Kakela's work honored

City grant winner of 20 years celebrated Thursday

Some of the projects Linda Kakela sent across Wendy DuBord's desk were so good, the deputy city manager jokes that she often wondered whether they were actually legal.

In 20 years with the city of Steamboat Springs, Kakela artfully leveraged grant funding and partnerships into some of the most valued and utilized public assets in the Yampa Valley. Kakela retired at the end of March; she was celebrated at

a farewell reception Thursday night at Centennial Hall.

'Before Linda, we didn't have a grant-seeking program at all," DuBord said. "She has found funding where none of us found money before.'

DuBord estimated Kakela was responsible for \$60 million to \$65 million in grant funds awarded to the city throughout two decades. Those dollars were used for projects including the Yampa River Core Trail, countless open space land acquisitions, roads, sewers, public art,
