Flight issues loom

Ski season air travel program dipping into reserves

Steamboat Ski and Resort Corp. Airline Program Director Janet Fischer told a group here Friday that within two winters, the resort community could face a funding shortfall as it tries to maintain current levels of ski-season jet service.

"Our cost rose substantially this winter, and we are forecasting our funding will be short of supporting current levels in 2011," Fischer said. "Next winter (2009-10) will deplete a lot of our reserves."

The impact could be felt in the winter of 2010-11, she said.

Fischer was speaking before an audience of 45 people at the Steamboat Smokehouse during the first of a bi-monthly series of short speeches and networking gatherings called Good Morning Steamboat. It is sponsored by the Steamboat Springs Chamber Resort Association.

Yampa Valley Regional Airport and the Steamboat resort community will see 162,500 arriving airline seats this ski season. They are provided by six airlines flying direct from nine cities with connections from 200

In order to secure the flights, the business community has put together a funding package
