

Far From Average: Growing Gaps in Child Well-Being

In the most recent national analysis, Colorado ranked 22nd in the United States in overall child well-being,¹ based on statewide data on a number of health, education and other social and economic indicators. The ranking places Colorado's kids in the middle of the pack and, one might assume, generally faring about average. But as the *2010 KIDS COUNT in Colorado!* data reveals, many Colorado children are faring far from average.

Colorado is witnessing dramatic and growing gaps between various populations in child well-being. There are stark contrasts between those children who are doing very well and those who are struggling. Significant disparities exist between children living in different regions, counties, and neighborhoods and between children of different racial and ethnic backgrounds, especially in the area of poverty. U.S. Census data show that between 2000 and 2008, the number of children in poverty was growing faster in Colorado than in any other state, and that trend is not experienced proportionately among our children. Specifically, Hispanic and black children are more likely to live in poverty than their white counterparts. Also, as of 2008, the Denver suburbs were experiencing a dramatic increase in the number of children living in poverty, consistent with a national "suburbanization of poverty" trend.

By many different measures, poverty is the largest obstacle to opportunity for Colorado's children, leading to negative outcomes for kids that impact nearly every other measure of their well-being. Whether the difference between being proficient in math or reading or well below average; between having the opportunity to see a regular physician or having to wait until the need for an emergency room visit; or between spending years in safe, quality child care settings or inconsistent years in facilities that aren't licensed, these gaps have real impacts on children's lives.

Because of the impacts of poverty on child well-being and the dramatic nature of Colorado's trend, it is critical to look more closely at the data and delve into the questions it raises. For a state that is so prosperous in so many ways, why are so many more of Colorado's children facing the devastation of poverty? Who are these children? And where do they live? The answers to these questions are not easy. There are a wide range of contributing causes to the poverty trends, including lack of educational attainment by our children and an increase in low-skilled workers; lack of low-skill jobs that pay a living wage; increased cost of living without an increase in real wages; lack of public resources invested in children as compared to other states; growth of the state's low-income population; and an increase in births to moms with less than 12 years of education. Although these are some of the factors, none explain the trend entirely.

2010 KIDS COUNT in Colorado! also looks more closely at the social and economic trends that explain who these children are, where they live and why gaps in student achievement, poverty and health persist. With the rate of Colorado's child population growing, these widening gaps and their associated consequences will have significant ramifications for Colorado's future workforce, economy and prosperity. Moreover, Colorado's child well-being gap is likely to grow wider as the full impact of the recession becomes known. The data used in this report, while the most recent available, were collected just as the recession was taking hold, and do not reflect the full impacts of the downturn.

There are no simple causes to these challenges and no simple answers to address them, but a better understanding of the data is a critical step toward identifying opportunities to reverse these trends and helping improve the lives of *all* of Colorado's children.

Setting the Context: A Snapshot of the Paradox

Colorado's ranking of 22nd in the nation in child well-being comes from the Annie E. Casey Foundation's national 2009 KIDS COUNT Data Book. Rankings are calculated based on 10 key indicators that reflect a wide range of factors affecting the well-being of a child during all the developmental stages of his or her life and are consistent over time.

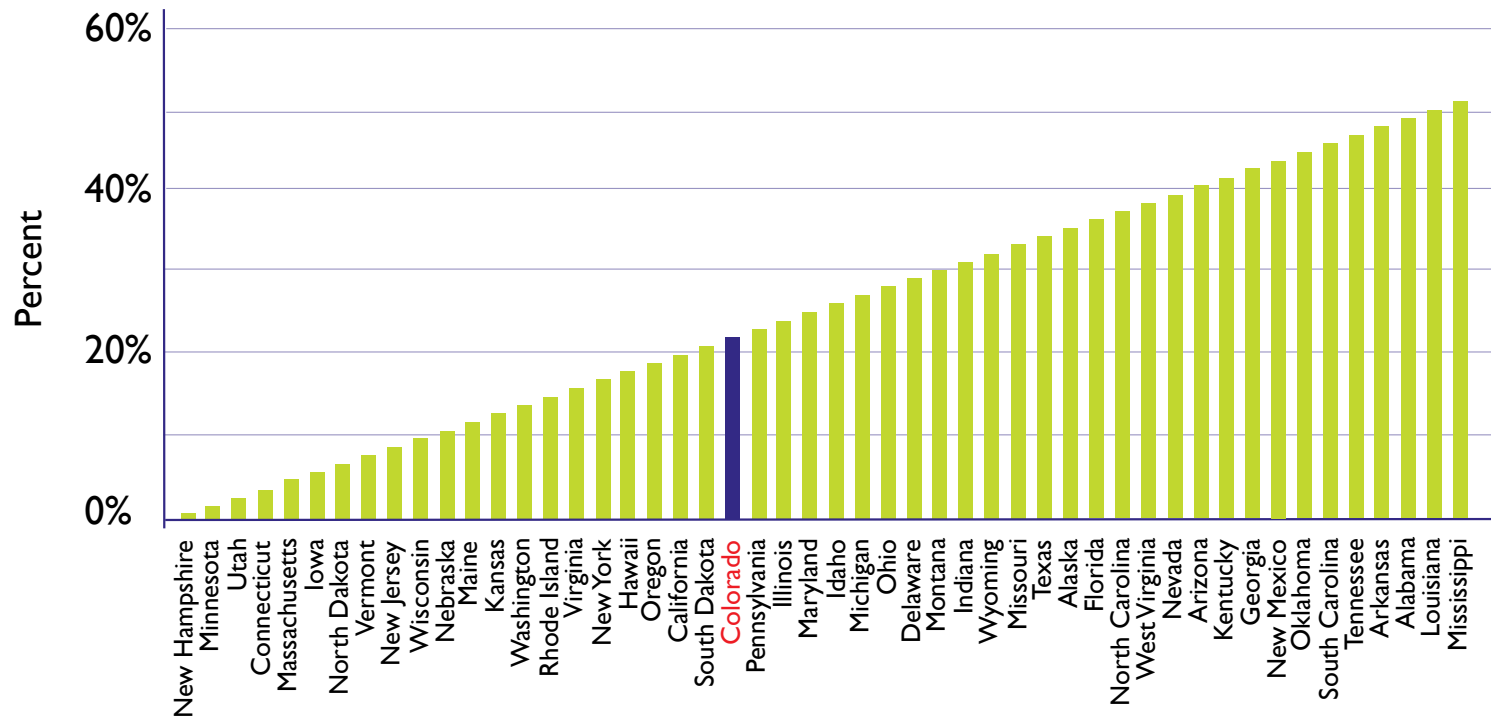
10 Key Indicators Used to Calculate Overall Rank in Child Well-Being²

- Percent of low-birthweight babies
- Infant mortality rate
- Child death rate
- Teen death rate
- Teen birth rate
- Percent of teens who are high school dropouts
- Percent of teens not attending school and not working
- Percent of children living in families where no parent has full-time, year-round employment
- Percent of children in poverty
- Percent of children in single-parent families

These rankings are intended to highlight the status of children in the United States by state and to compare and assess trends over time. Based on this reliable national source, Colorado appears about average.

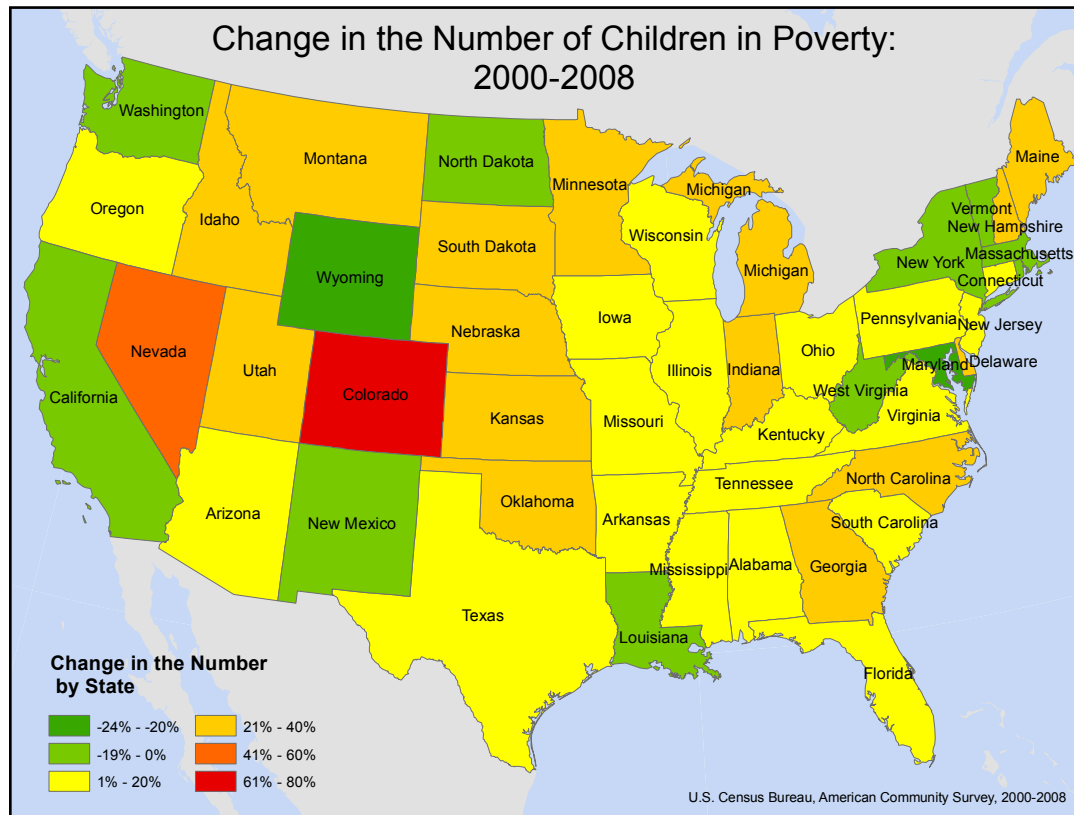
Figure 1: Colorado's Overall Ranking Compared to other States

2009 Overall Rank in Child Well-Being



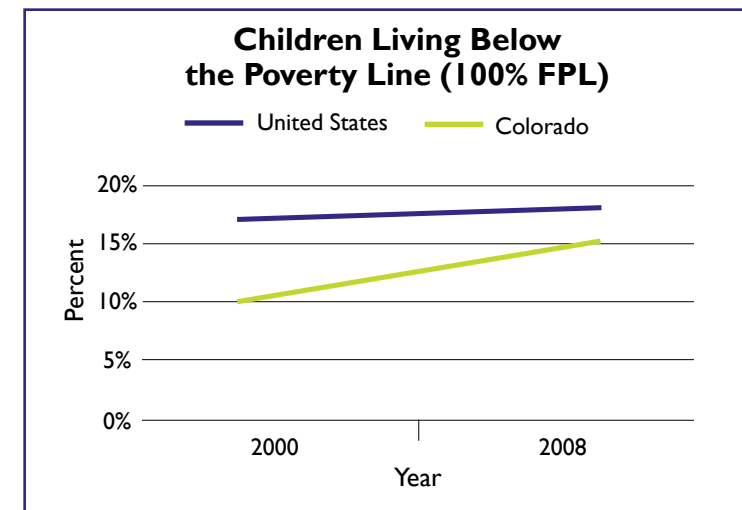

The Annie E. Casey national rankings give us a general idea of how Colorado is faring overall compared to other states. However, they do not reveal the degree or direction of change over time or explain why change is occurring. For example, being 18th in the nation in the overall percentage of children living in poverty does not reveal that compared to other states, Colorado has one of the fastest growing rates of child poverty (Figures 2 and 3).³ Thus, an “average” ranking in overall child well-being does not reveal the full picture of child poverty in Colorado.

Figure 3: U.S. and Colorado Children in Poverty: 2000-2008 Trend Data



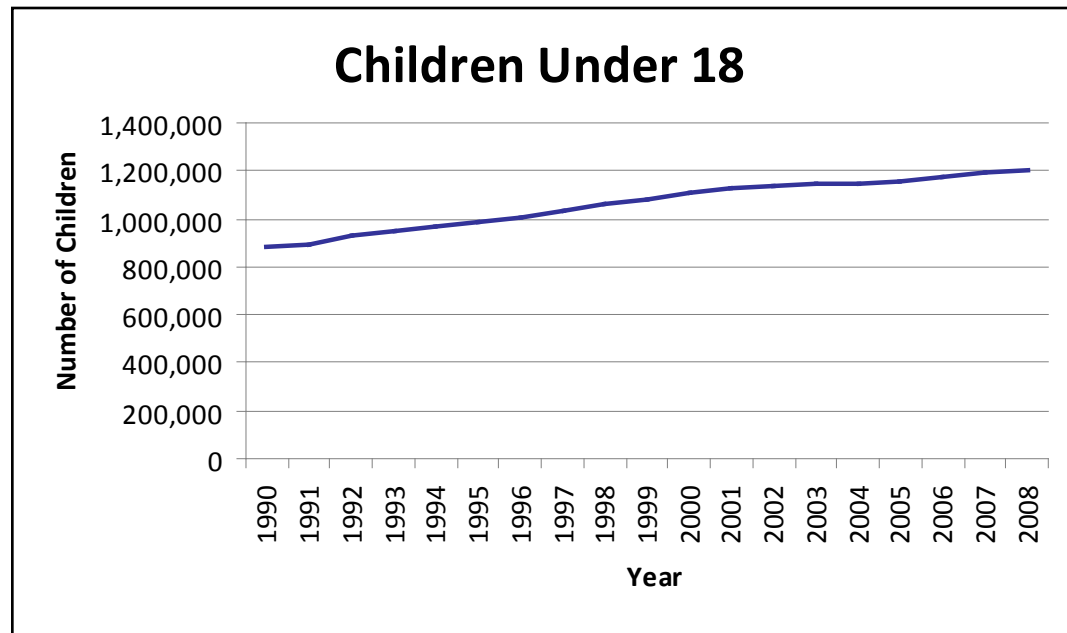

Colorado's Growing Child Population

According to estimates by the U.S. Census Bureau, Colorado's child population in 2008 was 1,207,135, a 37 percent increase since 1990 (Figure 4).⁴ Colorado is among the top 10 states that experienced growth in its child population since 2000 (up nine percent), while more than half of the states' number of people younger than 18 declined.⁵



Figure 4: Child Population in Colorado Since 1990



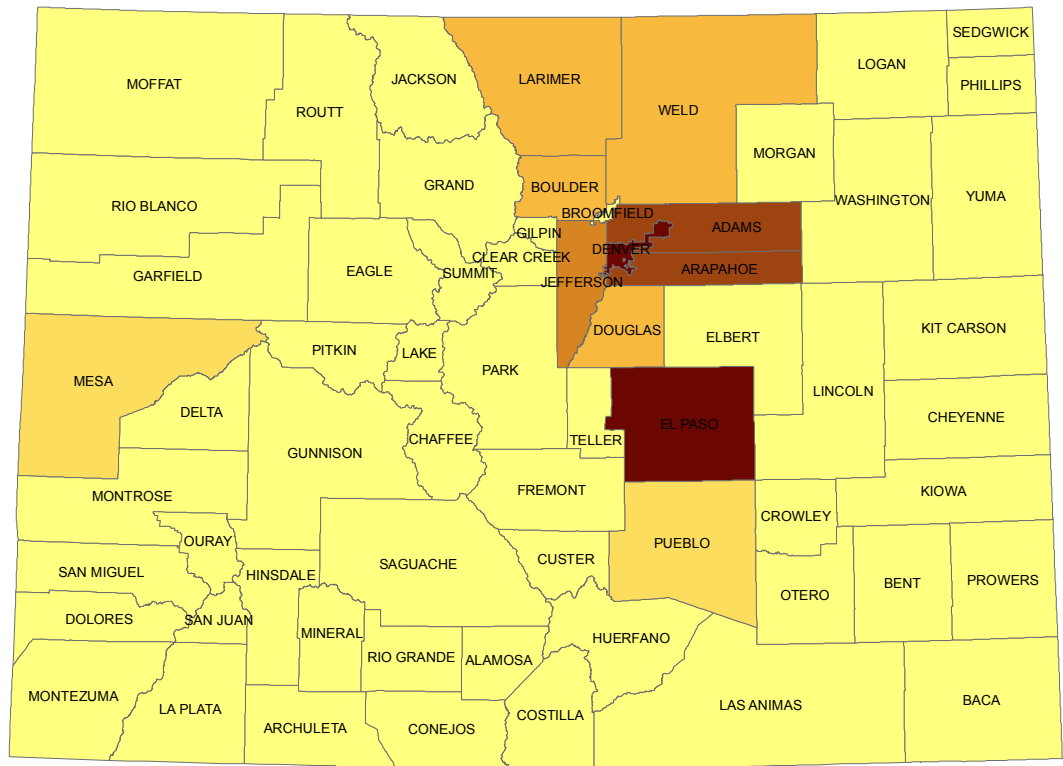

Understandably, the greatest numbers of children live in the more populated urban and suburban counties of the Front Range and Grand Junction areas. The map in Figure 5 illustrates the distribution of the child population in Colorado. Eighty-four percent of Colorado's children live in our 11 largest counties: El Paso, Denver, Arapahoe, Jefferson, Adams, Douglas, Weld, Boulder, Larimer, Pueblo, and Mesa.⁶

Colorado Demographics

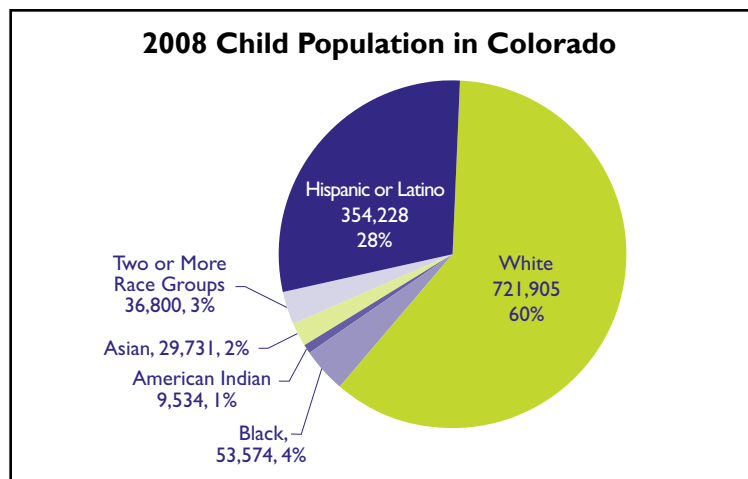
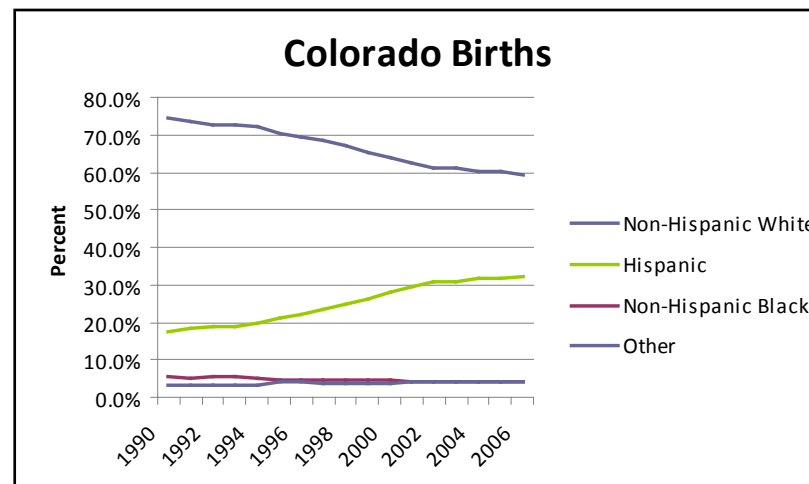


Figure 7: Births by Race/Ethnicity

Colorado enjoys diversity in the culture, race, ethnic background, and language of its children. In 2008, Colorado's child population was made up of almost 30 percent Hispanic and 60 percent non-Hispanic white children (Figure 6).⁷ Like many other states, Colorado's Hispanic birth rate is increasing while the non-Hispanic white birth rate is decreasing (Figure 7).⁸ This trend is expected to continue and result in the minority population surpassing the non-Hispanic white population in the future.

Figure 6: 2008 Number and Percent of the Total Child Population by Race/Ethnicity

Due to higher birth rates among minority populations compared to non-Hispanic white populations nationwide, seven states already have larger minority populations of children under 18 than non-Hispanic white populations. Arizona, California, Hawaii, Maryland, Nevada, New Mexico and Texas all have child populations that are considered "majority-minority," meaning less than 50 percent of the population is non-Hispanic white.⁹ The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that by 2023, minorities will make up more than half of the United States child population.¹⁰

Historically, Colorado has had a large Hispanic population. In the 1980's and 90's, the number of Hispanic families grew with the immigration of Spanish speaking people from numerous countries including Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba and those in South and Central America. By 2008, Colorado had the 6th largest (29 percent) Hispanic or Latino child population in the United States. Compared to other states, Colorado has low black or African-American (four percent) and Asian (two percent) child populations (Figure 6).¹¹

Data Note: The term *Hispanic or Latino* encompasses a wide variety of people from different countries with many historical and cultural differences between them. In many cases, they are similarly classified as *Hispanic or Latino* only because of their connection to the Spanish language. Historically, the term "Hispanic" was used as a statistical term by the U.S. Census and is not considered a formal race category.

Racial/Ethnic group labels in the maps and graphs are reflective of those referenced by the data source. Some data sources, such as the U.S. Census Bureau, do not consider Hispanic a race but an ethnicity. Other sources break out the Hispanic category as they do black, white, and others, including the Colorado Department of Education. Due to these inconsistencies, it is not recommended to compare the data between various data sources.

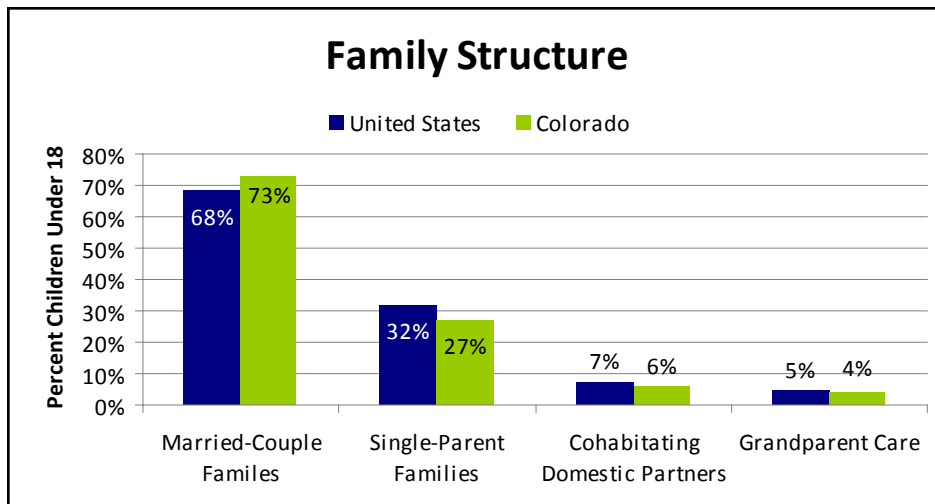
Colorado Families

In 2008, 878,000 children, or 73 percent of children under the age of 18, lived in a married-couple household in Colorado; 319,000 children, or 27 percent, lived in a single-parent household (Figure 8).¹²

The number of children in the care of their grandparents has remained relatively constant since 2000 at around 50,000 children, or four percent, under the age of 18 living in households where grandparents provide primary care.¹³

In 2008, 69,000 children lived with cohabitating domestic partners. This number has increased by 16,000 children, or 30 percent, since 2000.¹⁴

Children in Single-Parent Homes

A certain level of financial and social resources are critical for families and children to thrive and succeed. In general, single-parent households tend to have lower annual household incomes than two-parent households and fewer connections to supporting social networks.¹⁵ Data show there are differences in the percentage of children in single-parent homes by race/ethnicity. Figure 9 illustrates these differences in Colorado's largest racial and ethnic groups.¹⁶

Figure 9: Children in Single-Parent Homes by Race/Ethnicity

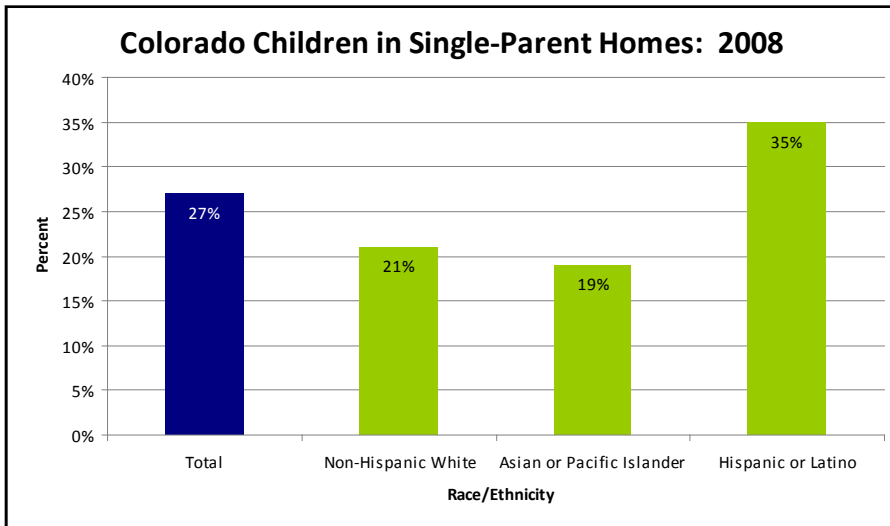
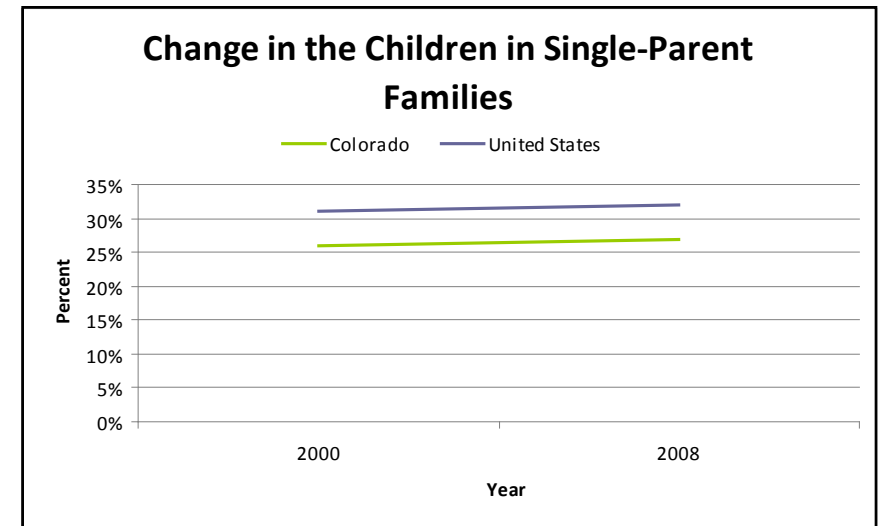


Figure 10: Children in Single-Parent Families



Colorado is below the national average in the percentage of children in single-parent families. In 2008, 27 percent of Colorado children lived in single parent homes compared to 32 percent nationally. Our rate of increase is similar to the U.S. (Figure 10).

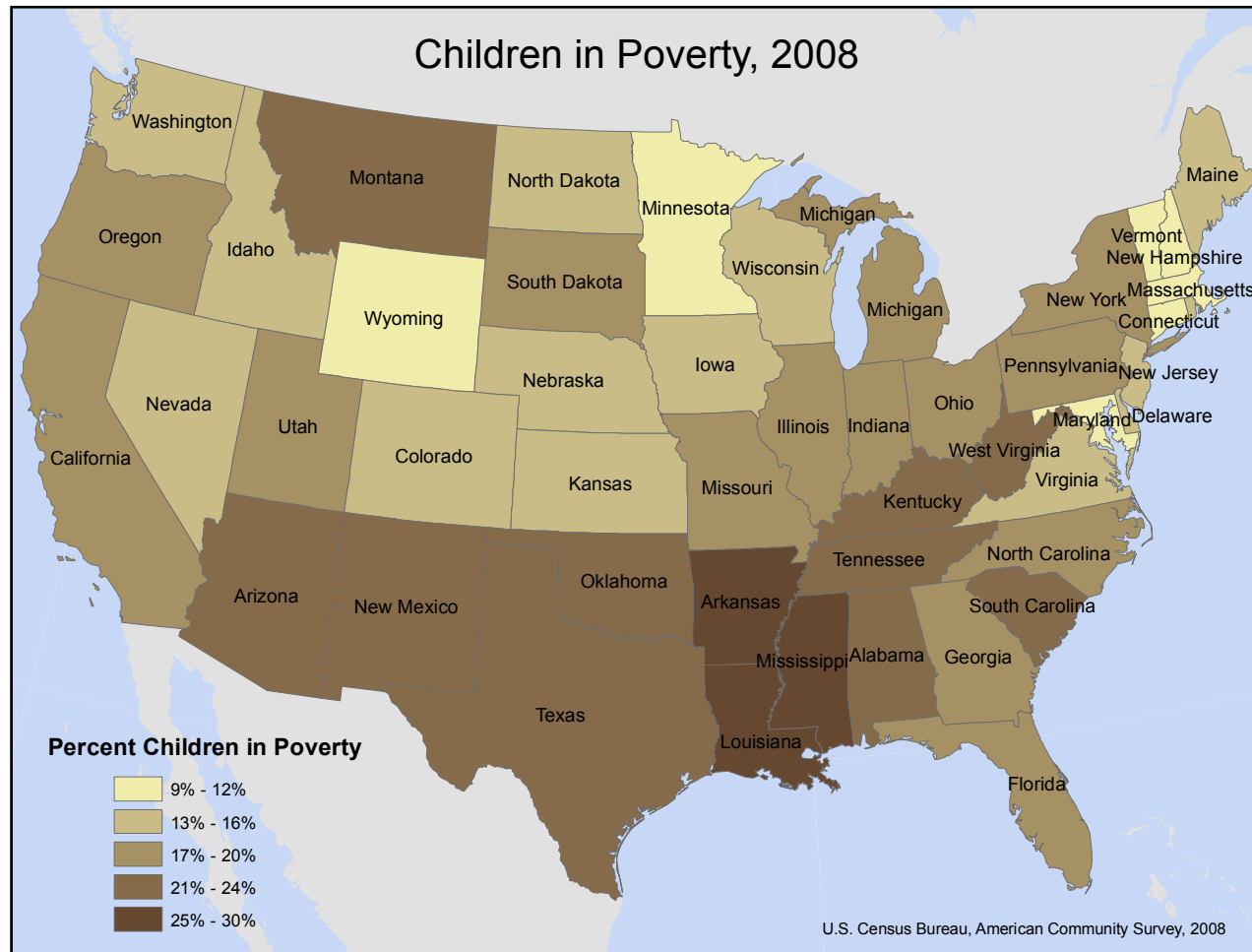

Colorado's Childhood Poverty Picture

Despite the dramatic increase in the number of children in poverty, Colorado still remains below the national average. As of 2008, 15 percent, or 179,000, Colorado children were estimated to be living in poverty; however, with a 72 percent increase in the number of children in poverty since 2000,¹⁷ the state is rapidly approaching the national average and could surpass it if the trend continues.

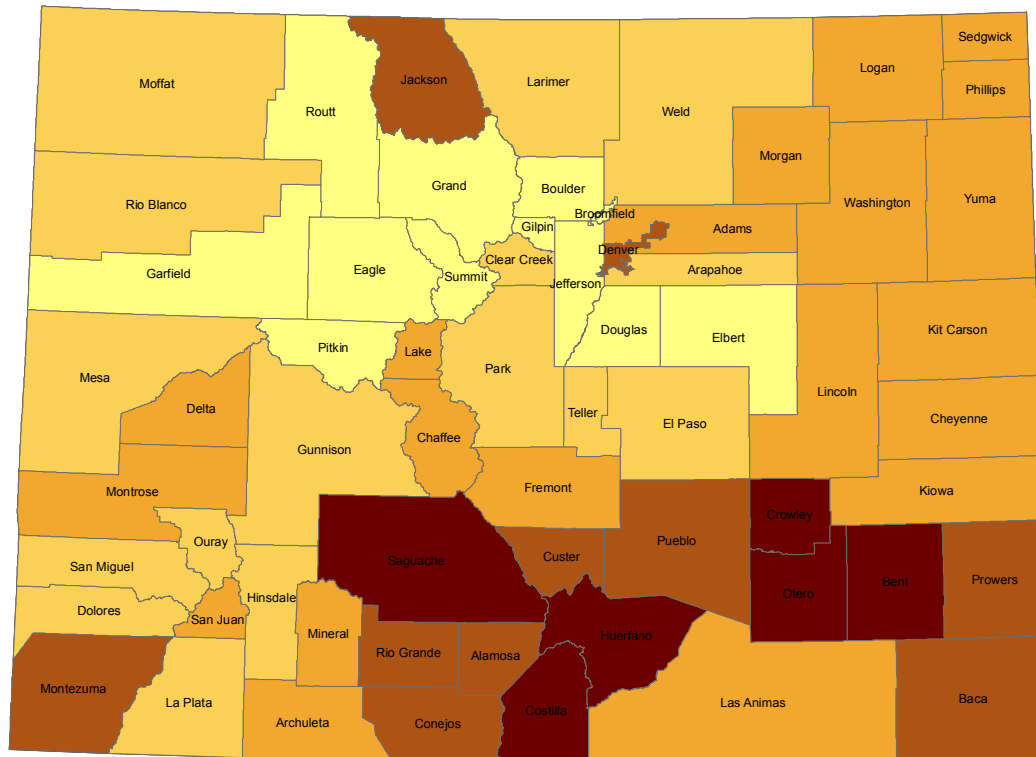
Where are Children in Poverty?

Not every child begins life on equal footing. Where a child lives impacts his or her future opportunities. We know that disadvantages including poverty, unsafe neighborhoods, limited access to health and dental care, under-resourced schools, and lower academic achievement of parents, all contribute to negative outcomes for kids. For kids that live in these families and neighborhoods, obstacles to success are at every corner and safeguards are far and few between. Children faced with so many disadvantages may have difficulty overcoming these barriers to success by themselves.

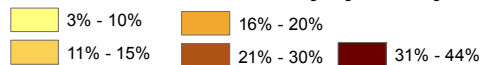
Identifying areas with high poverty rates reveals where children are most likely to be experiencing a multitude of disadvantages. This information also enables policymakers and child advocates to strategically target appropriate interventions and resources so that children and their families have better access to the tools they need to succeed on their own.

In Colorado, the counties with the highest poverty rates are in the San Luis Valley and in the urban core. The greatest number of children in poverty reside in the Denver Metro area with the fastest growth of children in poverty in the suburban counties.

The Growing Numbers of Children in Poverty

In Colorado, an estimated 75,000 more children lived in poverty in 2008 than in 2000. Most of these children lived in six Front Range communities: Adams, Arapahoe, Denver, Boulder, El Paso, and Jefferson. Given that a majority of Colorado's population lives in these communities, the significant numbers of poor children in these areas is anticipated. However, the rates of increase of children living in poverty have grown dramatically in several counties along the Front Range.

The Suburbanization of Poverty: National Shift Reflected in Colorado Data

The city and county of Denver has remained poorer than its suburbs overall. However, since 2000, the increase in the number of poor children (Table 1) in suburban counties (35,152) more than doubled the increase in the number of poor children in Denver (15,441). These numbers not only indicate a greater population in the suburbs than Denver, but they also reflect the growing economic diversity in Denver's suburbs and the growing challenges to the counties as a result.

Colorado's shifting geography of poverty is consistent with national trends. A report from the Brookings Institute states that since 2000, nationwide, "the suburban poor population grew almost five times as fast as the city poor population, so that suburbs are now home to almost 1.9 million more poor people than their primary cities."²⁰ These shifts create an increased demand for services and supports in our suburban areas. Families who are suffering economic stress due to the current recession create a greater demand for safety net and emergency services, including food stamps, Medicaid or Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+) provider locations, application centers for health, welfare, and child care benefits, and transportation. Safety net service providers typically have been concentrated in the urban areas; but as families in the suburbs fall into poverty or move out of Denver into the surrounding suburbs, it is anticipated that accessing these services may be more difficult. Educating parents about how and where to access services in the suburban neighborhoods is a growing challenge, in addition to the increased demand on counties whose resources have not increased in proportion to the demand and whose experience with the related issues is more limited.

The recession is expected to contribute to this growing gap between services and need as people either fall into poverty or move to find work or affordable housing. Identifying where children are currently living in poverty, and where the rate of change in childhood poverty is greatest, are the first steps in developing effective strategies and targeting appropriate resources to reduce these numbers and mitigate the impacts of poverty on children.

Data show the growth of child poverty is not occurring at an equal rate in all counties and is not evenly distributed throughout Colorado. For example, the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) data provides information on school districts across the state. These data show that the number of children eligible for the federal free lunch program increased between 2000 and 2008 (Figure 13). In contrast to the percent of children in poverty, the greatest increases in the number of children now eligible for free lunch are in the communities around Denver, as well as in a few rural counties. Keep in mind this map reflects *change* in the percent of children living in families at or below 130 percent of the federal poverty level.

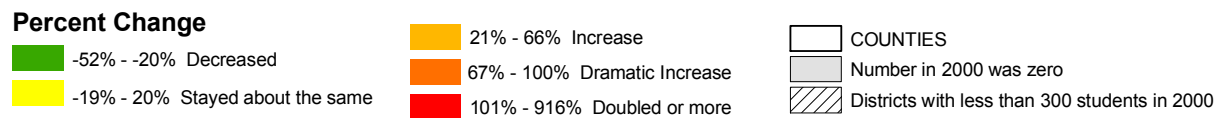
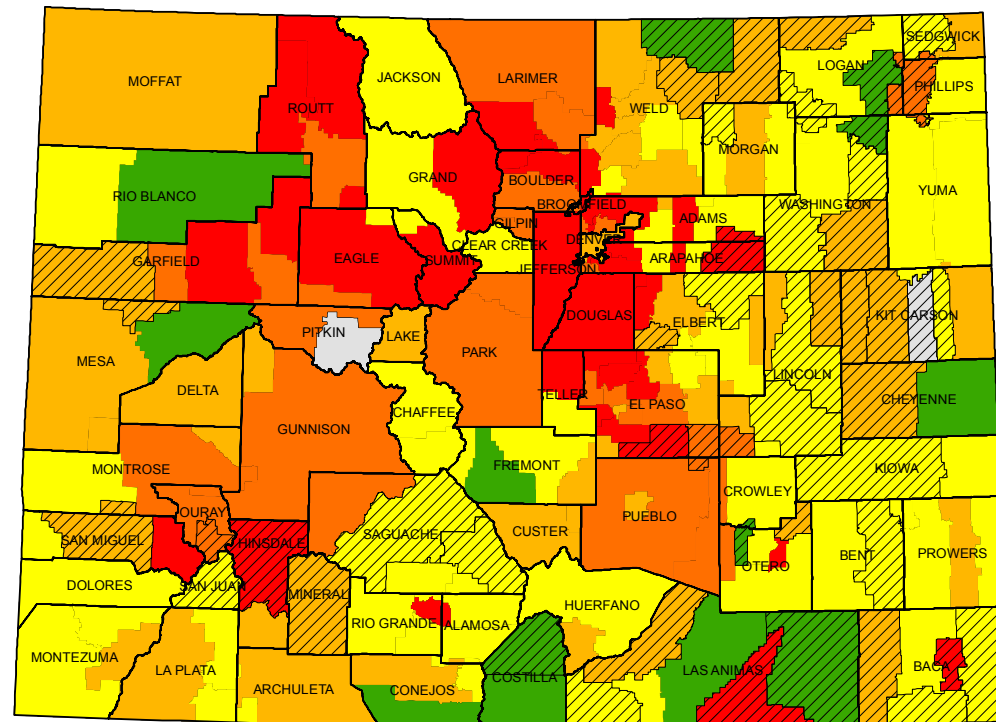
The CDE free lunch data is useful in helping identify where child poverty rates have changed in the last decade. The limited change (yellow) in many rural counties reflects the consistently *high* poverty rates in those communities, with little change in those conditions over time. In some districts, there is a relative decrease (green) in the percent of children qualifying for free lunch. Districts with “hatch” shading indicate those districts with less than 300 students in 2000. The percent change in the number of students eligible for free lunch is more sensitive in these districts due to the low numbers of students who live there.

Statewide, the number of children eligible for *free* lunch has increased by 62 percent, or more than 86,700 children since 2000. The number of students eligible for *reduced* price lunch has increased only slightly during the same period.²²

This information suggests that more children are living in families that are poorer than they were in 2000.²³ The trends identified in both the U.S. Census data and CDE free lunch data are consistent:

- Colorado has an increasing number of children in poverty.
- The fastest growth is taking place in the Denver metro area and in some resort communities.
- The rural counties in the south central and eastern portion of the state have endured high rates of persistent poverty.

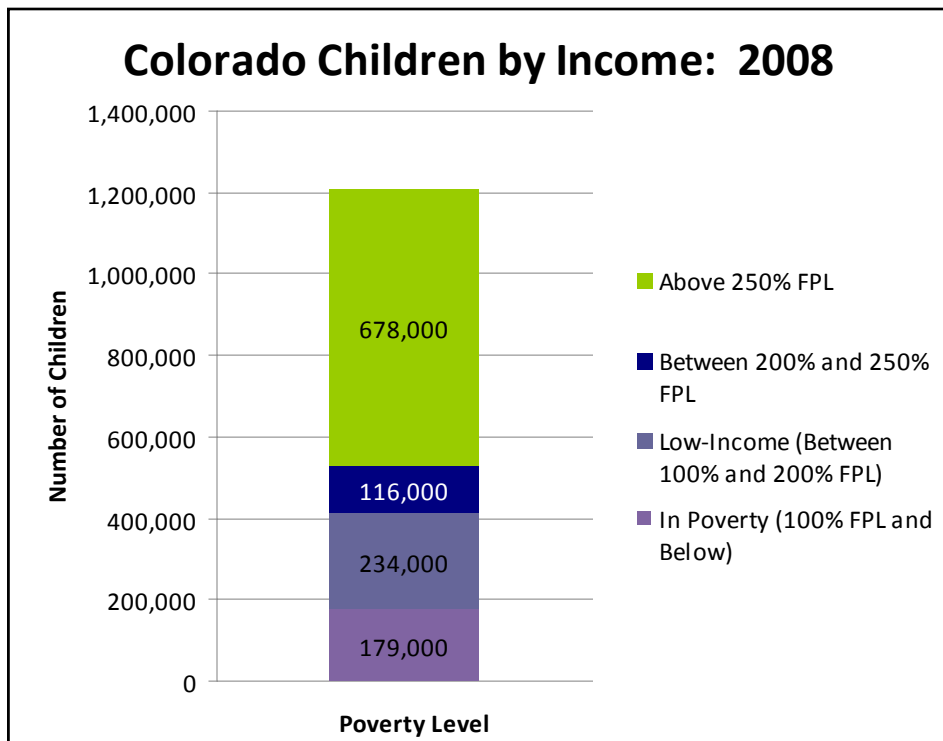
Who are Children in Poverty?

Child Population by Income

In 2008, the number of children in poverty was estimated at 179,000, or 15 percent, of all Colorado children. This number represents a significant increase in the number of children in poverty since 2000, but is still below the national average of 18 percent.²⁴ The delineation of children under the age of 18 by income is illustrated in the Figure 14.

413,000 Colorado children, or 35 percent, are either living in poverty or in low-income families (income below 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level).

Data Note: The data used in the analyses of KIDS COUNT in Colorado! are from the best and most reliable data sources available. They are, however, not without limitations. Many of the data are estimates based on surveys collected by the U.S. Census Bureau. Keep in mind that the numbers and percents used to help explain trends in child well-being are not exact, but estimates derived through statistically valid methods. The details regarding sampling error are available at the U.S. Census Bureau website.

Every year, the data collection methods improve and data are available to more people quickly. However, most of these data are one to two years old and do not reflect the full effects of the current economic crisis.

Some data are unavailable for small populations due to sample size errors. For example, the data for the American Indian population are often excluded from Colorado racial disaggregation due to low population numbers.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) issues annual guidelines defining the level of income at the poverty line for the United States (Table 3). A percentage of the federal poverty level is frequently used to determine eligibility for social service programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (food stamps) and free or reduced price lunch programs. This measure of poverty is widely recognized as outdated and inadequate and does not account for changes in the cost of living from place to place. According to more realistic estimates, families need approximately twice the official poverty level to meet basic needs for their families (200 percent of poverty as indicated in Table 3).²⁷

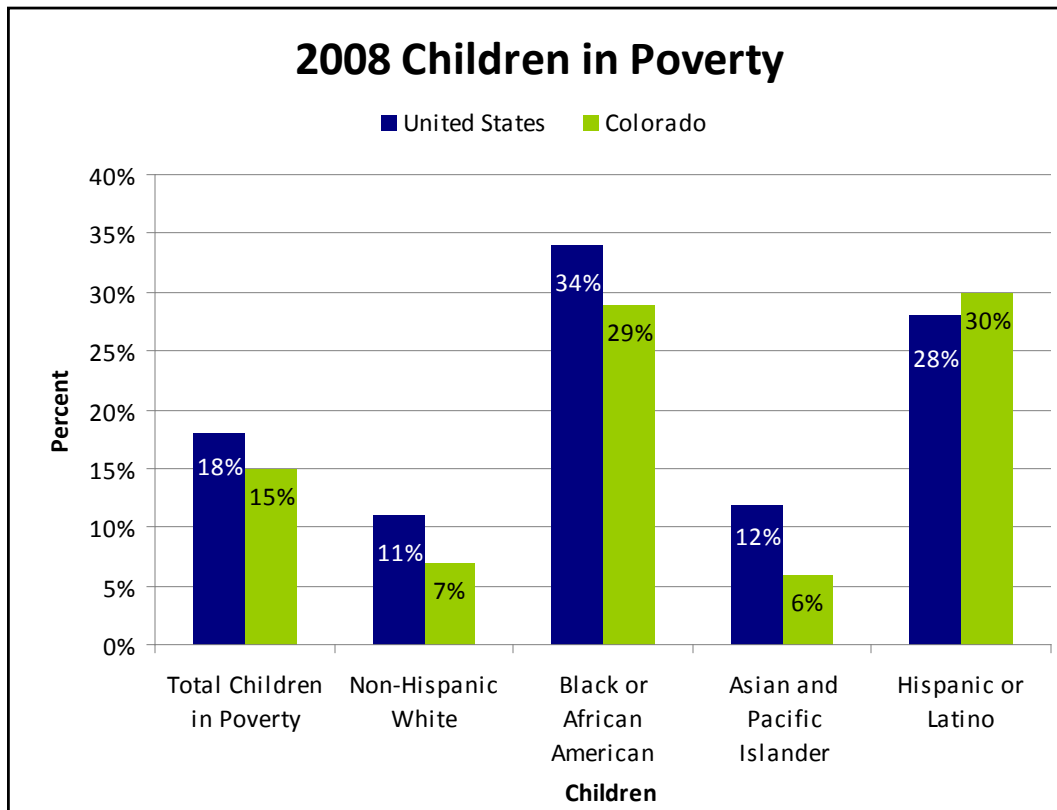
The Consumer Price Index (CPI) provides the basis for how the guidelines are determined each year. For the first time since the measure was devised, the CPI for 2010 is less than the previous year. This means that the poverty guidelines for 2010 would be less than the 2009 guidelines resulting in fewer people eligible for services based on this measure. Understanding the negative effects on children and families, the federal government will not issue the 2010 poverty guidelines until at least March, 2010. Until new poverty guidelines are set, the 2009 guidelines will remain in effect.

Children in Poverty by Race/Ethnicity

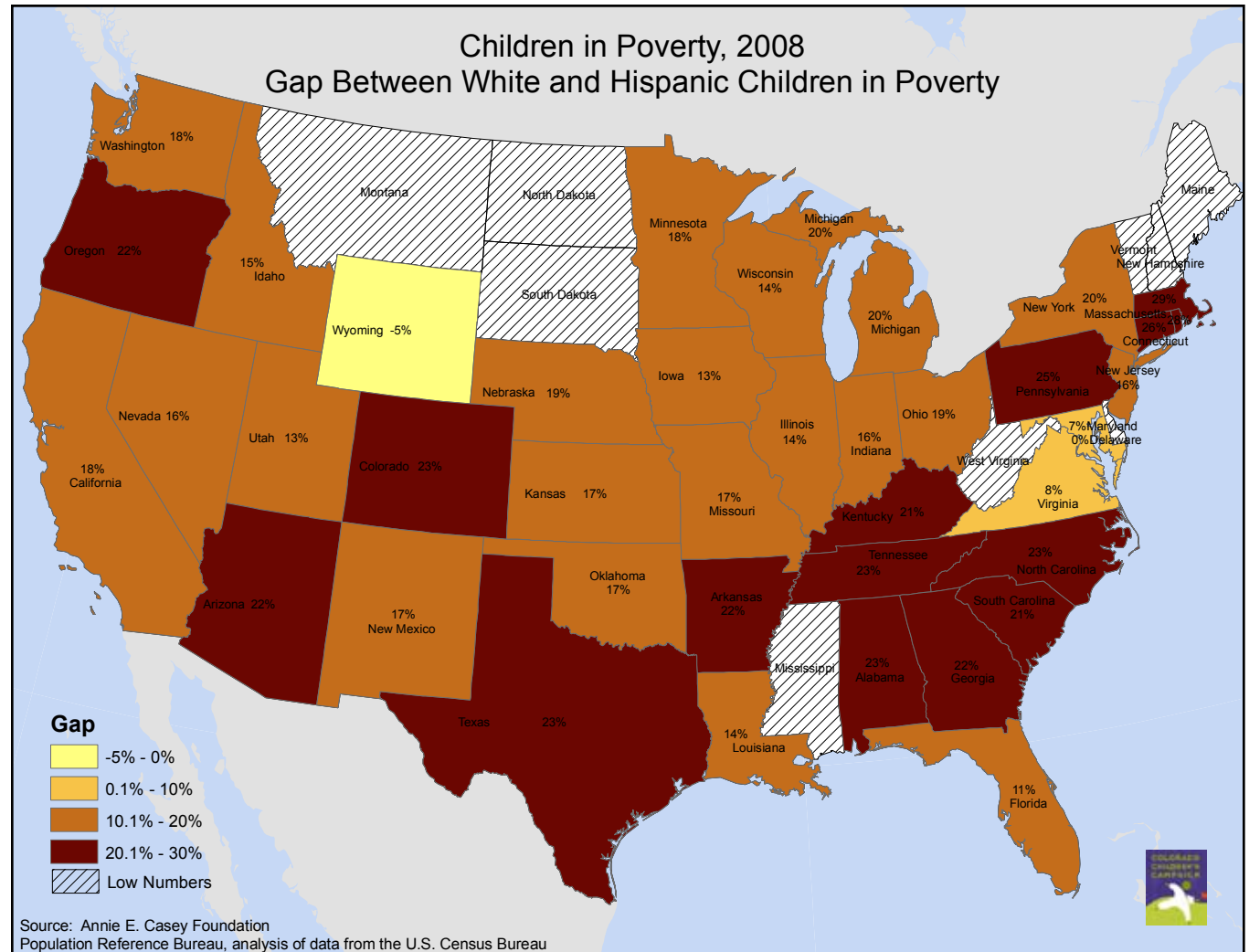
Figure 15: Percent of Children in Poverty by Race/Ethnicity

In the United States, black, Hispanic and American Indian children live in poverty more often than Asian or non-Hispanic white children. Children in Colorado follow the same trends but have lower poverty rates than the national average in all race/ethnic groups except Hispanic (Figure 15). The percentage of Hispanic children in poverty in Colorado surpasses the national average. Of the states with a large Hispanic population (41 states with available data), Colorado has the fifth largest gap between non-Hispanic white children in poverty and Hispanic children in poverty.²⁸

Figure 16: Gap Between White and Hispanic Children in Poverty



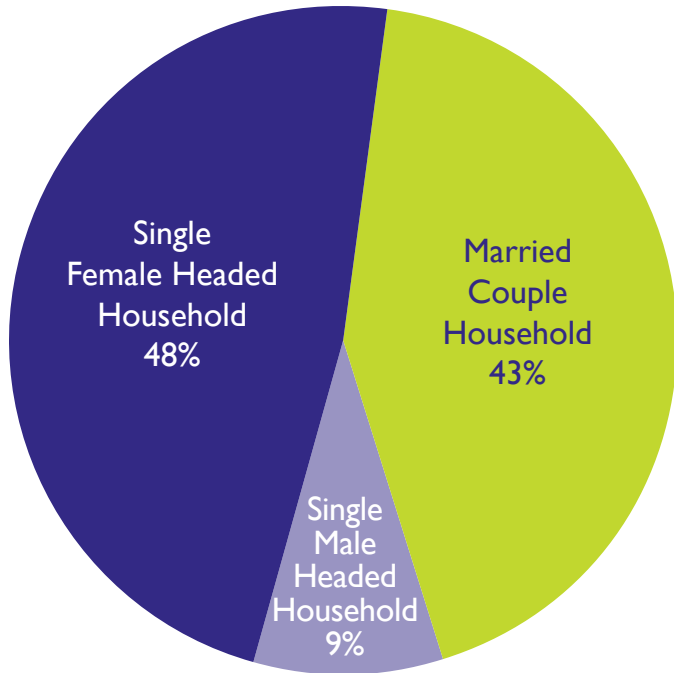
Some states have high rates of poverty for all children. Other states, including Colorado, experience high rates of poverty for ethnic minorities. The gap between white and Hispanic children in poverty, however, is larger in some states than others as illustrated in Figure 16. Colorado, along with Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut and Texas has poverty levels below the national average for all children except Hispanic children.²⁹

Which Family Types are in Poverty?

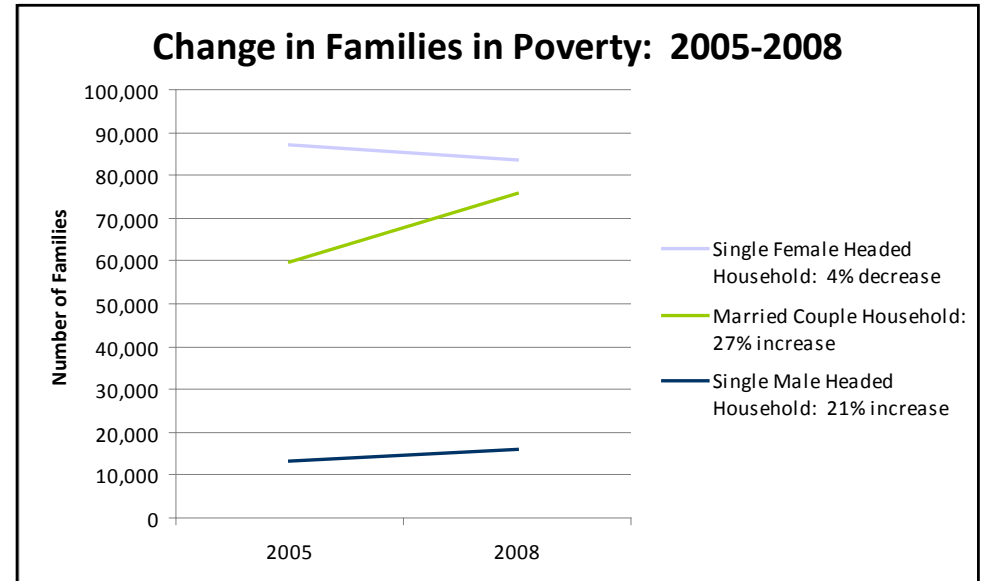
Although children in minority families are more likely to live in poverty than their white peers, Colorado families of all ethnic/racial groups and in all family types have experienced difficult economic challenges in recent years. For example, in 2008, 43 percent of all families in poverty were headed by married couples.³⁰

The economic challenges facing Colorado families impacted poverty rates long before the beginnings of the current recession. This trend is reflected in our overall growth in the rate of childhood poverty and in the change in poverty status for Colorado families. As illustrated in the graph below, married couple families have the greatest increase in poverty of all family types, with an increase of 27 percent from 2005-2008 (Figure 18).³¹

Health

The gaps between Coloradans who face more health risks than those who do not occur most often based on ethnicity, the rural or urban nature of a community, or poverty. Many times these three overlap for a given population, for example, some areas of the state are highly Hispanic, rural, and experience high rates of poverty, therefore, these populations would be more likely to experience significant health risks.

Resulting health outcomes are manifest from these risks in four ways: First, with regard to physical location, some groups of people might live in communities with few grocery stores available and are therefore less likely to have healthy food options available to them. Second, economic and social conditions of a community might be volatile due to a change in the community's industry or because it is persistently low-income. Third, barriers exist for certain groups as they try to enter into the health care delivery system; for example, some groups are less likely to be able to find high-paying jobs that offer health insurance, so they remain uninsured. Finally, the quality of health care for populations is affected if systems and providers are not culturally responsive to the community with which they are working.

Consistently, research finds that living in poverty negatively impacts a child's social, cognitive, emotional, behavioral and physical well-being from birth into adulthood.³² For example, poor children are more likely to be low-birth weight and suffer from nutritional deficiencies. Poverty is also strongly associated with obesity in children. Health issues in childhood often translate into chronic conditions such as asthma, anemia or diabetes as children get older, which has very real implications for overall health care systems. In addition, adolescents living in poverty are more likely to engage in risky, health compromising activities such as smoking or having unprotected sex—activities that may have life-long consequences.³³

These factors, when combined with others like housing costs, access to transportation and jobs, and other social and economic indicators, point to the fact that some families live in communities that are considered healthier than other communities. To help illustrate how healthy a particular community is, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, in partnership with the University of Wisconsin, created a county-by-county ranking of overall health for every county in the country. This ranking provides a snapshot of how a community is doing and allows for comparisons with other communities. Over 275,000 Colorado children, or 22 percent, live in the healthiest counties in Colorado. Almost 360,000 Colorado children, or 29 percent, live in counties with numerous factors that contribute to unhealthy environments (Figure 19).

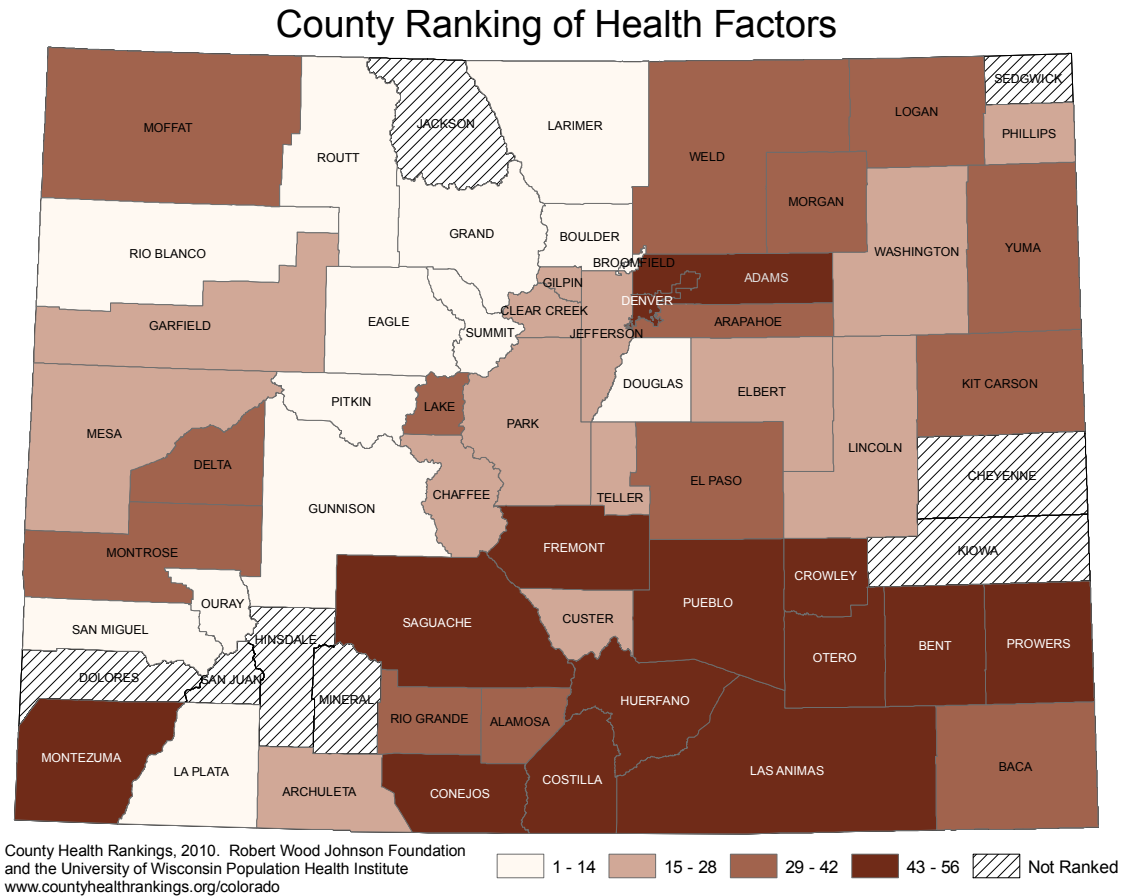

In areas of high poverty or when several risk factors occur together, negative health outcomes for children are more likely.³⁵ For example, a child born to an unmarried mother has a greater chance of living in poverty. The same is true for a child born to a mother under the age of 25 or a child born to a mother who did not complete high school. When a child is born to a mother with all three risk factors—unmarried, under 25 years of age and without a high school diploma—that child is much more vulnerable to living in poverty, dropping out of school, giving birth out of wedlock, suffering from chronic disease and dependent upon public services.

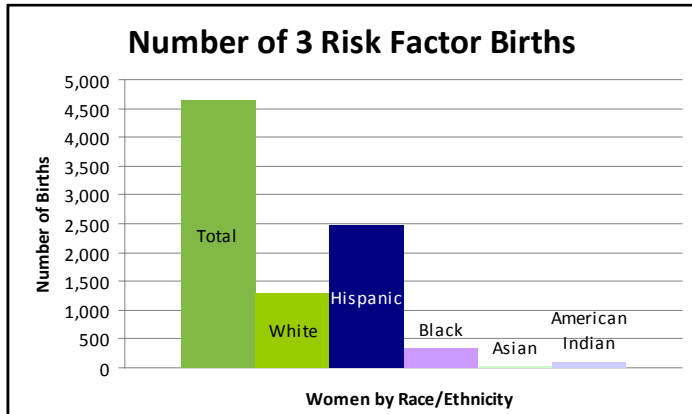
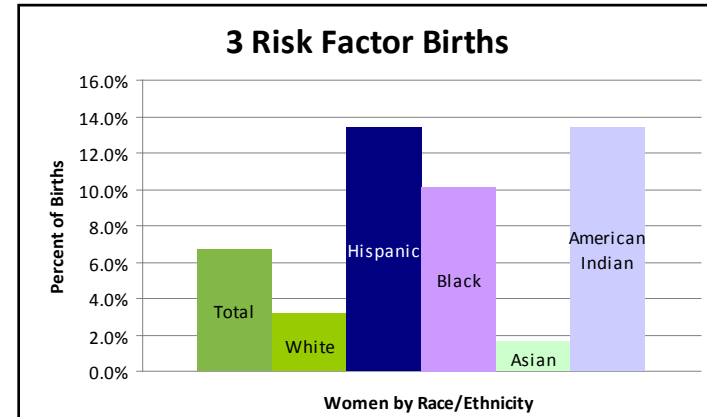


Figure 21: Percent 3 Risk Factor Births

The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) provides information on the number and percent of births born to women who are unmarried, under 25 and do not have a high school diploma (Figures 20 and 21).

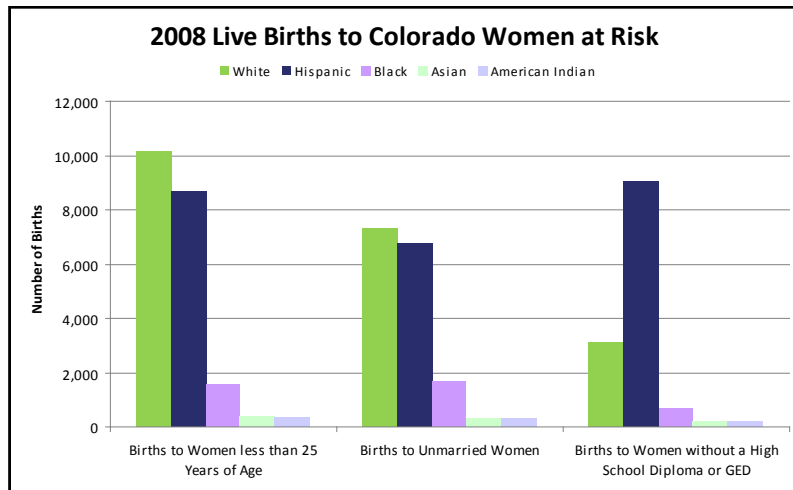
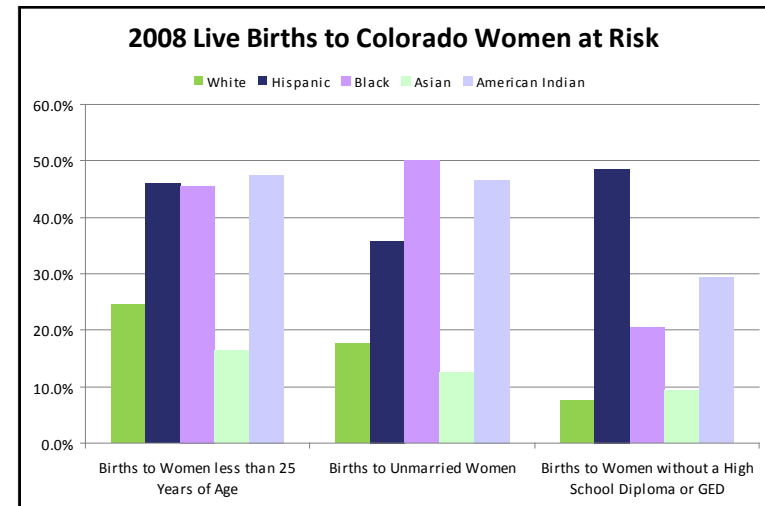


Figure 23: Percent At-Risk Births

Overall, 6.7 percent or 4,639 babies were born to three-risk factor moms in 2008. As Figure 21 and 23 show however, Hispanic, American Indian and black moms with three risk factors are disproportionately represented.³⁶

Figure 20: Number of 3 Risk Factor Births

In 2008, there were 70,028 live births in Colorado. Nearly one-third of live births were to women under the age of 25; slightly fewer were born to unmarried women (25 percent) or women without a high school diploma (21 percent). Overall, more white babies were born to women under the age of 25 or born to unmarried women. More Hispanic babies were born to women without a high school diploma compared to other race/ethnic groups (Figure 22).

Figure 22: Number of At-Risk Births

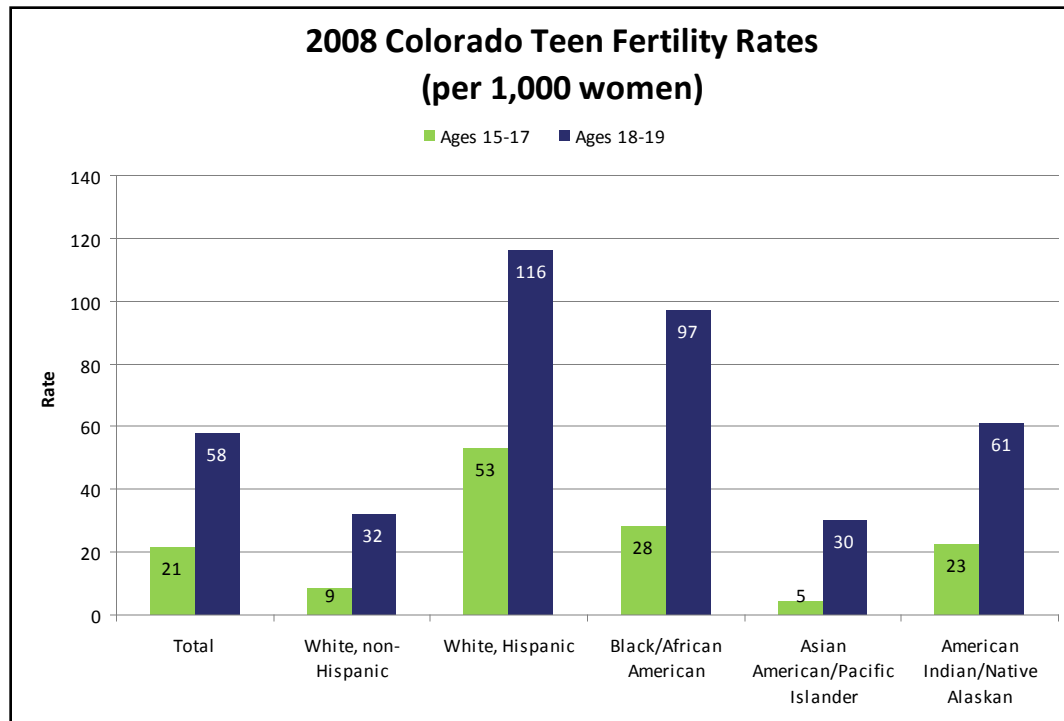


Children born to teen mothers face unique challenges. Young parents are often not as emotionally and socially prepared to care for a child as parents over the age of 25. Young parents face the challenges of relationships; lack of resources; adjustment to a new, lifelong responsibility; and their own continued development. All of these stressors place young parents at increased risk of depression and instability, hindering a parent's ability to bond appropriately with a child, which can result in a decrease of overall resiliency throughout a child's life.

In addition, teen moms are less likely to complete high school or go to college, resulting in lower earning potential and a greater chance of ending up in poverty. Without adequate financial resources, teen mothers are less able to provide necessary financial and educational resources for their children as they grow.³⁷

Colorado had the 19th highest rate in the nation for teen births in 2006 for teens ages 15-19.³⁸ Data from the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment provides us with more current numbers on teen births disaggregated by race and ethnicity. For 2008, the birth rates for Hispanic teens are as much as three and a half times higher than white non-Hispanic teens in Colorado.

Figure 24: Teen Birth Rate³⁹



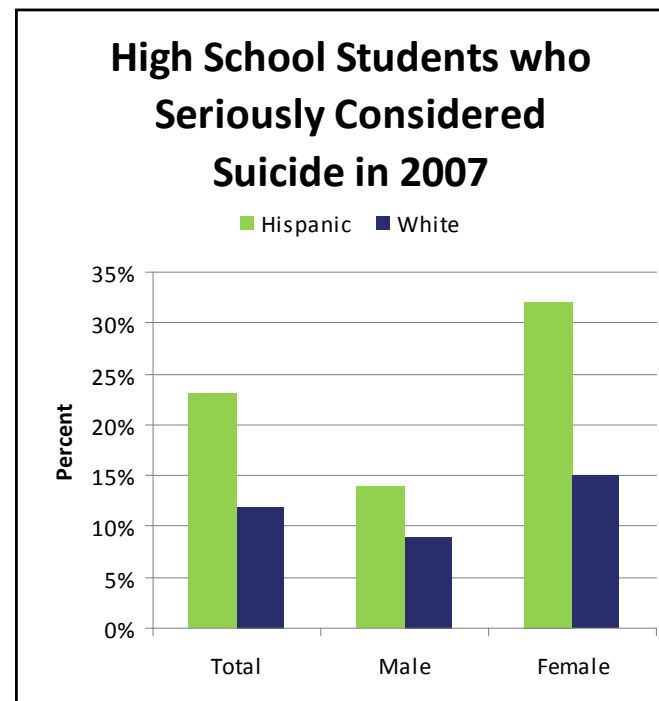

The feelings of hopelessness and overwhelming stress that some of our high school children experience is reflected in the percentage of children who seriously considered suicide in 2007 in Colorado. According to the 2007 Youth Risk Behavior Survey, more than 16 percent of high school students considered suicide. Hispanic students considered suicide two times more often than white students. Among females, over 32 percent of Hispanic girls considered suicide. This number is more than twice the percentage of white girls (15 percent).⁴⁰

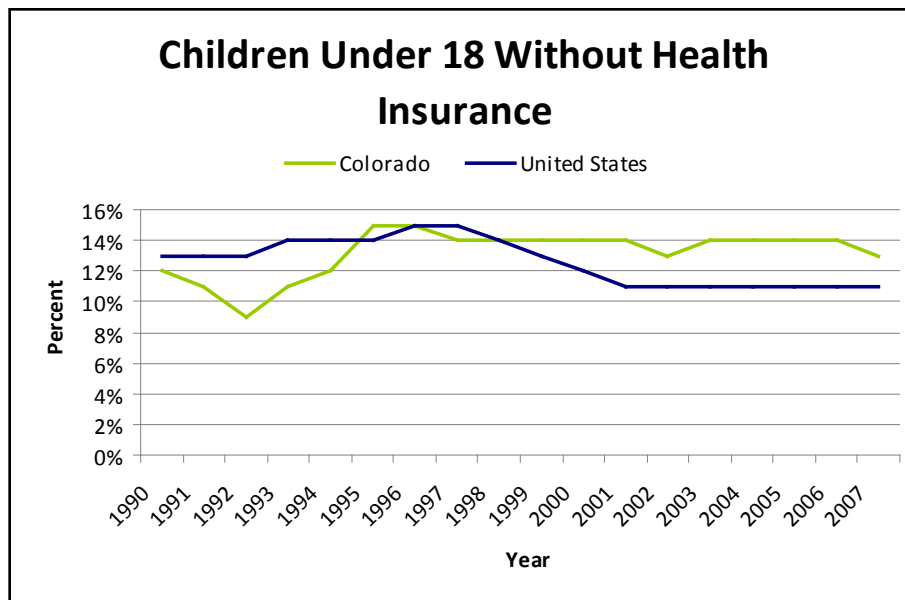
Health Insurance

Health insurance is important for accessing health care services such as prenatal care, well-child check-ups and mental health treatment. For people living in poverty, health insurance can be difficult to obtain for a number of reasons—most people receive health insurance through their employer, and as increasing numbers of employers pass more of the costs onto families or drop benefits all together, more families and children lose insurance.

There are limited options for securing health insurance for children when a family loses employer-based benefits. A family with greater economic resources may temporarily continue employer health benefits (COBRA) that cover the entire family by paying the total cost of the premium—the average annual family premium in 2008 was \$12,680.⁴¹ Another option is to purchase health insurance directly from an insurer. While less costly, individual benefits are not always as comprehensive as employer-based benefits.⁴² It is also important to note that in the past year, as families have lost employer-sponsored insurance, the state Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+) and Medicaid programs, which provide insurance coverage for low-income Colorado kids, have seen an increase in caseload.

When parents lose employer-based coverage, cannot afford or are unable to obtain insurance directly from an insurer, or find barriers to accessing CHP+ or Medicaid, many children fall into the ranks of the uninsured.

Since the late 1990s, Colorado has had a higher percentage of uninsured children compared to the nation as a whole. In 2007, 12 percent or 161,000 Colorado children were not covered by health insurance at any point during the year (Figure 26).⁴³

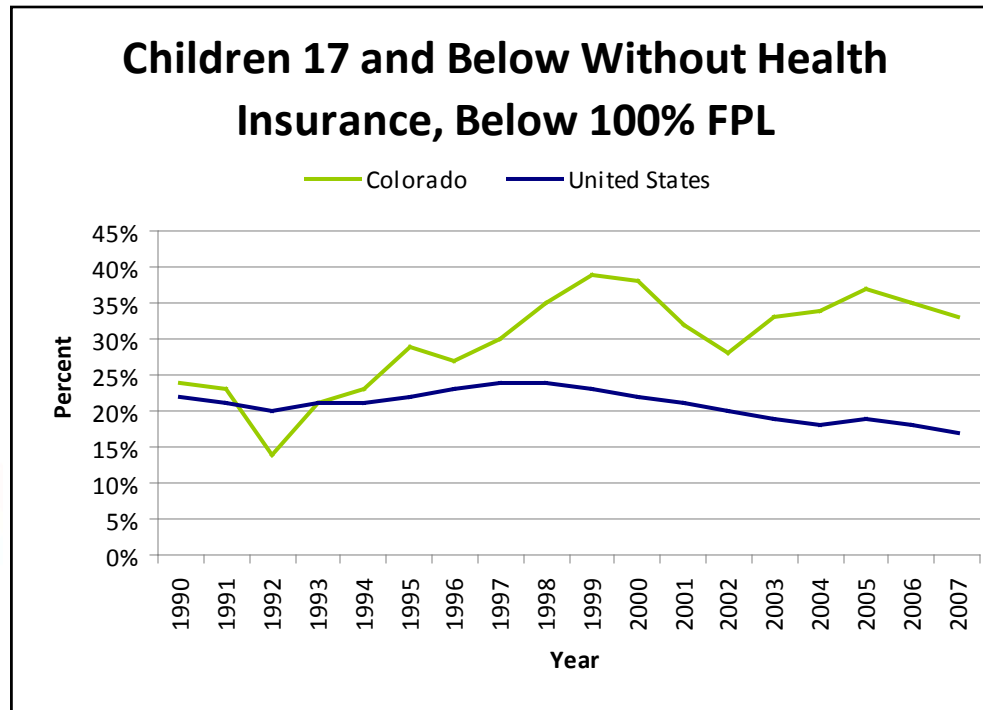

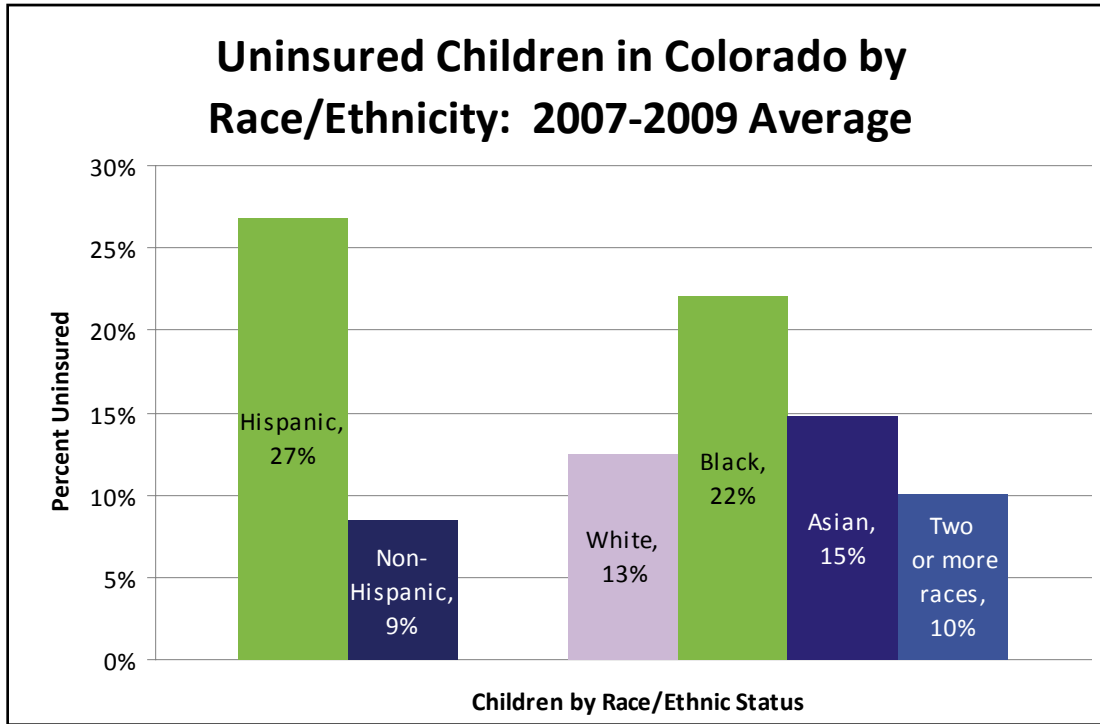
Figure 27: Uninsured Children in Poverty

Although Medicaid and CHP+ are available to low-income children and families, many qualified children are not enrolled. Figure 27 shows the percent of kids aged 17 and younger who are at or below 100 percent of FPL but are not enrolled in a public health insurance plan.

As in previous years Colorado ranked among the worst in the nation, or 49th, in insuring children living in poverty. As of 2007, 33 percent of poor children were uninsured compared to 17 percent nationally.⁴⁴

Uninsured poor children are disproportionately of Hispanic origin. In fact, Hispanic children are three times more likely to be uninsured than non-Hispanic children. Black children are almost twice as likely to be uninsured than white children (Figure 28).⁴⁵

The disproportionate rate of uninsured Hispanic and black children is related to the insurance rates of their parents-children rely on their parents for coverage. Studies show that if parents are uninsured, they not only delay care for themselves they are also less likely to take their children in for checkups or enroll them in public health insurance plans. Delaying health care often results in more severe symptoms and unnecessary hospitalizations for preventable and treatable conditions. Uninsured children are also less likely to have regular dental checkups or to receive follow-up care.

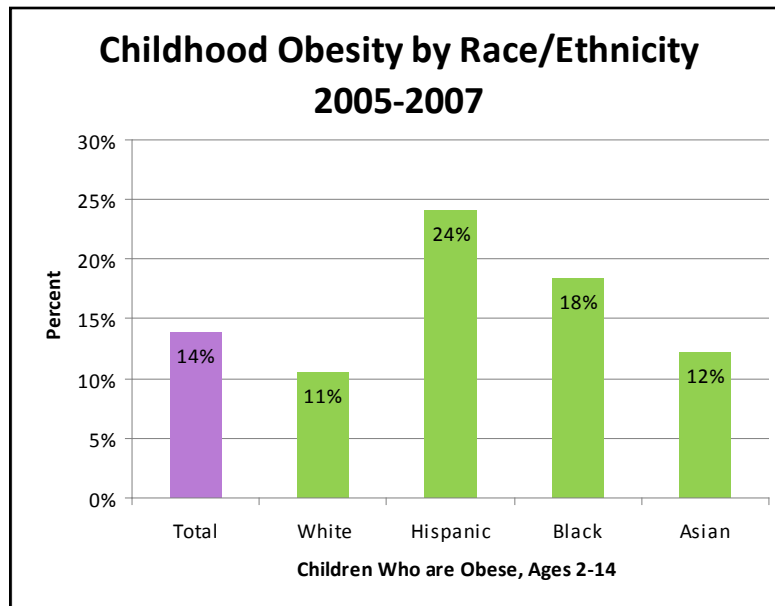
Childhood Obesity

Being obese as a child increases the likelihood of becoming obese as an adult. Moreover, obese children and adolescents are at greater risk for developing heart disease, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and type 2 diabetes. Obese children are also more likely to experience low self-esteem and depression. Additionally, Hispanic and black children are more likely than white or Asian children to be overweight and are also less likely to have health insurance.⁴⁶

The prevalence of childhood obesity in Colorado varies greatly by race and ethnicity. From 2005 to 2007, 14 percent of all Colorado children were obese. Although obesity has increased for all children and adolescents, data show that there are substantial disparities between racial/ethnic groups.

The following chart compares the prevalence of obesity for children ages 2 to 14 by racial/ethnic groups. Children are considered obese when their body mass index (BMI) is at or above the 95th percentile.

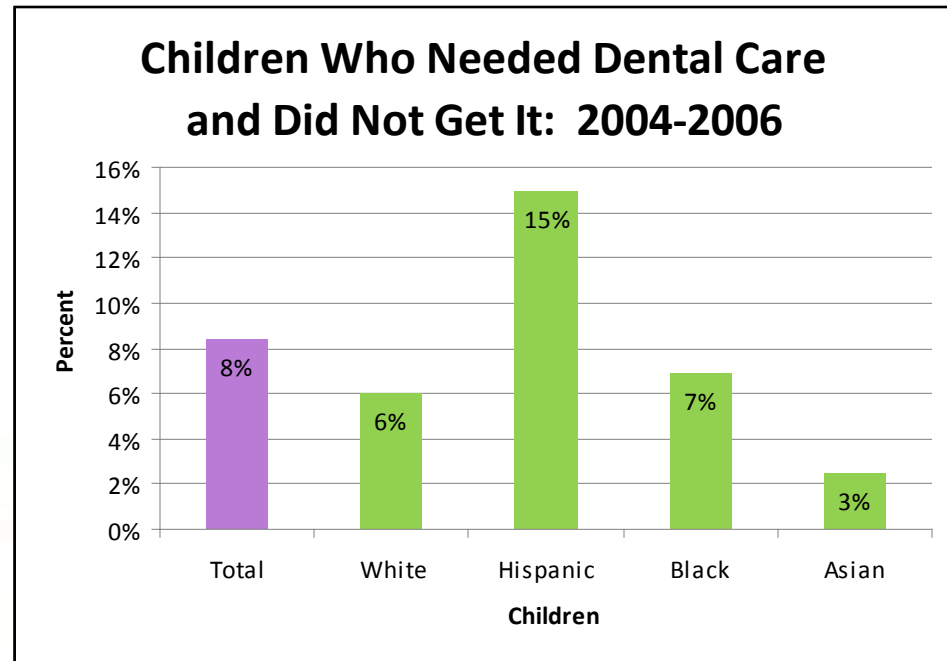

Oral Health

Oral health is an essential component of overall health care for children. Although child dental health has improved nationally over the last 50 years, lack of access to dental care is a problem that many states have to address. Low-income children are especially affected by the lack of access to dental care, as there remains a shortage in the number of dental care providers willing to provide services to children on Medicaid and CHP+. While overall data trends on access to dental care in Colorado are encouraging, a closer look at the data when broken down by race, indicates that gaps exist in the access to care:

Lack of access to dental care is a problem disproportionately impacting Colorado's Hispanic children (15 percent), who are more than two times as likely than both white (6 percent) and black (7 percent) children, and five times more likely than an Asian (3 percent) child to need dental care but not receive it. This lack of access of dental care will have long-term implications for the dental and overall health of children.

Child Care

A key component of child school-readiness and parental economic stability is the availability and access to high-quality child care. Quality care provides young children with a safe, stable and developmentally appropriate environment while giving parents a consistent care arrangement while they work. High-quality child care is important for all children but of particular importance to low-income families and families living in poverty because these parents experience the greatest instability in employment. This is especially prevalent now given the current economic recession.

Securing stable and affordable child care is critical for working parents. While affordability is a greater challenge for lower-income parents, higher-income parents also struggle to pay for child care. The National Women’s Law Center⁴⁹ reports that families in poverty spend an average of 29 percent of their income on child care. Families living between 100 and 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level pay an average of 14 percent. In contrast, higher-income families spend less than 6 percent of their income on child care expenses.

The cost and capacity of child care in Colorado continue to limit many families’ access to care. The cost of care represents a significant percentage of the median family income, and paying for such care limits a family’s ability to provide other essential family needs. The cost of child care (both child care centers and family child care homes) in Colorado is among the highest in the country.⁵⁰

Education

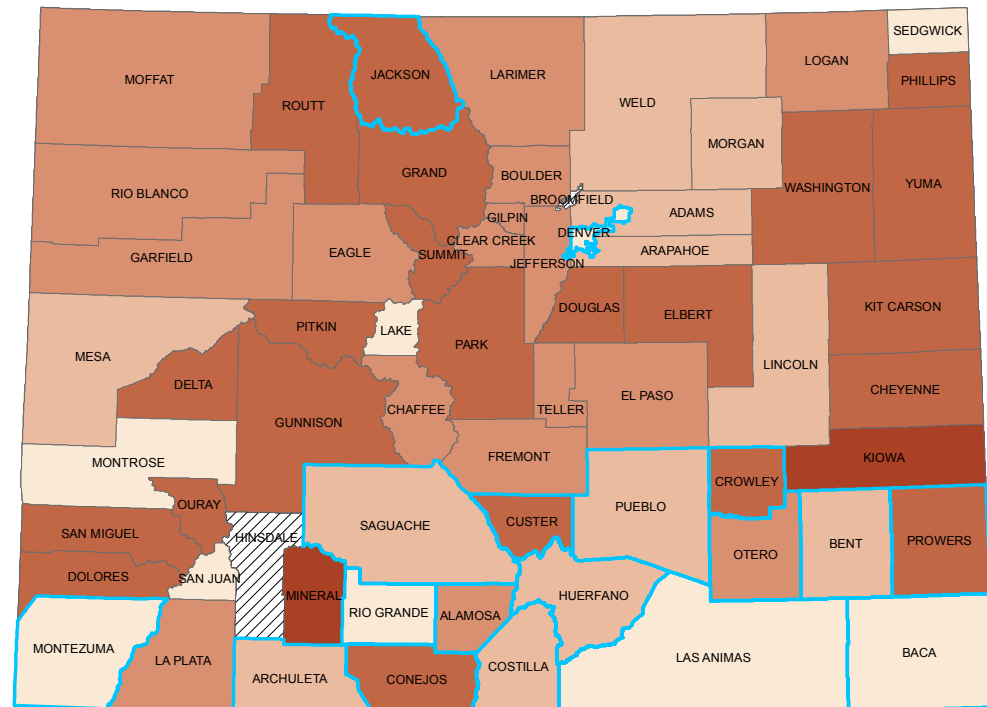
Quality child care, preschool and full-day Kindergarten are developmental stepping stones to a child's educational success. Family characteristics such as parental involvement, the educational attainment of parents and neighborhood characteristics such as safety, close proximity to grocery stores and access to quality health care are important supports for children so they can be effective learners.⁵¹

School characteristics are also important in promoting student success. Studies have found that smaller classes, individualized support, better teachers, challenging curricula and modern learning facilities, among other factors, make a difference in helping children succeed academically.⁵² Ensuring that every child in Colorado has the best opportunity to learn and achieve to their full potential means a better future for Colorado.

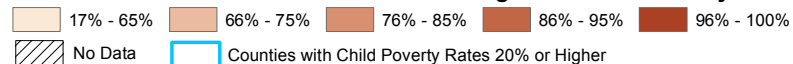
Poverty is often a barrier to opportunity and is reflected in Colorado's graduation rates. In the map below, the counties outlined in blue are those in which the child poverty rate is at or above 20 percent. Notably, counties with high poverty rates typically have lower graduation rates.

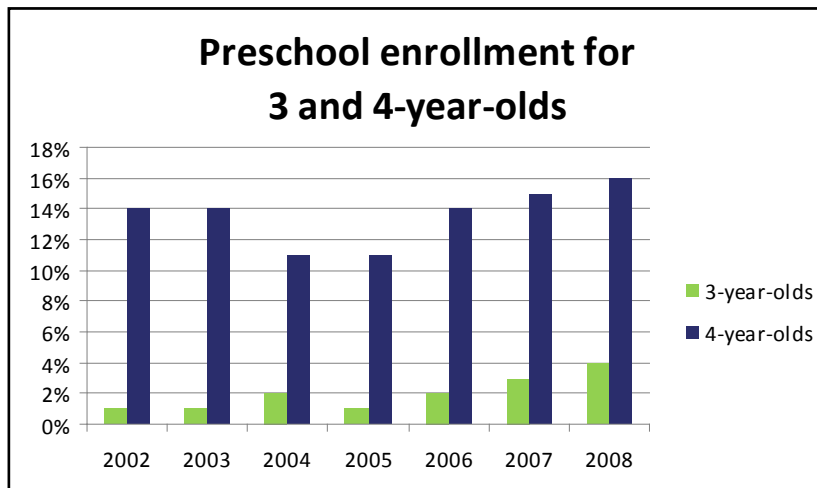

Preschool

Education is one of the best ways to ensure children grow up with the skills they need to find and keep good jobs, support a family and contribute to their communities in positive ways. Research has shown that access to high-quality preschool improves student achievement outcomes for children and helps close achievement gaps.⁵³ It is particularly important for minority and low-income students to enroll in preschool before age four, as both groups are more likely to enter school not prepared to learn.

Colorado ranks 12th in preschool access for 3-year-olds and 23rd in access for 4-year-olds.⁵⁴

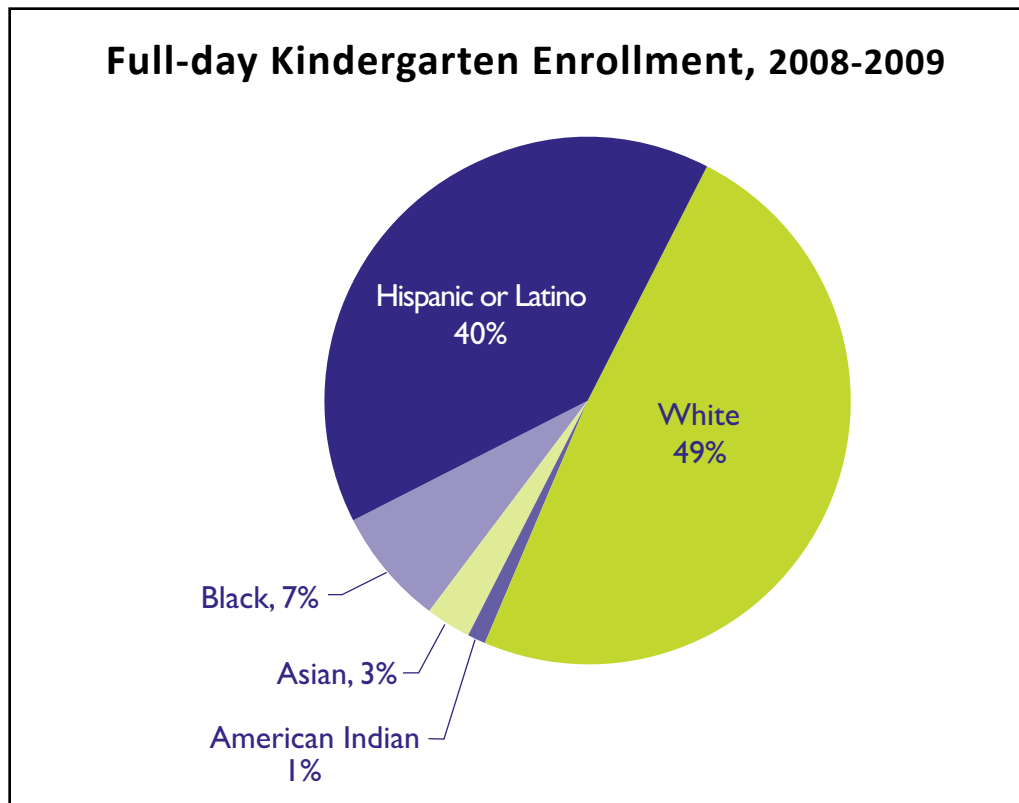

Full-day Kindergarten

For working families with school-aged children, high-quality full-day kindergarten provides enriching educational opportunities for children and care services for parents that might not otherwise be available. The benefit of full-day kindergarten programs is that parental child care costs are usually reduced and, children experience less disruption and more continuity because parents do not have to shuffle children between home, school and other child care arrangements.⁵⁵

Several studies show that full-day kindergarten has cognitive and social benefits for children. For instance, children attending high-quality full-day kindergarten tend to perform at higher levels in reading and math⁵⁶ and transition more easily into first grade compared to children in low-quality, part-day kindergarten programs.⁵⁷ In 2009, 60 percent of Colorado's kindergartners attended a full-day program.⁵⁸

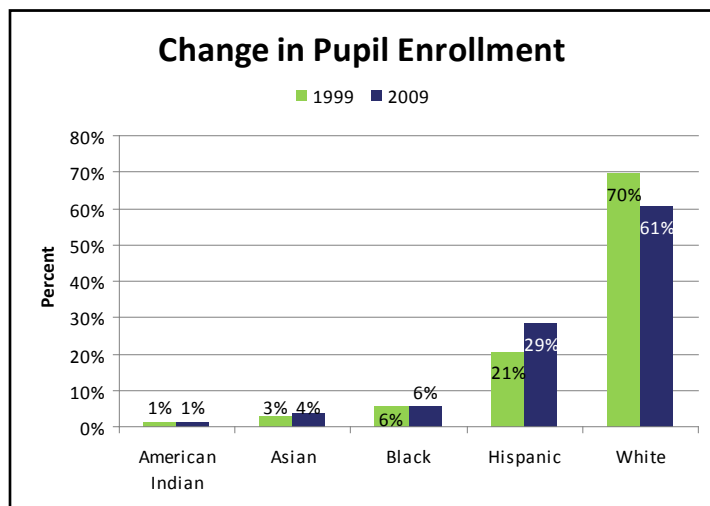

Enrollment in Colorado Schools

The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) reports that Colorado's student enrollment has increased almost 18 percent since 1999. In 2009, the total number of students was 832,368.

The majority of students enrolled in Colorado's public schools are white (61 percent). The fastest growing populations of students are Hispanic and Asian. According to CDE statistics, 147,447 Hispanic students were enrolled in public schools in 1999 and 237,797 enrolled in 2009. Similarly, there were 19,792 Asian students in 1999 and 30,820 in 2009. The number of black students has also increased from 40,156 students in 1999 to 49,413 in 2009. Figure 34 reflects the changing demographics in our public school population.⁵⁹

Colorado students enjoy a variety of options when choosing a school to meet a child's specific needs. In addition to an *open enrollment* option, where a parent can choose for their child to attend a district school outside of their attendance area, a family has the option to home-school their child or enroll their child in a public charter school, a neighborhood school, or a private school.

According to CDE-maintained data:

- In 2009-10, Colorado's statewide online student enrollment increased 12.5 percent over the previous school year, bringing the total number of students to 13,093.⁶⁰ Online programs attract a high percentage of students who have encountered problems in traditional school settings.⁶¹
- Colorado had 141 charter schools serving 56,188 students or 6.9 percent of total school enrollment statewide in 2007-2008. Minority students made up 37 percent of enrollment and 25 percent of students qualified for free or reduced lunch. Since 2004, charter school enrollment increased 52 percent. According to the CDE, if all charter schools were "combined into an imaginary district, the enrollment of that district would be the fourth largest in the state."⁶²
- Students enrolled in home schooling increased from 6,335 in 2005 to 6,684 in 2008. In 2009, however, enrollment decreased slightly to 6,501 students.⁶³

Student Achievement

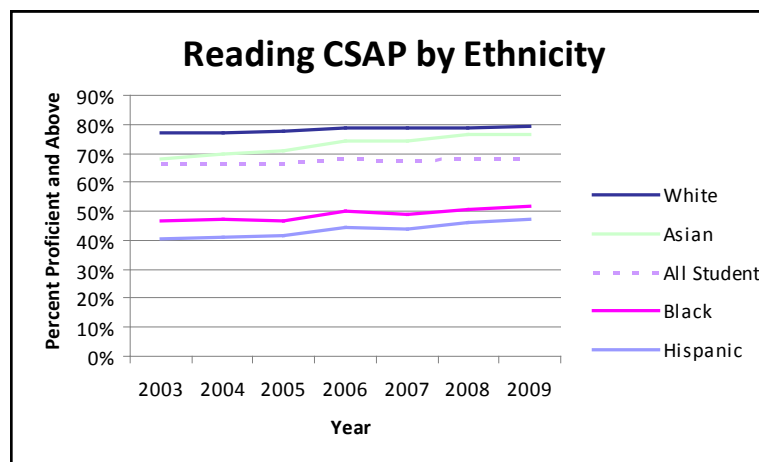
Colorado uses several measurement tools to assess academic standards and student achievement in K-12. The most well known is the Colorado Student Assessment Program (CSAP). The CSAP is designed to provide a picture of student performance and determine the level at which Colorado students meet the Colorado academic standards.

In addition to the CSAP, state education leaders created the Colorado Growth Model. This is a statistical model to calculate each student's progress on state assessments. It shows how individual students progress from year to year toward state standards. A CDE analysis of the 2007 to 2009 state-level growth data found that overall, Colorado is making progress toward helping kids maintain proficiency over time. Nevertheless, the state faces substantial challenges in ensuring that the large numbers of non-proficient students attain proficiency ("catch up"), particularly in mathematics. Another challenge is ensuring that proficient students remain proficient ("keep up") and "move up" to advanced-level proficiency especially in reading.⁶⁴

The following charts (35-41) illustrate student proficiency, as measured by the CSAP, in reading, math, writing and science for all Colorado third through tenth graders from 2003 to 2009.⁶⁵ The charts also illustrate the large and persistent achievement gap between white and Asian students on the one hand and black and Hispanic students on the other. There are multifaceted contributors to the achievement gap, but research shows that poverty is a major contributor and minority students live in poverty more often than do white students in Colorado.

Figure 35 shows the average of third through tenth grade students who are proficient in reading by ethnicity. The dotted line represents all students, or the state average. Since 2003, white and Asian students consistently scored above the state average, whereas black and Hispanic students consistently scored below the state average. In 2009, the majority of white students (79 percent) and Asian students (76 percent) were proficient in reading, compared to 47 percent of Hispanic students and 52 percent of black students.

The percentage of students meeting proficiency in mathematics increased for all students since 2003 (Figure 36). As with reading proficiency, however, the achievement gap between white and Asian students and black and Hispanic students are dramatic. About three-quarters of Asian students (72 percent) and two-thirds of white students (64 percent) were proficient in math, whereas only about one-third of black students (35 percent) and Hispanic students (36 percent) scored proficient on the math assessment.

Figure 36: Percent Proficient and Above in Math in Colorado

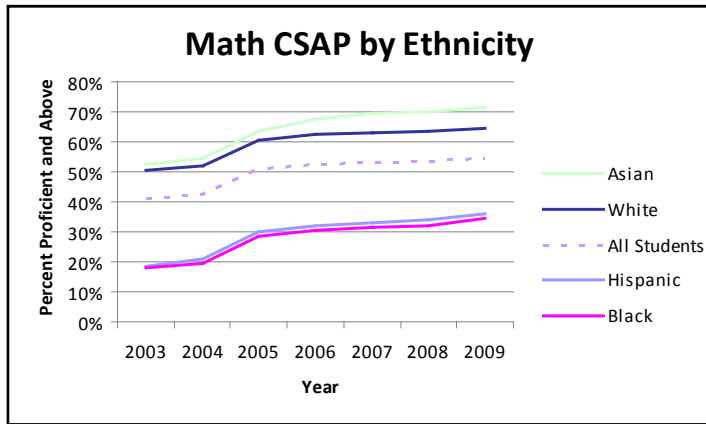
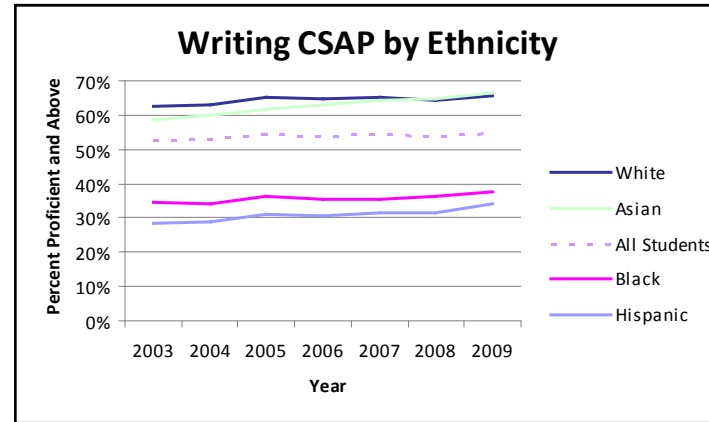
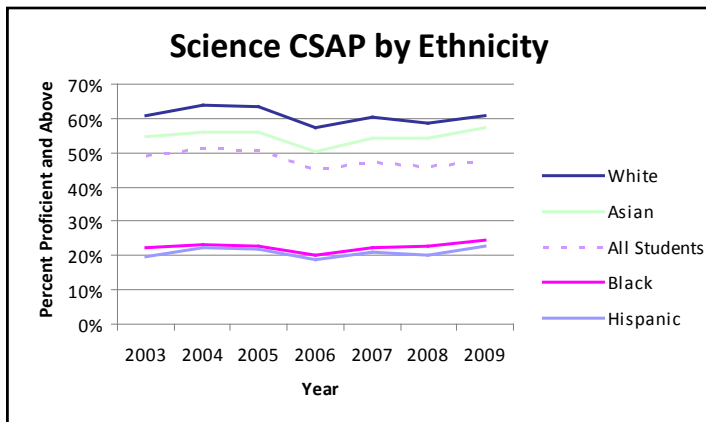


Figure 37: Percent Proficient and Above in Writing in Colorado



As Figure 37 shows, on average, only about 55 percent of Colorado students are proficient in writing (dotted line). More than half of white and Asian students meet writing proficiency standards, whereas less than half of black and Hispanic students are proficient.

As noted previously, family income is associated with gaps in student achievement. Figures 39 through 41 show this relationship. Consistently, students who are eligible for free or reduced price lunch (students from families at or below 185 percent of the Federal Poverty Level) are less likely to be proficient in reading, math and writing compared to students who are not eligible.⁶⁶ In order to improve the state average scores, it is essential to close these gaps in proficiency for all students.

Figure 39: Reading Proficiency by Income

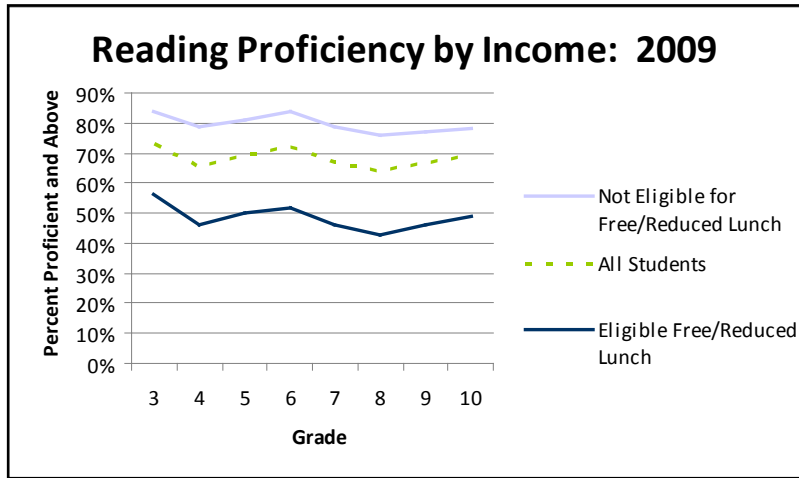


Figure 40: Math Proficiency by Income

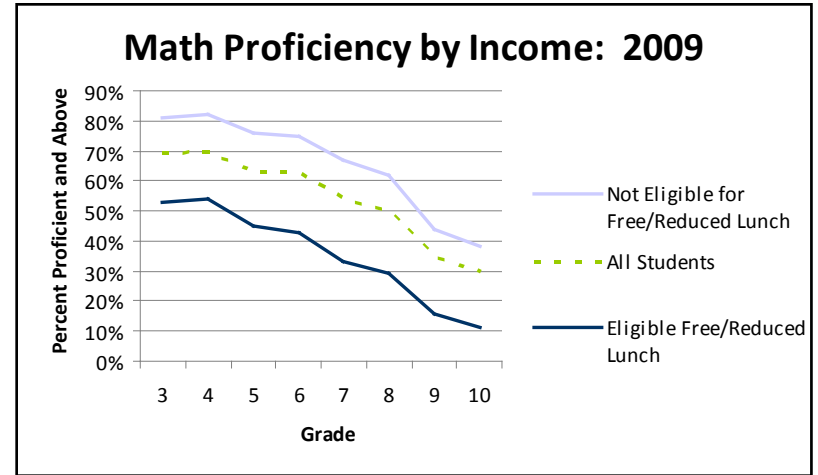
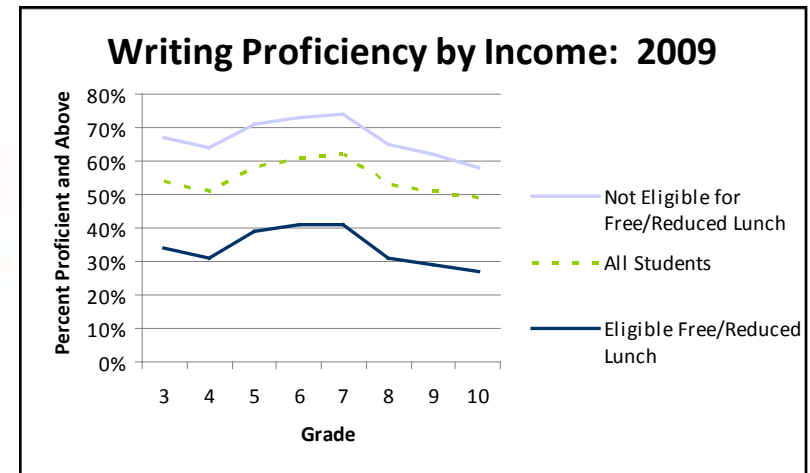


Figure 41: Writing Proficiency by Income



Graduation Rates

Graduating high school is crucial to becoming a self-sufficient adult. In 2009, more than 47,000 Colorado high school students were awarded diplomas. Despite this seemingly positive news, the state graduation rate was only 74.6 percent, down 5.5 percent from 5 years ago.⁶⁷ As the previous CSAP information highlighted, there is a wide and persistent achievement gap among students by race and income levels.⁶⁸

Unfortunately, this achievement gap translates into a “graduation gap” illustrated in Figure 42. Black, Hispanic and Native American students are much less likely to graduate from high school than are Asian or white students—a trend that is particularly alarming given that Hispanic students represent almost 30 percent of our student body and are the fastest growing demographic in Colorado (Figure 34).⁶⁹

Figure 42: 2009 Graduation Rates

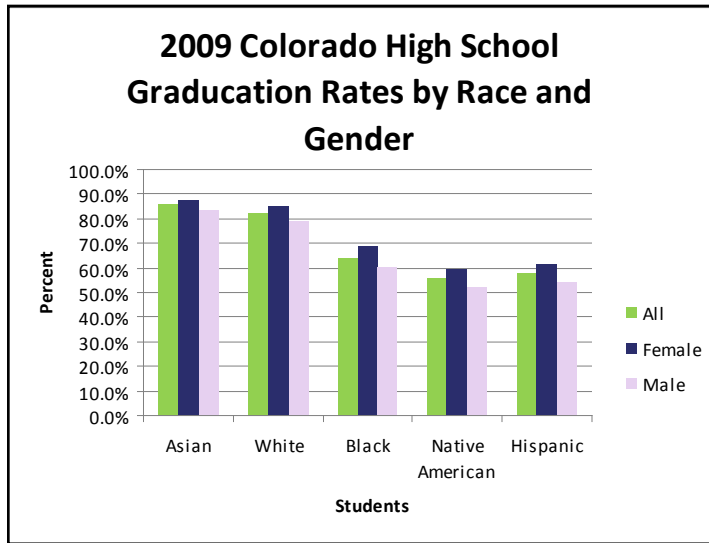
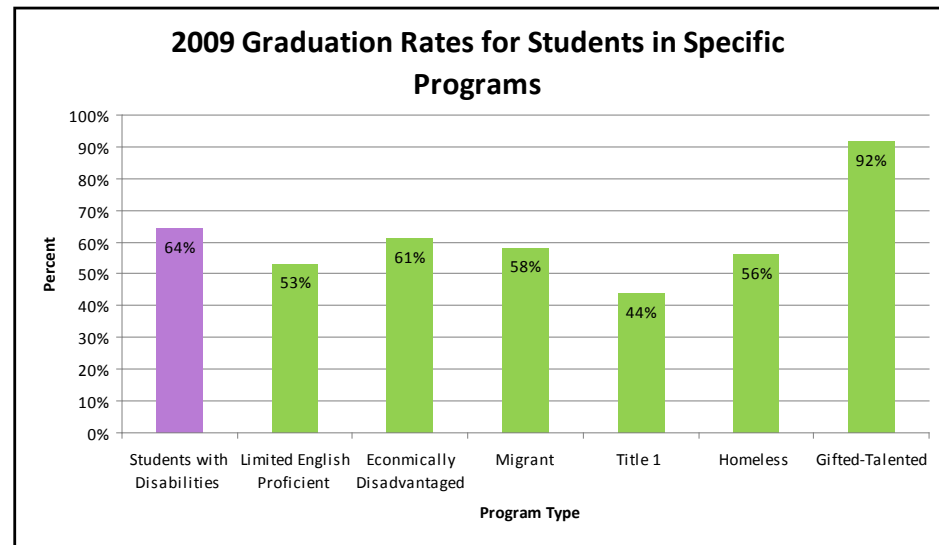


Figure 43: Graduation Rates by Program Type



A gender gap is also apparent in the graduation rates shown in Figure 42. Graduation rates are consistently lower for males. White and Asian females are the most likely to graduate and Native American and Hispanic males are the least likely. Black students have the largest gap between boys and girls.⁷⁰

Graduation gaps also exist between children in various program types, as defined by the Colorado Department of Education. Ninety-two percent of the children in the gifted and talented program graduated from high school while only 44 percent of students in the Title I program graduated (Figure 43).⁷¹

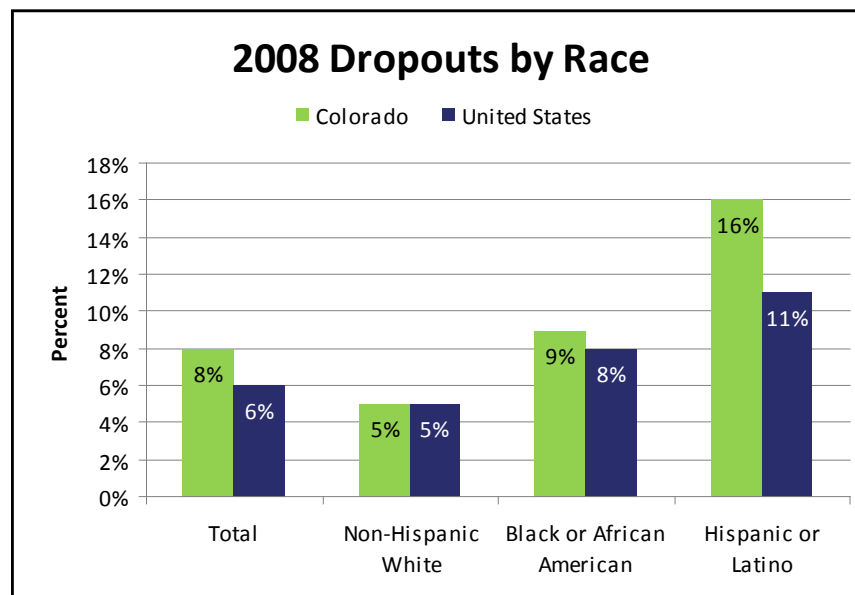

High School Dropout Data: A National Comparison

Dropping out of school limits the future opportunities for children in Colorado to earn a living wage, support a family and stay out of poverty. Nationwide research shows that minority groups have higher dropout rates than non-minority students. Low-income students are 10 times more likely to drop out of school than their higher income peers.⁷²

Colorado is ranked below average (36th) in the percent of students dropping out of school. Eight percent of teenagers between the ages of 16 and 19 were not enrolled in high school and were not high school graduates in 2008. For Hispanic students, however, Colorado is among the worst states in the nation with as much as 16 percent dropping out. For non-Hispanic white students, Colorado is ranked 22nd out of 48 with 5 percent of students dropping out (Figure 44).⁷³

Figure 44: High School Dropouts by Race



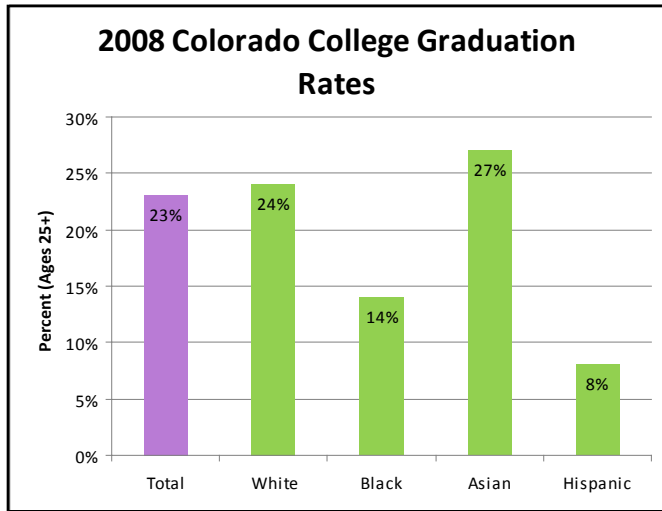

Figure 45: Colorado College Graduation Rates 2008

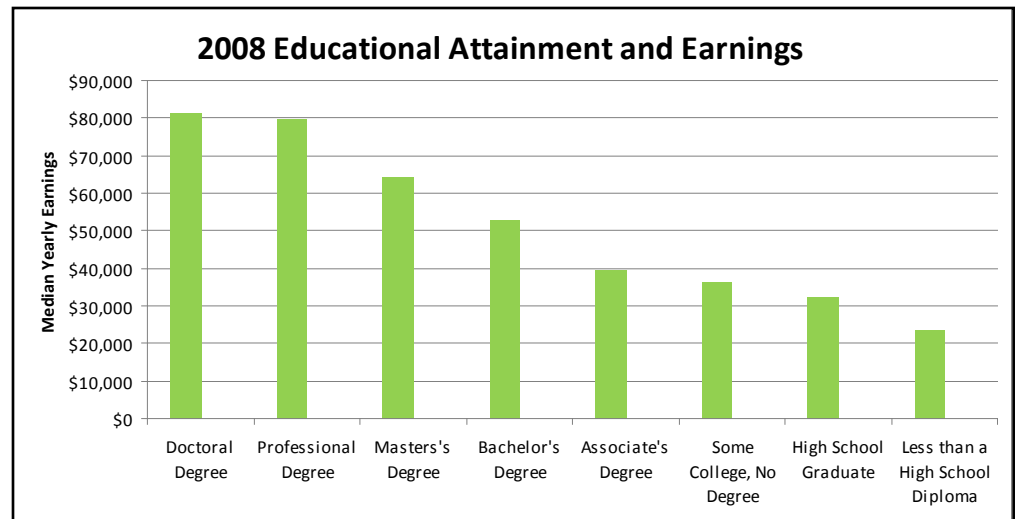


According to the Colorado Department of Higher Education, Colorado ranks 28th nationally in the attainment of bachelor's degrees.⁷⁴ In 2008, the college graduation rate for Colorado adults (age 25 and older) was 23 percent.⁷⁵

In Colorado, white adults (24 percent) are almost twice as likely as black adults (14 percent), and three times more likely than Hispanic adults (8 percent) to graduate from college (Figure 45). While the graduation rates for black and Hispanic students are both on the rise, a wide gap still exists between the race/ethnic groups.

A post-secondary education helps break the cycle of poverty for low-income families. U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics data show that individuals with college degrees are more likely to be employed and earn higher salaries than individuals without college degrees (Figure 46).⁷⁶

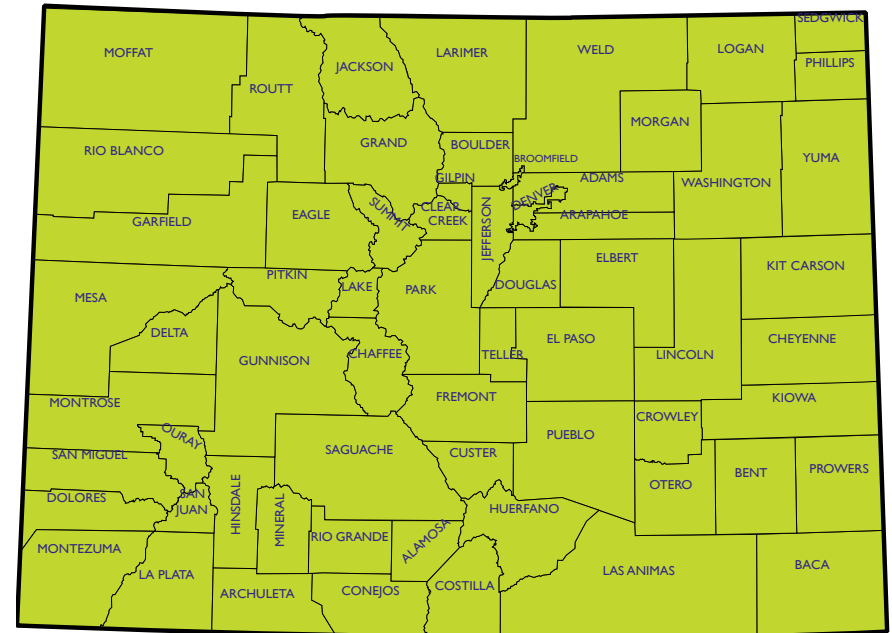

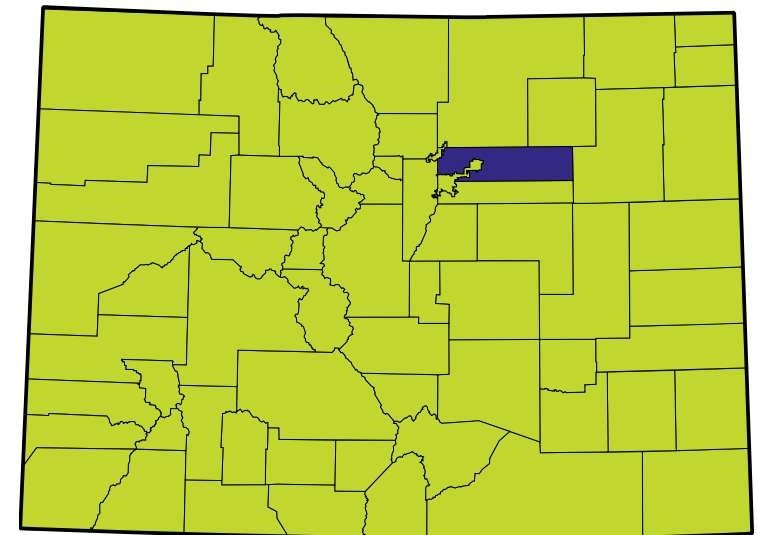

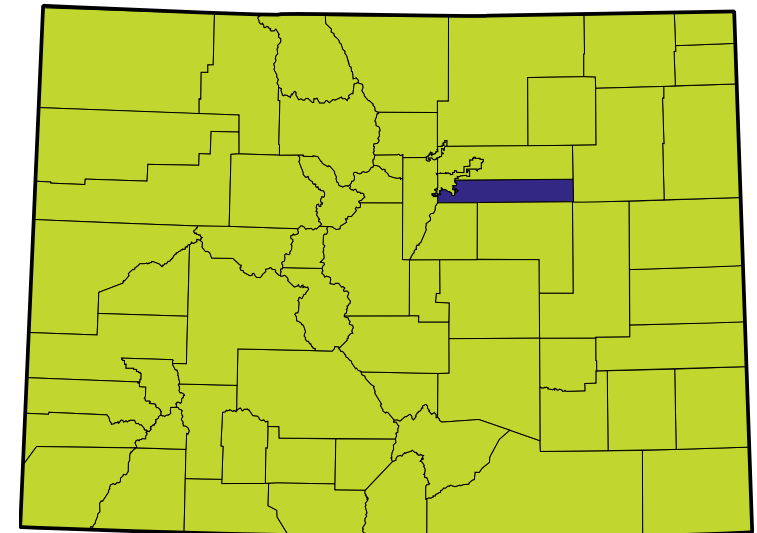
