# Bill could bring windfall

### Rep. Baumgardner proposal to boost county mineral lease funds

A bill sponsored by freshman state Rep. Randy Baumgardner, R-Hot Sulphur Springs, could bring a major windfall to infrastructure projects in Northwest Colorado but at the expense of some money allocated to earn the support of Associated school districts, higher education and state grants.

Baumgardner didn't make any fans among officials in the region with his initial version of the proposal, House Bill 1051. While it still has opponents in the region, a complete rewrite of the legislation may soon

Governments of Northwest Colorado. The bill would send 10 percent of the state's total federal mineral lease revenues about \$17.5 million in the fiscal year beginning July 1, according to projections directly back to the counties they originated from for construction projects.

Moffat and Routt counties would receive an additional \$2.1 million and \$658,652, respectively, in the next fiscal year if the bill passes, according to the projections in a fiscal note prepared by the Colorado
