
806	sixty-three thousand (\$63,000.00). For I did eighty-four (84) transactions for seven-
807	hundred forty-three thousand (\$743,000.00).
808	Detective Jerry: That's just you, correct?
809	Terri: Mm hmm.
810	Detective Bob: So, the question I'm really going to ask you is not so much which ones,
811	but how did you end up doing seventy percent (70%) more of these?
812	Terri: Well, for account, Pam told me because he always came in and usually
813	dealt with me that it was gonna look better if I did it on my computer, and that it was a worse
814	crime to do forgery. So, she mostly did the forgery.
815	Detective Jerry: You had that discussion.
816	Terri: Yeah
817	Detective Jerry: Okay
818	Terri: Little did I know that, it, I guess I wasn't keeping track of if it looked out of
819	balance or one (1) did more than the other, or if it looked one-sided. I didn't keep track of that
820	obviously.
821	Mr. Knaus: So, your transactions, you did a hundred and seventy-one (171) transactions;
822	you said, correct?
823	Terri: Yep
824	Mr. Knaus: Okay, a total amount of how much?
825	Terri: Uh, nine hundred and twenty-three thousand one hundred and forty (\$923,140.00)
826	Mr. Knaus: And, let's go ahead and read through the transactions that Pam did for the
827	detectives.
828	Terri: Sure. she had seven (7) for four thousand (\$4,000.00). For she has
829	fifty-five (55) transactions for a hundred and four (\$104.00). Eight fifty (850) for Umm,

830 she has twenty-five (25) transactions for fifty-eight nine hundred (\$58,900.00). And, for 831 she has, umm, eleven (11) transactions at eighty-five thousand (\$85,000.00). Which is 832 ninety-eight (98) transactions at two hundred and fifty two thousand seven fifty (\$252,750.00). 833 Detective Jerry: So, when you, when did you get with her and crunch the numbers? 834 Terri: When Erick told me not to share it with anyone, and I drove directly out to her 835 house. And, I called her and I said I have all this evidence and this is, she wrote out my part, and 836 then, she wrote out her part as well, and umm, ... 837 Detective Jerry: So, when... 838 Terri: ...and kept her part of what... and, that, when I saw those numbers, I. I just... 839 Detective Jerry: Did you realize then, did you realize then that the figure that was in the 840 paper was not such a far reach, that you guys were right at ... 841 Terri: Right 842 Detective Jerry: ... that number? 843 Terri: Mm hmm 844 Detective Jerry: And, if you don't mind while Bob writes here, just copying some of your 845 notes here, what was the conversation when you guys crunched the numbers on this legal pad 846 and looked at each other and, and came to the realization that ...? 847 Terri: We couldn't believe it, that it would even be close to that. 848 Detective Jerry: What additional was discussed? 849 Terri: Uh, where the money went, we don't have anything to show for it. 850 Detective Jerry: Anything else? 851 Terri: Uh, we went through and looked at the signatures, and, and found ones that, that 852 persons actually signed, that we didn't. 853 Detective Bob: So, so what I see here is, there's a figure here, Terri did nine hundred 854 twenty-three thousand one forty (\$923,140.00), and Pam did two hundred and fifty-two thousand 855 seven hundred and fifty (\$252,750.00). Now is that the amounts that you believe were the 856 fraudulent ones or the total minus ones you think that were not fraudulent. 857 Terri: That was before; so, this is what I'm thinking is less. 858 Mr. Knaus: So, this number nine hundred twenty-three thousand one hundred forty 859 (\$923,140.00), that's the total number of Advice of Charges that you did on your computer, that 860 the police believe you did?

861	Terri: Mm hmm
862	Mr. Knaus: But, some of those were legitimate transactions
863	Terri: Right
864	Mr. Knaus: not fraudulent transactions?
865	Detective Bob: So, what I see is that it looks like there is fifteen five (\$15,500.00),
866	eighteen nine (\$18,900.00), and uh, I guess, sixty-five hundred (\$6500.00),
867	I don't see anything on his.
868	Terri: Yeah, I don't remember if there was just one (1) or two (2)
869	Detective Bob: Okay, so, so what we would, what we 'd say is from the one million one
870	hundred seventy-five thousand eight hundred ninety dollars (\$1,175,890.00), that we would
871	probably subtract, umm, we'll say nineteen (19) and, uh, thirty-five (35), forty-one (41), forty-
872	two thousand (\$42,000.00) of that you believe were legitimate charges. So, the fee, the fee is,
873	the total amount of money is still gonna be in excess of one million dollars (\$1M) based on what
874	you're saying.
875	Mr. Knaus: (inaudible)
876	Terri: Oh yeah, okay.
877	Detective Jerry: Plus, we are not including or
878	Terri: Right.
879	Detective Jerry:in those figures
880	Terri: Right
881	Mr. Knaus: Or the first theft of sixteen (16)
882	Detective Jerry: And the sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00). So you're back, you're back, the
883	other ones back in there, and we're probably right back. And, and, obviously,
884	there's more documentation coming because there, we had a hard time locating him, but they
885	have located him. And, he's made contact; so, that's in the process right now. And, you said
886	earlier that you have no idea how much that was taken from him. DO you have, is it
887	over ten thousand (\$10,000.00)?
888	Terri: Yeah.
889	Detective Jerry: Under two hundred thousand (\$200,000.00)?
890	Terri: Yeah.
891	Detective Jerry: Where would you put it, just lookin' at your other activity?

892	Detective Bob: You know, I think, it would be better for us to just get the figures, and
893	let's not do this little game here.
894	Detective Jerry: I agree
895	Detective Bob: The fact is, is that the figure certainly is in excess of one million dollars
896	(\$1M) that was frauduly taken, yes?
897	Terri: Yes
898	Detective Bob: Okay
899	Terri: Sorry
900	Detective Bob: It does surprise you; the money goes fast, doesn't it?
901	Terri: Yes
902	Detective Bob: Okay, so based on
903	Mr. Knaus: Who's writing is this?
904	Terri: That's Pam's when we got together to see how much we each did.
905	Detective Bob: So, Pam, Pam, basically, did, okay, this is Pam's writing here?
906	Terri: Yeah
907	Detective Bob: So, she sat with you and wrote this out?
908	Terri: Yeah
909	Detective Bob: And this represents, these two (2) sheets here represent what you guys
910	stole from customers?
911	Terri: Yes, that's how much I did, and this is what they tracked of, umm, paying like my
912	credit card off when it came in; I would get cashier's checks.
913	Detective Bob: How come just your name's on here? Where's Pam's?
914	Terri: She kept her portion
915	Detective Bob: Ah, so there is another portion, but this is, this is Pam's handwriting?
916	Terri: Yeah
917	Detective Bob: Okay.
918	Detective Jerry: Cashier's checks, why don't you explain for me, 'cause we obviously
919	through the search warrant
920	Terri: Yeah, I have a lot of paper trail.
921	Detective Jerry: Yeah, and so the cashier's check, was that another method to keep from
922	leaving a paper trail? Explain your usage of cashier's checks.

923	Terri: Okay, umm, when Pam and I would go to Vegas, or if we purchased anything,
924	we'd use my credit card 'cause she didn't have a credit card at that time. And, we'd put our, our,
925	umm, our airline tickets on there, our spa trips, just anything really, and then, when my bill
926	would come in, I would add up how much she owed. And, I would tell her, "Hey, you owe this
927	much." And, she would bring from her stash cash in for her portion of my bill, and I would
928	bring my stash in from my house. And, then, she would do a cashier's check on her computer,
929	and we'd usually send it off to Compass or whatever credit card and it'd be in my name. And,
930	Pam, you know, would have that money in her drawer for that cashier's check.
931	Detective Jerry: So, you'd bring money back in the bank
932	Terri: Yeah
933	Detective Jerry:and write the cashier's check?
934	Теггі: Үер.
935	Detective Jerry: Once again, reconcile the drawer
936	Terri: Right
937	Detective Jerry:with the cash that you had at home?
938	Terri: Correct
939	Detective Jerry: What, let me go over this one more time, what's the most cash you had
940	in your house?
941	Terri: I think I told you twenty (20) at the time, but it was probably more like forty (40).
942	Mr. Knaus: Forty what?
943	Terri: Thousand
944	Mr. Knaus: And, so, what, so the use of the cashier's check, that wasn't to take more
945	money?
946	Terri: No, we, we actually had stashes at home, and we brought in the cash to pay off my
947	bills. And, Pam would always do a cashier's check for me; so, nobody else would actually see it.
948	No other tellers would ever see it.
949	Detective Jerry: And, it wouldn't show up in your personal banking account
950	Terri: Right
951	Detective Jerry:as deposits, right? And withdrawals?
952	Terri: Correct
953	Detective Bob: So, the cashier's check would go to your credit card company?

954	Terri: Yes, and we'd pay it off in full every month.
955	Detective Bob: And, and how many trips did you make over the course of this two (2)
956	year period?
957	Terri: Umm
958	Detective Bob: Or, actually, almost three (3) year period.
959	Terri: I know in the last year, we went six (6) times.
960	Detective Bob: Six (6) times, okay, and how about the previous years?
961	Terri: Umm, maybe twice
962	Detective Bob: Just two (2) times?
963	Terri: Mm hmm
964	Detective Bob: Each year?
965	Terri: I don't think we went at all the first year
966	Detective Bob: Okay, so, maybe you went eight (8) times
967	Terri: Eight (8) times all together.
968	Detective Jerry: To Vegas?
969	Terri: Yeah
970	Detective Jerry: How about Mexico?
971	Terri: Uh, my husband and I went to Mexico.
972	Detective Jerry: Fair assumption that that trip was paid for with stolen money?
973	Terri: That trip, yes.
974	Mr. Knaus:
975	Terri:
976

982	Detective Bob: Did he know you went on all these eight to nine (8-9) trips to Vegas?
983	Terri: Yeah

984	Detective Bob: And, and, how did he, how was he able to justify in his mind that you
985	would be able to afford to do this?
986	Terri: I don't know
987	Mr. Knaus: Did you tell him or pretend that you were making more money than you
988	were?
989	Terri:
990	
991	
992	
993	
994	Detective Jerry: Did you do joint tax returns?
995	Terri: Yes
996	Detective Jerry: Did you do 'em?
997	Terri: No, I took 'em in to H&R Block.
998	Detective Jerry: Okay, so, he, did you sit down and do taxes together?
999	Terri: No, we never really discussed money; so
1000	Detective Bob: I assume that you didn't report any of the stolen money.
1001	Mr. Knaus: I'm gonna ask you not to answer that
1002	Detective Bob: Okay. How much you think you spent each time you went to Vegas, each
1003	of you?
1004	Terri: We usually took five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) of cash when we went.
1005	Detective Jerry: Each?
1006	Terri: One time, we both took ten thousand (\$10,000.00).
1007	Detective Bob: And, what would it cost you for staying there, flights, everything?
1008	Terri: Umm, the flight and hotel is usually around three thousand (\$3,000.00) a person.
1009	Detective Bob: Per person? So, three thousand (\$3,000.00), six thousand (\$6,000.00) and
1010	ten thousand (\$10,000.00); so, that'd be sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00) per trip between the two
1011	(2) of you, on average.
1012	Terri: Well, only the one last trip, I think was when we brought ten thousand
1013	(\$10,000.00) each.

1014	Detective Bob: Okay, well I said ten thousand (\$10,000.00), which would be ten
1015	thousand (\$10,000.00), five (5) each and three thousand (\$3,000.00) each, that'd be sixteen (16).
1016	So, one time it cost you over twenty thousand (\$20,000.00) to go. So, so, somewhere between
1017	sixteen and eighteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00 - \$18,000.00) is that an average spend in
1018	Vegas?
1019	Terri: Yeah
1020	Detective Bob: How much? I don't want to put words in your mouth, based on what
1021	you're telling me.
1022	Terri: Based on flight and hotel and
1023	Mr. Knaus: Spa?
1024	Terri:spa
1025	Detective Bob: So, you probably spent well over a hundred thousand dollars
1026	(\$100,000.00) on just trips.
1027	Terri: I don't know; I'm really bad at keeping track.
1028	Detective Bob: Well, even if you spent ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) per trip, which
1029	sounds like that's low, that would be ninety thousand (\$90,000.00). So, not that it really matters,
1030	to be honest with you, I'm just, I guess I'm just trying to put this in perspective for you as to
1031	where the money went.
1032	Terri: Right
1033	Detective Bob: You also bought a lot of diamonds and jewelry that was real. I know you
1034	told people it was costume jewelry, but it wasn't.
1035	Terri: Yes
1036	Detective Jerry: Well, first of all, is that true?
1037	Terri: What?
1038	Detective Jerry: That you did tell coworkers that it was fake jewelry?
1039	Terri: I don't remember
1040	Detective Jerry: Let me rephrase that.
1041	Terri: I don't really remember anybody coming and saying, "Is that real?"
1042	Detective Jerry: Okay, did, do you

1043	Terri: But, a lot of people at our work would always ask oh is that new, 'cause Pam and I
1044	would buy clothes all the time and new jewelry all the time, and they would come up and ask,
1045	"Oh, is that new? Oh, is that new?" And, then, that scared us; so, we quite saying it was new.
1046	Detective Bob: What do you think you spent on jewelry? I mean, I saw those rings were
1047	some pretty big rocks.
1048	Terri: Umm, I don't know; you have all my receipts. They were all together.
1049	Detective Bob: You think you spent fifty thousand (\$50,000.00)?
1050	Mr. Knaus: I've asked her not to guess at answers. She's already said that she just
1051	doesn't
1052	Detective Jerry: That's better.
1053	Mr. Knaus:doesn't really know.
1054	Detective Bob: But, you bought a lot of jewelry?
1055	Terri: Yes
1056	Detective Bob: What other kind of stuff did you guys buy? Cars?
1057	Terri: Cars, we bought our kids's motorcycles, we bought motorcycles for ourselves, we
1058	bought
1059	Detective Bob: How many motorcycles do you think you bought?
1060	Terri: I have six (6), and then, we bought the white trailers, which were around four
1061	thousand (\$4,000.00).
1062	Detective Bob: So, that's to carry the bikes, the white trailers?
1063	Terri: Yeah
1064	Detective Bob: More than one (1)?
1065	Terri: Yeah, Pam and Corey bought one (1), and then, we, I bought one (1).
1066	Detective Bob: Okay, so, six (6) motorcycles between you and Pam, or just you?
1067	Terri: Just me.
1068	Detective Bob: Okay, so, you, and plus one (1) trailer
1069	Terri: Right
1070	Detective Bob: Okay, and, and then the other vehicles?
1071	Terri: Umm, yes, I bought my daughter one (1), and she rolled it.
1072	Detective Bob: What kind of vehicle?
1073	Terri: It was a, a white '05 Jeep Liberty; she rolled it.

1074	Detective Bob: Okay
1075	Terri: So, I got eighteen thousand (\$18,000.00) from the insurance company, and then,
1076	went and bought her a five thousand dollar (\$5,000.00) vehicle.
1077	Detective Bob: Okay, so that money came from insurance money?
1078	Terri: Mm hmm
1079	Detective Bob: Okay, and, and, so, how much was the Jeep when you bought it?
1080	Terri: The white one (1)?
1081	Detective Bob: Yeah
1082	Terri: I think I spent close to eighteen (18)
1083	Detective Bob: About eighteen thousand (\$18,000.00)?
1084	Terri: Yeah
1085	Detective Bob: Okay, and how much did you spend on six (6) motorcycles?
1086	Terri: I think it was fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) all together.
1087	Detective Bob: Okay
1088	Terri: And, then, four thousand (\$4,000.00) for the trailer.
1089	Detective Bob: And, then, any other cars?
1090	Terri: Yeah, I bought a yellow Cobalt which was around twenty-one thousand
1091	(\$21,000.00).
1092	Detective Bob: Okay
1093	Terri: And, then, I Bought a pick-up that was around twenty-six thousand (\$26,000.00).
1094	Detective Bob: What kind of pick-up? Do you know?
1095	Terri: It's a Ford SportTrac.
1096	Detective Bob: And, that was how much? Twenty-six (26)?
1097	Terri: Yes
1098	Detective Bob: Okay, any other vehicles?
1099	Terri: Umm, I have a Subaru, but that I still owe on. I think I've paid probably twenty
1100	(20), I think I've paid probably twenty-five (25), twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) on.
1101	Detective Bob: How about, umm, Pam? How many, uh
1102	Terri: It seems like we were right there together. If she got a car, then next month I'd
1103	have to get a car, like she gave me the itch. If I got something, she'd have to go get something.

1104	Detective Bob: How many motorcycles do you think she bought, or do you know she
1105	bought?
1106	Terri: She bought herself a four-wheeler, and bought a ten thousand dollar
1107	(\$10,000.00) crotch rocket. And, then, they bought two (2) dirt bikes, one (1) for one (1)
1108	for ; I couldn't tell you how much they were. And, then, Pam crashed on her four-
1109	wheeler and decided to get Sea-Doos. So, the bought Sea-Doos and life jackets and all
1110	Detective Bob: How many Sea-Doos did they buy?
1111	Terri: Two (2) and a trailer.
1112	Detective Bob: And, what'd she buy in cars?
1113	Terri: She bought her, her daughter that first car from , and then, they traded it off
1114	for a Jeep Liberty. And, then, they traded it off for, she's in a Subaru now, soAnd then, she
1115	bought a Jeep Liberty. And, then, Pam had the black Lexus, and
1116	Detective Bob: Tahoe?
1117	Terri: Yeah, the Tahoe, and then she's got something else now.
1118	Detective Jerry: A Jeep; how about s Jeep?
1119	Terri: 's Jeep, yeah, and then, they've got truck as well.
1120	Detective Jerry: It's like an F250; I believe or maybe a
1121	Terri: Yeah, I don't
1122	Detective Bob: And, is it your understanding, and again you may not know the answer to
1123	this, but is it your understanding that most or all that was purchased with unauthorized funds?
1124	Terri: Yes.
1125	Detective Jerry: And, did you guys have any discussions about the purchases you made?
1126	Terri: (inaudible)
1127	Detective Jerry: I mean, you said that you would get the itch.
1128	Terri: Yeah
1129	Detective Jerry: Would you talk back and forth?
1130	Terri: Mm hmm
1131	Detective Jerry: I mean, was it common?
1132	Terri: Yeah, we were best friends; we talked all the time.
1133	Detective Jerry: Was it common knowledge that you were going to buy a new dirt bike
1134	with this excess cash that you came upon?

1135	Terri: Yeah
1136	Detective Jerry: Unlawfully?
1137	Terri: Yes
1138	Detective Jerry: And, Pam, it was understood between both of ya that the purchases you
1139	made were with other people's money?
1140	Terri: Yes
1141	Detective Jerry: Did that ever get spoken? Was, did you ever talk about guilt?
1142	Terri: Yes, we always did, I mean, we talked about how that we needed to quit, and that
1143	we could lose our family. We could lose our jobs. We could lose everything.
1144	Detective Jerry: And, these are best friends talking about a little criminal enterprise, and
1145	you guys discussed that
1146	Terri: That we needed to stop. That, that we loved our job, and you know, we were well
1147	known in the community. And, and we just, everybody liked us at Alpine Bank, all our
1148	customers. And, we, we talked about that we had a lot at risk.
1149	Detective Jerry: So, you recognized that what you were doing was illegal?
1150	Terri: Yeah
1151	Detective Jerry: It's pretty obvious.
1152	Terri: Mm hmm, yes. And, so, we would think we were going to quit for a while, and
1153	then, a bill would come or something would trigger or
1154	Detective Jerry: Did you guys ever discuss, did you ever go to the same church?
1155	Terri: I do.
1156	Detective Jerry: as Pam?
1157	Terri: I do right now, yeah.
1158	Detective Jerry: Okay, did you ever discuss tithings with the church?
1159	Terri: With the church? No.
1160	Detective Jerry: Well, amongst yourselves about giving to the church?
1161	Terri: No
1162	Detective Jerry: Okay, well did you ever have any knowledge how much money was
1163	going to that church?

1164	Terri: No, I just know that she never gave stolen money to that church. She did say that,
1165	but that was it. I would never ask her how much she tithed. You're supposed to tithe ten percent
1166	(10%) of your income, but
1167	Detective Jerry: Yep
1168	Detective Bob: She didn't want to be a hypocrite, I guess.
1169	Detective Jerry: Of income
1170	Terri: Right
1171	Detective Bob: Now, they tithed one (1) time over twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00);
1172	how would that be, how do you think that would be
1173	Terri: They wrote a check for that?
1174	Detective Bob: I don't know, but we saw a figure on a
1175	Detective Jerry: Receipts
1176	Detective Bob: On one (1) of her, uh, receipts.
1177	Mr. Knaus: If you don't know about something, just tell the detectives you don't know,
1178	don't guess.
1179	Terri: I am; I have no clue about that.
1180	Detective Bob: Let me just, let me just ask you this, let's just use the figure of one point
1181	two million dollars (\$1.2M), and I think it's going to be higher than that, but we know that based
1182	on what we just went over, it certainly is well in excess of one point one million dollars (\$1.1M),
1183	based on even subtracting out these few that we have stuff, which is going
1184	to put it at about one point two million dollars (\$1.2M). Did you get a larger share of the one
1185	point two million dollars (\$1.2M) than Pam?
1186	Terri: No
1187	Detective Bob: Did Pam get a larger share?
1188	Terri: She actually got the ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) that we did not split that
1189	day, but, you know what's ten thousand dollars (\$10.000.00) in the scheme of things.
1190	Detective Bob: So, out of one point two million dollars (\$1.2M), er yea, one point two
1191	million dollars (\$1.2M), you received somewhere about six hundred thousand (\$600,000.00) and
1192	she received somewhere about six hundred thousand (\$600,000.00) and ten thousand dollars
1193	(\$10,000.00).
1194	Terri: Yeah

1195	Detective Bob: And, you always split evenly after, except for the one (1) time that you
1196	mentioned where she took ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00).
1197	Terri: Yes, always.
1198	· · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · ·
1199	Detective Bob: Okay, and, and where did this normally occur, the split?
1200	Terri: Usually in the closet that had the lockers, and our lockers weren't locked. So, you
1201	could get in other people's lockers. So, we would always put half in mine and half in hers. Or if
1201	we didn't have time to count it, then we'd go out to the parking lot in the car.
	Detective Jerry: On the bank premises?
1203	Terri: Yeah
1204	Detective Jerry: You didn't go over to Wal-Mart to split it?
1205	Terri: Yeah
1206	Detective Jerry: Okay, and
1207	Terri: She, she didn't like splitting it in the parking lot 'cause you know it's got Gordon's
1208	window right there.
1209	Detective Jerry: But it did occur, you said? Or
1210	Terri: Yeah
1211	Detective Jerry:it did not?
1212	Terri: Yeah
1213	Detective Jerry: In the bank parking lot?
1214	Terri: Yeah
1215	Detective Jerry: Okay, but also it happened over at Wal-Mart's parking lot?
1216	Terri: Or wherever she'd say meet me somewhere.
1217	Detective Jerry: Okay, but you met specifically to divvy up the take for that day?
1218	Terri: Yeah
1219	Detective Bob: Okay. Is, is, is it fair to say that based on this more than an hour long
1220	conversation that you and Pam Williams conspired to make fraudulent, unauthorized
1221	withdrawals from clients at the bank, client's accounts?
1222	Mr. Knaus: Say it in your words.
1223	Terri: Alright
1224	Detective Bob: Do you understand what I mean by a conspiracy? You agreed to do this
1225	together.

1226	
1226	Terri: We agreed, we agreed. We talked about it. We agreed. We did it together, and I
1227	mean, without telling you everything that I did, I mean, I have to tell you that Pam did as well,
1228	but it, but I just came here to, to tell you everything that you needed to know, what I did.
1229	Detective Bob: Do you have any justification for doing what you did?
1230	Terri: Mm, what does that mean?
1231	Detective Bob: What would you, could you say that what you did, was there some, was
1232	there a reason, whether it was something that the bank did to you that caused you to commit a
1233	crime against the bank or its clients.
1234	Terri: No, I loved all my people I worked with.
1235	Detective Bob: And how about Pam, Pam Williams? Did the bank do anything to her
1236	that caused her to be angry inside her and justify her reason for committing this crime?
1237	Terri: No, I mean, her and Adonna had some words and stuff, but we had already been
1238	knee deep in stuff.
1239	Detective Bob: When you say "knee deep," meaning, in other words, you guys were
1240	already committing these acts prior to Adonna and Pam having words.
1241	Terri: Correct
1242	Detective Bob: So, the act, or nothing that Adonna did or any administrator at the bank
1243	caused you or Pam to commit this crime?
1244	Terri: No
1245	Detective Bob: Or this continual criminal episode?
1246	Terri: No
1247	Detective Bob: Okay
1248	Detective Jerry: I'll follow-up on that. In discovery, during this thing, there were some
1249	emails that were presented by Pam's attorney that would probably be classified as inappropriate.
1250	Were you offended by those emails?
1251	Terri:
1252	Detective Jerry:
1253	Terri:
1254	Detective Jerry:
1255	Terri:
1256	Detective Jerry:

1257	Terri: No, I guess not.
1258	Mr. Knaus: Okay
1259	Detective Jerry: Did, in any way, that, did those, did you and Pam discuss those emails?
1260	Would you laugh about 'em?
1261	Terri: We'd laugh about 'em.
1262	Detective Jerry: Did Pam ever indicate to you that those emails were motivation for
1263	stealing from these people you listed?
1264	Terri: No
1265	Detective Bob: No?
1266	Terri: No
1267	Detective Jerry: Was it a big deal? I mean, did it even cause a conversation, the emails?
1268	Terri: No
1269	Detective Jerry: I mean, I, I, I'm just trying to make sense of
1270	Terri: Not that I remember
1271	Detective Bob: In all fairness to, uh, did you guys, did you, you, send any back
1272	to her that was of equal type humor or, umm,
1273	Terri: Probably.
1274	Detective Bob: Was that a yes or probably?
1275	Terri: Umm
1276	Detective Bob: It's not a crime to do it, but it's just part of where we're trying to go with,
1277	with this whole
1278	Detective Jerry: Motivation
1279	Detective Bob:the motivation. Did you send stuff to her?
1280	Terri: Probably, yes, probably.
1281	Detective Bob: Did Pam send stuff back to her?
1282	Terri: Yeah, probably.
1283	Detective Bob: And, how do you know that?
1284	Terri: Umm, 'cause I, she would send it to me as well.
1285	Detective Bob: And, so you would see it
1286	Terri: 'Cause you can see who all she sent it to.
1287	Detective Jerry: You'd get copied?

1288	Terri: Right
1289	Detective Bob: That was my next question, you could actually, you knew this because
1290	you saw the email with s name on it, yours, and it was stuff that may be
1291	considered inappropriate, but people laugh at it.
1292	Terri: Yeah, we laughed at it, yeah
1293	Detective Jerry: So, it's part of the culture of the bank? It was never an issue?
1294	Terri: It grew that way, yeah. No
1295	Mr. Knaus: Terri, let me go back to some things that I, I have some knowledge about that
1296	I want to ask them in general terms so you can answer it your way. Okay, the way that you
1297	described it before. Let's talk about, umm, bank statements.
1298	Detective Bob: I'm going to turn it off (low tone)
1299	Mr. Knaus: had asked someone for, for copies of his bank statements; is that
1300	right?
1301	Terri: Yes, he came in and, uh, asked Pam for his bank statements. And, uh, Pam told
1302	him that the computers were down.
1303	Mr. Knaus: About when was this?
1304	Terri: Pretty close to the end. Probably, I would guess, a month before the end, I don't
1305	know.
1306	Mr. Knaus: Late 2007?
1307	Terri: Yes
1308	Mr. Knaus: Okay, umm, tell the detectives what you told me about statements.
1309	Terri: So, she told that the computers were down, and that we would send him a
1310	statement. Pam was going to Glenwood that night for training or something, and she told me,
1311	"You have to go to Staples and buy a type writer and come down" She retyped a whole
1312	statement, and we sent it to showing that he actually had money.
1313	Detective Jerry: More than he actually had?
1314	Terri: Right
1315	Detective Bob: So, you falsified a document to make it look like he did have money in a
1316	written statement?
1317	Terri: Correct
1318	Detective Bob: And, he received that statement?

1319	Terri: Yes
1320	Detective Bob: Okay, this, this particular recording has a minute and thirty seconds
1321	(1:30) left on it, and we have another recording going with the camera, which is also, we're not
1322	sure about the voice, it seems a little low; so, we're doing it two (2) ways. What I'd like to do is,
1323	umm, and at least before this one comes to an end, umm, is you have made statements against
1324	your own self-interests, meaning you have admitted to committing a crime.
1325	Terri: Yes
1326	Detective Bob: And, the information that you told us, is it true and accurate to the best of
1327	your knowledge?
1328	Terri: Yes
1329	Detective Bob: You recognize by making these statements against your own self-
1330	interests, it will incriminate you, and you could be sentenced to the Department of Corrections.
1331	Terri: Yes
1332	Detective Bob: Okay, and if the information you provided us, not only about you, but
1333	about Pam is true and correct information.
1334	Terri: Yes
1335	Detective Bob: And you haven't done this to get Pam in trouble?
1336	Terri: No
1337	Detective Bob: Is she equally as, umm, uh, criminally liable as you?
1338	Terri: Yes
1339	Detective Bob: If you have another question, go ahead.
1340	Mr. Knaus: Umm, want to take a little break?
1341	Detective Bob: You know what, why don't we do this, stop this one (1), let's stop, stop it.
