The McIntyre Family



The McIntyre family is one of the few families who homesteaded in Moffat County and still make it their home. May (Steele) McIntyre traveled with her family from Sharon Springs, Kansas, in 1917. They homesteaded north of Maybell in Fairview in 1917. She married Rich McIntyre in 1934 and they lived north of Lay on Rich's homestead. They were blessed with five sons: Dick, John, Sam, Thomas, and Marvin. In 1937, they moved to the current McIntyre Ranch location in Maybell where they raised their five boys. May was an active member of the community. One of May's passions was teaching children to read. She volunteered in schools throughout the county. She also enjoyed rodeos, dancing, baseball, fishing, and hunting, but her greatest joy was her family. She was blessed with 14 grandchildren, 33 great grandchildren, and 16 great-great grandchildren.

Her involvement with the Moffat County fair began in 1918, at the age of 7, when she attended the first county fair in Maybell. She did not miss many throughout her lifetime. Fair, in the olden days, was a way for the locals to get together and show off their livestock, crops, and vegetables.

May truly enjoyed visiting with neighbors and catching up on each other's families. Over the years, she entered many of her vegetables and canned goods. As her sons grew older and began showing cattle, she thoroughly enjoyed watching them. Throughout the years, she watched many of her grand children and great grand children exhibit at the fair. The Moffat County Fair was a tradition that May delighted in. Sam, May's middle son, and his wife, Georgia, now live on that same ranch where Sam was raised. They have made agriculture their way of life, ranching on the homesteads of many of their family members still today. As kids they both participated in many 4-H and FFA activities. Sam was the first FFA president in Moffat County and showed cattle for many years at the fair. Both he and Georgia also participated in the rodeo.

They raised five children - Sandy, Chad, Zander, Danna, and Chip on their ranch in Maybell. All the kids showed cattle at the fair, making at least 50 steers that they exhibited. The majority of these steers were home grown and raised!

Sam and Georgia have always been active in the community and with the 4-H program. Over the years, they were leaders for beef, leather craft, photography, horse, or whatever else the Maybell Rustlers needed. Sam dedicated 32 years to the 4-H Foundation, being recognized as an Honorary Member this year. He was also a beef superintendent for many years. He and Georgia helped start the Moffat County Breeding Beef awards that are presented to the breeding exhibitors at the fair. The wheel barrow races and the turtle races were always a highlight of the fair for them.

From when they were children themselves, tagging along with their parents to fair, you can always expect to see them there. Now they go to watch their grandchildren and catch up with the neighbors, just like May did when she was young. They are truly icons at the county fair. In the memory of May, Sam and Georgia, the Moffat County Fair Board proudly dedicates the 2011 fair to you. Thank you for all you have done, and still do, to promote and support the Moffat County Fair. Thank you for helping us keep the tradition.

Joyce LeFevre



Joyce LeFevre was born in Cody, Wyoming, and grew up with 4-H and an attitude of serving others. She began her 4-H 'career' growing up on a ranch near Meeteetse, Wyoming. She has been involved ever since! In Meeteetse she was involved in cooking, sewing, and lamb projects. Her Mom was a 4-H Leader for the Upper Graybull 4-H Club. Joyce remembers taking as her lamb project, a pen of 3 bum lambs, as they did not have market classes at that time. Sewing, cooking and leather craft were taught in school, giving her a background in those areas.

After graduating from high school, Joyce went to Central Business College in Denver. It was a tough time for Joyce, moving from the ranch to the big city. She worked for friends on the race track at Centennial on weekends and every possible break, which helped fulfill her 'ag' habit. During this time, she met Tom, who was going to automotive school. They were married in 1967 and Joyce moved home for a brief time when Tom got drafted. Upon Tom's return from the service, they moved to Basalt for Tom's job with the State Highway Department. In Basalt, Joyce was a leather craft leader for a very large club. In December of 1980, Tom was transferred to Maybell, so they packed up their bags and their children, Connie, then 3, and Gene, a

first grader. Joyce quickly became a big asset to the Maybell community. She took over leadership of the Maybell Rustlers 4-H Club. She noted that the Maybell club was the second club to be chartered by the State of Colorado. She taught all projects, from cake decorating to livestock, but leather craft and horse were her favorites. She was the horse 'taxi' for all the horse members in the area, going around picking up all the kids and their horses and taking them to the Maybell arena to practice their horsemanship skills. She fondly remembers helping one of her young protégés get bucked off. The club was very active under Joyce's leadership, taking many projects to both the county fair and the state fair. She has also been a leather craft judge. She's just about done it all.

Joyce has not only been involved with the 4-H program, but has been and still is, involved with all aspects of the community. She taught leather craft through CNCC to Seniors at Sunset Meadows II, has been a bus driver for the Maybell Senior van, on the Maybell Ambulance crew for 12 years, helps tend the Maybell Cemetery as a master gardener, planting trees and helping install a drip system for watering. She has been involved with Little Britches and the FFA Advisory Board, serving as an FFA chaperone for numerous state trips. She does the Maybell Senior Citizens Route, has been a member of the Maybell Roping club, and has been a substitute school bus driver. She worked at the post office

substitute school bus driver. She worked at the post office in Craig from 1995 to 2009, along with all her other 'jobs'. Currently, she carries the mail on the Brown's Park Route, a 180 mile route.

As a result of all her volunteer work, Joyce has been honored as Citizen of the Year from the Maybell Women's Club, and as an Outstanding 4-H Leader. She and Tom have been recognized by the National Weather Service for twenty years of service recording and reporting the weather. They years of service recording and reporting the weather. They have also been honored with an Honorary FFA Chapter Degree.

Both Gene and Connie were also very active in the 4-H program. Gene took leather craft, beef, sheep, swine, and small engines, receiving numerous Senior Showmanship awards. While still in high school, he began an active shot gun club. Gene and his wife, Morsan, live here with their two children, Travis, 4, and Nathan, 1. Connie and her husband, Brandon Lyster, also live here. Connie took horse, leather craft, beef, sheep, swine, breads, cakes. She is still an active participant at the open horse show and is a consistent winner in our salsa contest at fair. She has won numerous horse awards and she and Joyce used to put on the Open Horse Show. She currently is the State Director for the NBHA and sponsors and participates in barrel races all over the region.

Joyce believes in 4-H! She has been an open class superintendent for many years and is currently an open class photography superintendent. She believes 4-H helps build character and responsibility. It is a good family connection. As you can tell, Joyce most assuredly deserves the Honorary Volunteer award for the 2011 Moffat County Fair. Joyce, we sincerely congratulate you and thank you for all you have done and continue to do to promote 4-H and the fair, despite your busy busy schedule. Our hats are off to you!

Imelda Hernandez





In Memoriam

Over the past year, we have lost many dear to the fair and the 4-H/FFA programs - leaders, members, and long time supporters. They all contributed in some very significant way to the success of the fair and the 4-H/FFA programs. Their contribution may have been through their accomplishments, their dedication, their unending support, or a living legacy. Losses like these always leave a void in the hearts of the community.

We, the Moffat County Fair Board and the Moffat County 4-H Foundation would like to express our sincerest sympathy and thanks to each and every one of the families involved. Their heritage will live on, not to be forgotten!

- All entries exhibited in the Moffat County Fair must qualify under the following conditions: be exhibited by a resident of Moffat County, or be produced or prepared as part of a project by a member of a recognized Moffat County 4-H club or vocational education group, with the exception of the Open Horse Show and the Dog Rally-O.
- These rules and special rules shall be binding in all cases and these rules shall apply in all departments and divisions hereafter listed. Strict compliance will be required of all supervisory personnel and judges as well as of all exhibitors. Check your area of interest for special rules.
- 3. All possible diligence will be exercised to prevent loss or injury to animals and articles on exhibition, but it is here stipulated that the Fair Board will in no way be responsible for loss or injury to any entry or person. (Watchman will be on duty all hours during the fair).
- 4. The management reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations and to make such other rules as are found necessary.
- 5. Every animal or article entered for competition shall be under the control of the superintendent of the department where it is entered. In open classes the next higher authority is delegated to department division coordinators except that such authority goes to the booth committee in the booth department.
- 6. Political parties and religious displays shall be allowed to display at the Moffat County Fair.
- 7. Complete name, mailing address, and phone number must be on the exhibit cards.
- 8. For exhibit limits, please see designated divisions.

JUDGING:

- ► All entries will be ready for judging at the time shown under "Schedule of Events."
- Within each division, classes will be judged in the order listed in the fair book. See department rules for exceptions.
- ▶ The decision of the judges shall be final.
- If there is only one exhibitor in a class, the judge may give no award, or such award as the entry merits.
- Animals or articles receiving first and second premiums may be considered for grand champion and reserve grand champions at the judge's discretion.
- Classes may be combined at the discretion of the Superintendents.

- 9. CHECKOUT: All exhibits except specified home economics products must be left on the fairgrounds in their allotted exhibit space during the fair until the designated release time listed on the schedule. Exhibits must be checked out officially. Premium money will be forfeited because of infractions of this rule. All exhibits, exhibit material or signs not removed by the exhibitor within 48 hours after the fair will be disposed of.

- 11. NO PETS, FIREWORKS, BALLOONS OR BICYCLES IN THE BARN. (The 4-H Dog show will be allowed in the barn on the day of the 4-H Dog show and the day of the Round Robin Show).
- 12. Four-wheelers and golf carts are prohibited on the Fairgrounds except for use by Fair Board members and Superintendents.
- 13. PROTESTS: Formal protests must be filed in writing with the secretary of the Fair Board, within 2 hours of the applicable class or show, and accompanied by a \$150.00 cash or certified funds deposit. The protest must be signed by three individuals from different households. The protest committee shall consist of the Fair Board, and the superintendent of the affected department. A simple majority of the protest committee will rule on all protests. If the decision is found to be in favor of the person filing the complaint, the deposit will be returned and the committee will decide on appropriate action. If the committee decides there is not a legitimate complaint, the \$150.00 deposit will not be returned. The committee and management retain the right to bar contestants for conduct which shows poor sportsmanship or interferes with superintendents or judges and their decision, or for causing unnecessary disturbances.
- 14. Contact information on judges is not provided.

NOTICE OF POSSIBLE EMERGENCY MEETINGS OF THE MOFFAT COUNTY FAIR BOARD DURING THE MOFFAT COUNTY FAIR.

In the event of judging controversies that require immediate resolution or unforeseen emergencies that require the immediate action and/or decision of the Moffat County Fair Board during the Moffat County Fair, three or more members of the Moffat County Fair Board may convene to address such controversies or emergencies without providing written notice twenty-four hours before meeting. In such cases, the media will be advised of the proposed meeting whenever possible and the time and place of the proposed meeting will be announced at the Moffat County Fair. Minutes of the emergency meeting will be taken and preserved and any action taken at the emergency meeting will be addressed and ratified at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Moffat County Fair Board.

- 1. Fair officials will strictly enforce Moffat County Fair General Rules, as listed in the front of this book, in each department.
- 2. Open division is designated by class number only and is open to both adults and youth unless special rules apply. See rules with each division.
- 3. CLASS DIVISIONS:
 - ▶ **P Preschool** (0-5 years of age)
 - ► Y- Youth (6-12 years of age)
 - ► **T Teen** (13-18 years of age)
 - ► **O Open** (any age group)
 - ► S Senior (60 and over)
 - ► **G Group** (3 or more people working on a project together).
- 4. If you are in the Preschool, Youth or Teen class divisions, please list your actual age beside your age group on your entry tag.
- 5. Management will not be responsible for plates, pans, or other exhibit material not picked up.
- 6. All entries in this department must be the work of the exhibitor(s) named. No article may be shown more than one year in this county fair.
- 7. Please note exhibitor entry criteria as specified in each division.
- 8. Grand Champion in each age group is chosen from all eligible 1st place awards. Reserve Champion will be chosen from all eligible 1st place awards and the 2nd place that follows the 1st chosen for Grand Champion. Grand and Reserve Champion awards may or may not be designated, at the discretion of the judges.
- 9. Security will be provided during the fair.
- Pavilion entries are accepted Tuesday, before pavilion judging, from 6-8 PM and Wednesday, the day of judging, from 8-11 AM. The pavilion will be closed to the public at 11 AM for judging. It will reopen from 6-8 PM on Wednesday.
- 11. Entries *must* be picked up between 8:00 AM and 2:00 PM on Sunday following judging. After this time, perishables will be discarded. If exhibits cannot be picked up Sunday, after the fair, arrangements should be made in advance with the Moffat County Extension Office.

FOODS:

The following rules apply to all canned goods:

- 1. Except where otherwise noted, all articles in this division shall be in standard canning jars only half pints, pints, and quarts. (i.e. no mayonnaise jars).
- 2. Any article may be tasted to the satisfaction of the judge.

- 3. All jars and glasses must be labeled on the side of the jar as follows:
 - Product name
 - Month and year of processing
 - Processing method (hot water bath or pressure cooker)
 - Altitude, time and/or lbs. pressure

*** Do not include exhibitor's name on label. Jars not properly labeled may not be judged.

PLEASE NOTE: Our number one concern is food safety. The following precautions must be taken.

- All jars must have rings and they must be readily removable.
- Open canned goods such as meat, fruit, and vegetables should be taken home following judging, with superintendent's permission to prevent spoilage. They will be marked if opened.
- Processing times will be taken from the Ball Canning Book, with high altitude adjustments made for your elevation (i.e. Craig, CO 6200'). Items not processed at high elevation recommendations, will be lowered by one ribbon.

The only exception to this rule is for Jellies. Colorado State University Extension has determined that the high altitude processing times listed in the Ball Blue Book should not be applied to jellies, since doing so would result in a severely overprocessed product. Instead, boiling water processing times for pints or half pints of jelly are recommended at 10 minutes for 1,000 to 6,000 feet, or 15 minutes at altitudes above 6,000 feet.

SEWING:

Exhibitors will be allowed to exhibit 5 entries per division. The following rules will apply to all entries. All clothing tags must be fastened to the garment. All garments must be clean.

NEEDLEWORK:

Exhibitors will be allowed to enter five exhibits per division. All needlework must be clean or it will be disqualified; it must not be in plastic bags. **Needlepoint and crewel must be unframed or framed in such a way as to leave back of work exposed for judging or it may not be accepted.

QUILTS:

NOTE CHANGE: Quilts will be entered, judged, and displayed under the grandstands. Please bring your quilts to the EAST end of the grandstand area. All general rules apply. Quilts will be scored according to CQC judging specifications.

HOME & GARDEN RULES

To determine where to enter your quilt, first determine the general technique (appliquéd, pieced, combination appliquéd and pieced, or a special technique). Then choose the appropriate size (accessory item/wall hanging, bed, crib/lap). Then choose the class within that division that best describes the specific technique used. If your quilt is a special technique, choose the appropriate division first and then the size. Accessory items are things such as placemats, napkins, wall hangings (smaller than 30" x 50"), etc. Bed size includes twin, full, queen, and king. Crib/lap size is 30" to 45" on the shortest side and 50" to 60" on the longest side.

Colorado Quilting Council presents a First Timer Award—\$25 premium and special ribbon for a first-time entry. This is an award which recognizes quilters who have not previously entered their work. If this is your first time entering a quilt in this fair, mark it as such on your entry form. (This award is given at the discretion of the judge).

Judges Choice Award—A special ribbon is awarded, at the discretion of the judge, to the quilt the judge would most like to take home.

Best of Show Award—A \$25 premium and a special ribbon will be awarded by the Yampa Valley Piecemakers Quilt Guild. This quilt will be chosen by the judge and is the quilt that he/she feels is the best quilt entered, based on the judging specifications.

CRAFTS AND HOBBIES:

Exhibitors will be allowed to exhibit three entries in each division.

ARTS:

NOTE: Amateur and Professional Classes

- 1. Please note Amateur and Professional on entry tag.

 *Professionals are designated as follows:
 - ► Teaches Art for pay or . . .
 - ► Has sold more than \$500.00 in artwork within the past year or . . .
 - Has won a major award in a national art show
- 2. Please note entry limits under each division.
- 3. Articles must be exhibited under the name of the maker.
- 4. Pictures entered by anyone over 6 years of age, must be matted and able to hang or stand free or they will not be judged or displayed.

PHOTOGRAPHY:

NOTE: Amateur and Professional Classes

1. Please note Amateur and Professional on entry tag.

Professionals are designated as follows:

- ▶ a. Teaches Photography for pay or . . .
- ► b. Has sold more than \$500.00 in photography within the past year or . . .

- c. Has won a major award in a national show.
- 2. Each exhibitor will be limited to one entry in each class.
- 3. Articles must be exhibited under the name of the maker.
- 4. Photos must be matted or framed. *Photos must be able to hang.*
- 5. To fill out entry tag, pick a class number and attach it to the section abbreviation

HORTICULTURE:

Fresh Vegetables:

- 1. NOTE CHANGE: Exhibitors should place vegetables in clear plastic bag.
- Root and tuber crops should have excess dirt removed, but should not be washed. Entries obviously washed will be disqualified.
- 3. NOTE CHANGE: Exhibitors may enter one of each variety. (i.e. 1 Anaheim pepper entry; 1 Habanero pepper entry; 1 Jalapeno pepper entry)

Flowers:

- All exhibitors must furnish their own containers for their exhibits (tall containers for gladiolus or other tall species). We are judging the flowers, not the container. Use any container for special arrangements.
- 2. Number of blossoms or stems designated in each class must be adhered to, otherwise, exhibit will be disqualified. Do not add Baby's Breath.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE PROJECT DEPARTMENT:

- 1. Each item will be clearly labeled with name and address on the underside or back.
- 2. All records will be exhibited and up to date.

Territory and Farm Flock Fleeces:

Fleeces from flocks of sheep run under strictly range conditions. Fleeces to be limited to those shorn in Moffat County.

Junior Division and Open Division Classes will be provided.

Breed Fleeces:

From Purebred or Registered Sheep. Range Rams included

Hand-Spinning Fleeces:

Fleeces prepared specifically for hand-spinning. Junior Division and Open Division classes will be provided.

4-H DEPARTMENT RULES

1. Each entry will receive either a blue, red or white award ribbon depending on how well an entry meets project requirements.

吟 GENERAL 4-H PROJECT ぐ

All 4-H projects are judged by the Danish Ribbon System which is based upon the following quality and standards:

Blue - Exhibit meets project requirements and is of high quality (well done).

Red - Exhibit meets project requirements but is of average quality.

White - Exhibit does not meet all project requirements and/or is below average quality (needs improvement).

- 2. A Champion (purple flat ribbon) and Reserve Champion (lavender flat ribbon) will be awarded in each project class for Junior, Intermediate and Senior or as otherwise designated by the Colorado State Fair 4-H Exhibit Requirements. These awards will be determined from all of the blue ribbon winners in each class. Each Champion winner will also receive a State Fair Qualifying ribbon.
- 3. An overall section (Animal Science, Biological Sciences, Mechanical Sciences, Natural Resources, Communication, Arts & Leisure Sciences, Consumer Science) Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be chosen, in each age group, from the project class champions and will receive Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion rosettes.

*The Section Grand Champions will receive a picture trophy and a sponsored award. The Section Reserve Champion will receive a picture award certificate.


- 4. Exhibits that exceed project skills, number or size requirements will not be considered for champion, reserve champion. However, the project is still eligible for the appropriate Danish placing.
- 5. Exhibits that do not meet project requirements will be awarded a white ribbon.

DISPLAY BOARDS, when used, must meet the following requirements:

Display boards are the only type of board to be used for 4-H projects.

Display boards are a great way to share information, but when viewers walk by, they spend only 60-90 seconds looking at each one. Make your display board stand out by highlighting the main points of your project in a fun, interesting way.

SHAPE: Design your exhibit so information fits on the display. Remember, you have one large surface, and 2 smaller side wings.



SPACE: Your display should only discuss one main topic. This will help it look neat and un-crowded.

ATTACHMENTS: When attaching pictures or objects to your board, make sure they are secure. Use glue for pictures and paper, and consider wires, zip ties or staples to attach bulkier items. Do not attach items that are so heavy that your board can't stand.

TEXT: Make sure that all the text on your display is easy to read. Use a large font for the title, and smaller fonts for the headings and body text. Text must be readable from 3-5 feet away. Use large bold letters. Dark letters on a light background works best.

SIZE: Display boards for the state fair must measure 4 ft. wide x 3 ft. tall. They should be made of lightweight cardboard, but not poster board. Pre-cut boards are available at most craft and shopping centers. No part of your display may extend beyond these boundaries.

<u>DISPLAY BOOKS</u>: Your e-record book should accompany your board. You may use 3-ring binders or other notebooks that will keep the pages securely inside. You may not use slider-type binders.

4-H COMPLETION DAY

1. Projects can be entered from 6:00 - 8:00 PM on Monday, August 1 or 8:00 - 9:00 AM. on Tuesday, August 2 under the Grandstands. Projects will not be accepted after 9:00 AM.

2. A project interview schedule will be posted that morning. This will enable 4-H members and leaders to plan their time that day to be there for project interviews.

~DOG~

General Dog Rules:

- Members and dogs must be actively enrolled in the 4-H dog project and have on file a Project Identification Sheet to show at County Fair Dog Show.
- 2. All dogs enrolled in the 4-H dog project must be current on their annual vaccinations.
- 3. Dogs who have been aggressive during the project year may be denied eligibility to show at the Fair Dog Show.
- 4. Dogs that show aggressive behavior in the ring during the Fair Dog Show may be asked to leave the Ring by the Judge.
- Under no circumstances is anyone allowed to approach the judge or stewards with a dispute or problem during the Fair Dog Show. Any Grievance should be taken to the Dog Project Superintendent after the Show.
- 6. Exhibitors are responsible to be ready when their class is called or they may miss the class. You may not enter a class after it has started. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in another project or class which conflicts with the dog show, the member should notify the show superintendents of all projects involved in case there is flexibility in show order.
- 7. Dogs may be shown at the **Sub-Novice A**, **B & C levels for ONE year only.**
- 8. Members may remain in Graduate Novice, Open and Utility as long as the exhibitor wishes.
- 9. Dogs are not allowed to move down levels after competing at a higher level at a Fair Dog Show.
- 10. Dogs **Not Entered** in the Fair Dog Show may not be brought to the show grounds.
- 11. After once earning a blue ribbon or qualifying score (170+) in obedience at County Fair as a 4-H project, that same dog is no longer eligible to compete in that same class or lower. It must move up to the next class. Example: a dog that has competed in Sub-Novice level must move up to Novice A even if the handler is first year.
- 12. Any 4-H member who has shown a dog in AKC or is deemed experienced, as a showman must enter Open level showmanship.
- 13. A dog with an AKC title is disqualified from entering the class for which the degree was awarded.

OWNERSHIP, SHOW AND TRAINING

- 14. Dogs must be trained exclusively in obedience, showmanship and/or agility by the 4-H member during the project year beginning January 1 current year and ending December 31.
- 15. Members must own his/her project dog individually or in partnership with a parent or guardian during the complete duration of the project.

- 4-H members may show more than one dog in obedience, however, all 4-H members are limited to one regular class per dog and one dog per class (see class descriptions).
- 17. A 4-H member may show ONE dog in the appropriate regular showmanship class.
- 18. Classes may be combined in an effort to expedite the show providing that it maintains the 12 dog limit for long sits and downs. Changes will be announced and members will be given five-minute warning. Classes will be scored separately.
- All obedience classes will be judged according to 4-H Judging Guidelines using modified AKC rules (Subnovice, Graduate-Novice, Pre-Open classes). Novice, Open and Utility class rules are identical to AKC rules.
- 20. Members who get a score of *170 or above* in obedience at a 4-H dog show can qualify for state fair, in the class which he/she received the score at the show. However, if three (3) members qualify at County Fair in the same class, they have preference (county fair supersedes). Must have written proof.
- 21. Female dogs in season may **not** be shown at County Fair Dog Show, and are not allowed on the show grounds.
- 22. Pregnant bitches, within four weeks of due date or bitches with a litter four weeks of age or older but still lactating (producing milk) must have veterinarian approval before being shown.
- 23. For the protection of the other project dogs, the Superintendent, along with the project leaders or Judge, jointly have the right to reject any dog showing evidence of disease or parasites and to include lameness, sickness or improperly cared for dog. This decision will be made by the Dog Superintendent and/or Judge.
- 24. For the protection of the 4-H members, their dogs and spectators, aggressive behavior by a dog will eliminate the dog from further competition at the Moffat County Fair Dog Show. **This decision will be made by the Dog Superintendent and/or Judge.**
- 25. No dog(s) shall be left unattended or (tied up) anywhere on Fairgrounds for any reason. All dogs must be on a 6 ft. leash or crated and attended at all times. Any loose dog or one which is tied or unattended may be excused from any further competition that day. This decision will be made by the Dog Superintendent and Project Leaders jointly.
- 26. Exhibitors may not accept coaching or training while in the show ring. Acceptance will result in disqualification from that class. This decision will be made by the Judge and the Dog Superintendent.
- 27. There will be no intensive or abusive training or handling of the dogs on the Show Grounds. You may warm your dog up before the show using any obedience exercise used in the ring.
- 28. In order for 4-H members to complete their dog project, they must show in Showmanship and Obedience and complete their 4-H record book.

EQUIPMENT AND CARE

- 29. All grooming the day of the show must be done by the 4-H member.
- 30. Dogs must be brought to the show on a six (6) ft. leash and either a flat buckle collar or a slip collar for obedience and a show lead for showmanship. Nothing except the leash may be attached to the collar in the ring. Dog licenses should be removed prior to entering the ring.
- 31. Members are responsible for bringing their own shade, water and feed for the dogs. Additionally, exhibitors are responsible for allowing adequate time for their dogs to relieve themselves prior to entering the ring. All members are required to clean up after their dogs.
- 32. Show rings should be no less than 40 feet by 50 feet, with at least a 5-foot buffer between rings. All spectators must be at least 10 feet away from ring side.

DRESS OF THE EXHIBITORS

33. The dress for the exhibitor in obedience should be neat and clean. **Girls**; hair should be tied back, nice slacks or a skirt and blouse or dress, with **flat shoes. Boys**; nice shirt tucked in, a tie, with nice pants, sport jacket (optional)

EXHIBIT CLASSES

All exercises will be judged following the latest AKC obedience guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Show rules and guidelines are modeled after AKC rules, with exceptions in Sub-Novice, Graduate Novice, Pre-Open classes which have modified AKC and 4-H rules.

~4-H HORSE~

General Rules:

Effective October 1, 2006. A certified equestrian helmet with safety harness fastened in place is required in over fences classes and gymkhana events, activities and practice sessions. It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian of the 4-H member to see that the headgear worn complies with such standards and is in good condition. The State 4-H Office encourages the use of ASTM certified/SEI approved safety helmets in all equine events. Protective headgear may be used in all classes and shall not be discriminated against.

- 1. County Fair general rules will apply, unless otherwise specified herein, please read them.
- 2. Both adults and youth including 4-H and FFA are eligible for the Open Class Horse Show.
- 3. 4-H and FFA members are required to show in showmanship to complete project. Only exception is a vet authorization.
- 4. Western high point will consist of showmanship, Western horsemanship, reining, Western riding and

- trail. English high point will consist of showmanship (only if English attire is worn during showmanship class), English riding (control class), hunt seat equitation (not to jump) or hunt seat equitation over jumps.
- Gymkhana high point will consist of barrel race, flag race, pole bending, goat tying, breakaway, dally team roping.
- High point awards will be determined on one horse- one rider for Junior, Intermediate, Senior divisions.

Personal Attire:

Western Dress Code

- A. Western clothing that reflects neat, clean, well-fitted work-like appearance. Expensive clothing will not count over neat, clean clothing.
- B. Western hat, Western or cowboy boots, belt and long-sleeved, full-length shirt (chest and midriff covered) required. Any exhibitor may wear certified equestrian protective headgear in any division or class without penalty.
- C. Optional: gloves, ties, chaps, vests, jackets, raincoat, breast collar and spurs. See classes for exceptions.

8. Personal Attire:

English Dress Code

Saddle Seat

- A. Although the class is being judged on ability, the rider should be dressed in neat attire. The appointments given are based on tradition and present-day custom. Contestants who do not conform will be penalized. In extreme weather conditions, show attire requirements may be altered by show management.
- B. Informal: conservative colors are required. These include black, blue, gray, green, beige or brown jacket with matching jodhpurs (white jacket in season), derby or soft hat and jodhpur boots.
- C. Formal: evening wear is more conservative. Colors include dark gray, dark brown, dark blue or black tuxedo-type jacket with collars and lapels of the same color, top hat, jodhpurs to match, and gloves, or dark-colored riding habit and accessories, and jodhpur boots. Formal attire is not appropriate before 6 p.m.
- D. Optional: spurs of the unrowelled type.

Equipment

- A. Bridle: full riddles (curb and snaffle). Martingales and similar tie-downs are prohibited.
- B. Saddle: a flat, English-type is required. Forward seat or Western saddles are prohibited.

Hunt Seat

A. Though the class is being judged on ability rather than personal attire, riders should wear suitable hunt

seat attire consisting of a coat of any tweed or melton for hunting (conservative wash jackets in season); breeches or jodhpurs; appropriate boots; and a hunt cap is mandatory. A certified equestrian hunt cap with safety harness fastened in place is required in over fences classes. It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian of the 4-H member to see that the headgear worn complies with such standards and is in good condition.

In extreme weather conditions, show attire requirements may be altered by show management.

B. Optional: spurs of the unrowelled type, crops and bats.

Equipment

- A. Snaffles, pelhams, kimberwicks, or full bridles may be used. A cavesson (noseband) is required regardless of the bridle/bit used.
- B. Optional: martingales are optional in classes over fences. They are prohibited in Hunter Hack and all classes not to jump.
- C. Prohibited: Western or flat saddles Prohibited: whip, figure 8 noseband, drop noseband, flash noseband.
- 9. 4-H and FFA members may compete for all 3 of the high point awards.
- All 4-H and FFA horse projects will be judged on Monday. This includes English, Western, halter and gymkhana.
- 11. Classes with "J" prefix are only open to 4-H and FFA members with horse projects.
- 12. In foal classes, mares are allowed to be brought into the arena. The foal must be on a halter and led in.
- 13. General Show rules for the 4-H and FFA horse show will be according to the Moffat County Fair Book or the Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rule Book.
- 14. In halter classes where entries number three or less, the superintendent reserves the right to combine classes.
- 15. Cash prizes in 4-H Horse classes will be \$3, \$2, \$1, for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place respectively. Ribbons will be awarded for 4th and 5th places.
- 16. 4-H and FFA members must show only their project horses. 4-H and FFA members must complete a Horse I.D. sheet on each horse. Horse I.D. sheets must be turned into the Extension Office by June 1st each year.
- 17. 4-H and FFA members may show only one animal per division (i.e. one mare, one gelding, one colt). If a member has more than one horse in the Supreme Champion class, another junior member may show that animal upon approval of show management.
- 18. Participants in performance classes will have completed and passed at least Level 1 testing prior to show, in order to compete. (If you wish to compete at State Fair, at least Level II testing is required).

- 19. Patterns will be posted the morning of the Horse Show by 8:00 a.m.
- 20. Any mis-entered animals will forfeit any placings or show money.
- 21. A major goal of the 4-H program is the building and strengthening of the youth's character. Good sportsmanship is essential in horse project competition.
- 22. **NOTE:** The Fair photographer will be taking trophy pictures in the main livestock barn from 11:00 AM—1:00 PM and 3:00 PM-5:00 PM day of show, unless announced otherwise.
- 23. NOTE: Under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator badger, insult or be argumentative with the judge, ring steward, superintendent or show management. Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to the judge or ring steward by or on behalf of the exhibitor may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and forfeiture of awards. The person(s) responsible for such action will be asked to leave the grounds by the superintendent or his designee.
- 24. NO coaching is allowed from the rail or outside the arena by parents and/or leaders when a member is competing in the arena. Persons doing so, may be asked to leave the grounds by the superintendent or his designee.
- 25. The fair management may, at its discretion, expel any person or persons abusing any horse on the grounds at any time, and entry fees and prize money will be forfeited. In any 4-H class, horses showing signs of undue stress or inhumane treatment must be penalized. Any horse exhibited in a class that has evidence of abuse, a cut or abrasion showing clear evidence of fresh blood in the mouth, nose, chin, shoulder, barrel, flank or hip area, must be considered to be ineligible to receive an award in that class.
- 26. Riders who do not have their mounts under suitable control will be excused from the ring. Judges and ring officials should interpret this wording to stress safety and courtesy to all riders in the class, and consider a horse as being sufficiently out of control at any time the rider is unable to manage the animal in the required class routine after a reasonable corrective action.

High Point Awards in Western and English Divisions will be awarded in the following age groups:

Categories:

Walk Trot: ONLY FIRST YEAR MEMBERS are allowed to compete in this division. The only exception will be if a leader and agent/advisor approve a second year member based on safety issues. First year members may compete in their age division if they prefer. Walk/trot participants cannot compete in gymkhana events. Winner of the Walk/Trot division will not compete in Round Robin or Outstanding Horseman Award.

Juniors: 8 to 10 year olds.

Intermediates: 11 to 13 year olds. **Seniors**: 14 years and older.

27. The gymkhana high point awards will be awarded in the following age categories:

Juniors: 8 to 10 years old

Intermediates: 11 to 13 years old **Seniors**: 14 years and older

No Walk Trot classes will be designated.

- 28. Walk/trot classes will be designated for first year members only. He/she may participate in age appropriate showmanship and other designated walk trot classes.
- 29. Points will be awarded in the walk/trot division for a high point award. This will be determined by points accrued in showmanship class and rail class.
- 30. Points will be awarded in each class to determine high point awards. High point awards will be announced at culmination of show.
- 31. Points earned will be as follows with ribbons given for 1st through 5th place.

Example:	1st place-	5 pts.
	2nd place -	4 pts.
	3rd place -	3 pts.
	4th place -	2 pts.
	5th place -	1 pts.

32. An Outstanding Horseman Award will be presented at the Annual Achievement Night. Selection will be based on class points accrued, levels testing, expo participation and record book scores.

~OPEN HORSE~

- 1. County fair general rules will apply, unless otherwise specified herein: please read them.
- 2. Both adults and youth, including 4-H and FFA, are eligible for the show as well as out of county horse exhibitors.
- 3. Exhibitors age shall be as of January 1. Age must be on the entry form.
- 4. High point will consist of Showmanship, Western Horsemanship, Hunter Under Saddle, Hunt Seat Equitation, Hunt Seat Equitation over Fences, Hunter Hack, Reining, Western Pleasure, Trail, Barrels, Poles and Keyhole. High point will be figured on one horse one rider.
- 5. Points will be awarded in the above eligible classes to determine high point awards. Ribbons will be given for 1st through 5th place.

- A. Although the class is being judged on ability, the rider should be dressed in neat attire. The appointments given are based on tradition and present-day custom. Contestants who do not conform will be penalized. In extreme weather conditions, show attire requirements may be altered by show management.
- B. Informal: conservative colors are required. These include black, blue, gray, green, beige or brown jacket with matching jodhpurs (white jacket in season), derby or soft hat and jodhpur boots.
- C. Formal: evening wear is more conservative. Colors include dark gray, dark brown, dark blue or black tuxedo-type jacket with collars and lapels of the same color, top hat, jodhpurs to match, and gloves, or dark-colored riding habit and accessories, and jodhpur boots. Formal attire is not appropriate before 6 p.m.
- D. Optional: spurs of the unrowelled type.

Equipment

- A. Bridle: full riddles (curb and snaffle). Martingales and similar tie-downs are prohibited.
- B. Saddle: a flat, English-type is required. Forward seat or Western saddles are prohibited.

Hunt Seat

A. Though the class is being judged on ability rather than personal attire, riders should wear suitable hunt seat attire consisting of a coat of any tweed or melton for hunting (conservative wash jackets in season); breeches or jodhpurs; appropriate boots; and a hunt cap is mandatory. A certified equestrian hunt cap with safety harness fastened in place is required in over fences classes. It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian of the 4-H

member to see that the headgear worn complies with such standards and is in good condition.

In extreme weather conditions, show attire requirements may be altered by show management.

B. Optional: spurs of the unrowelled type, crops and bats.

Equipment

- A. Snaffles, pelhams, kimberwicks, or full bridles may be used. A cavesson (noseband) is required regardless of the bridle/bit used.
- B. Optional: martingales are optional in classes over fences. They are prohibited in Hunter Hack and all classes not to jump.
- C. Prohibited: Western or flat saddles Prohibited: whip, figure 8 noseband, drop noseband, flash noseband.

Exception: Barrels and Poles - exhibitors may wear apparel of choice. Boots will still be required.

- 9. Performance and Halter classes will be judged according to **4-H Horse Show Rule Book.**
- 10. In foal classes, the foals must be haltered and led. The mare will be allowed in the arena on a halter.
- 11. In halter classes where entries number three or less, the superintendent reserves the right to combine classes. In performance classes where entries number three or less, the superintendent reserves the right to combine classes by age of rider. If a class is considered too large, the superintendent reserves the right to split the classes.
- 12. First and second place winners in each halter class will show for Champion and Reserve Champion.
- 13. A special All-Around trophy will be given to highest points scored in the horse show. You must show at halter to be eligible for this trophy. This is a Joe Brett Memorial sponsored by Carol Beumer.
- 14. Deadline for mail-in pre-entries will be **July 15, 2011.**Pre-entry fee is \$7.00 per class for the open show. Post entries will be accepted at the show. Post entries will be \$8.00 per class. Show passes will be available for \$50.00. This does not include halter classes. Show passes will be pre-entry only. No show passes available day of show. Entries for halter classes will close at 7:30 AM on Saturday, August 6, 2011. Entries for performance classes close 11:00 AM on Saturday, August 6, 2011. NO EXCEPTIONS! Entry fees are nonrefundable.
- 15. The gate will close for each class 3 minutes after the class is called into the arena. If tack or clothes change warrants late admission, the gate person must be contacted before the class is called.
- 16. Stalls available \$10.00 no refund. Stall reservations must be made at time of entry. Horses on fairgrounds overnight must be housed in designated stall area.

ALL SEXUALLY INTACT GOATS MUST HAVE A SCRAPIE PREMISES ID EAR TAG. REGISTERED MEAT AND DAIRY GOATS MAY USE TATTOOS WITH BREED REGISTRATION NUMBERS SUPPORTED BY ACCOMPANYING REGISTRATION PAPERS IN LIEU OF THE TAGS.

ALL SEXUALLY INTACT SHEEP MUST HAVE A SCRAPIE PREMISES ID EAR TAG.

RETAINED TESTICLE RULE:

MALE ANIMALS HAVING ONE OR BOTH TESTICLES CONTAINED IN THE BODY CAVITY ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO SHOW OR SELL IN THE JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE.

SWINE BREEDING:

THERE WILL BE NO SWINE BREEDING CLASSES ALLOWED AT THE 2011 MOFFAT COUNTY FAIR.

JUNIOR DIVISION: ALL MOFFAT COUNTY 4-H/FFA MEMBERS (8-18 YEARS OF AGE AS OF DECEMBER 31st CURRENT YEAR).

OPEN CLASS DIVISION: Any Moffat County Adult 19 and older as of January 1st current year.

The foregoing General Rules shall apply to all Junior Division Fair participants in departments of the Moffat County Fair.

GENERAL RULES

- Junior Division exhibitors must be currently enrolled in a 4-H project or FFA project for which an exhibit is made. Other youth, not enrolled in 4-H or FFA projects, are invited to enter corresponding open or youth classes in agriculture for equal prizes or awards. Cloverbuds (4-H members ages 5-7) may not enroll in, participate in, exhibit or sell 4-H livestock projects.
- 2. Bedding, if desired, will be furnished by the exhibitor.
- 3. In the event of over crowding of a specie, exhibitors may be asked to remove non-show animals from the fairgrounds.
- 4. It is recommended that water be available to all animals at all times during the County Fair.
- Each Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member enrolled in livestock projects will be provided 4-H/FFA Humane Animal Care Guidelines. These guidelines will be practiced by every person enrolled in or participating in 4-H/FFA animal projects.

- 6. No market animals will be released until the Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member has declared an animal for the Junior Livestock Sale. Non sale animals may be checked out by a superintendent and taken from the fairgrounds after 12:00 noon the next day following the specific species show.
- 7. SECURITY: The livestock barns will be locked from 10:00 PM—5:30 AM starting Wednesday of fair week. No one will be allowed in the barns during this time.

ETHICS

- The following are termed unethical practices: Doctoring. doping or injecting show animals for body "fill-ins", or the alteration, changing, defacing or any modification of the markings of show animals and the anatomical structure of an animal, the removal, alteration, changing or purposely damaging ear tags, any type of injection where oils, glycerine or like substances are used for body "fill-ins" external applications of such things as liniments and blistering agents that would cause an edematous condition, use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of the finish of an animal. No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trappings, etc. during the judging. No altering of color or structure of hair or wool coat in any way except for trimming or blocking will be allowed. Any grooming material on an entry, when rubbed with a cloth or glove, which shows evidence of altering color shall be an automatic disqualification. This does not apply to hoof dressing on hooves. Any entry adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll, or adding any hair or hairlike substance will be disqualified. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited.
- 2. Fair management reserves the right to test any animal.
- 3. Compliance with all Colorado laws prohibiting tampering with or drugging of livestock and/or sale of adulterated meat is mandatory for any Junior Division (4-H/FFA/Vo-Ag) member and/or family member enrolled in a Junior Division (4-H/FFA/Vo-Ag) animal project. If legal charges are brought against any Junior Division (4-H/FFA/Vo-Ag) member/family, the member/family will be suspended from participation in all Junior Division (4-H/FFA/Vo-Ag) livestock activities pending resolution of those charges. If found guilty, the Junior Division (4-H / FFA/Vo-Ag) member/family will be banned from all animal projects by Colorado State University Cooperative Extension 4-H Youth Development and/or the Moffat County FFA program for one year.
 - Tampering or drugging of livestock is a felony according to Colorado Consolidated Cruelty/Fighting Statute 18-9-207.
- 4. NOTE: Under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator badger, insult or be argumentative with the judge, ring steward, superintendent or show management. Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to the judge or

ring steward by or on behalf of the exhibitor may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and forfeiture of awards. The person(s) responsible for such action will be asked to leave the grounds by the superintendent or his designee.

5. It is recommended that water be available to all animals at all times during the County Fair.

OWNERSHIP

- All market lambs, market swine, market goats and all breeding animals including rabbits must have been in the exhibitors possession for 60 days prior to the fair. All market beef must have been in the exhibitor's possession for 120 days prior to the fair.
- 2. Junior division (4-H/FFA) breeding animals must be part of a project and owned by the 4-H or FFA/Vo-Ag member. Proof of ownership must be available at the fairgrounds within 5 minutes of request by the department superintendent.
- 3. Transfer of ownership of all livestock occurs immediately upon completion of the bidding

REQUIREMENTS

- Completed 4-H record books for livestock, poultry, rabbits and horse will be required in the Moffat County Extension Office no later than September 10 following the Moffat County Fair. Note: If September 10th falls on a weekend, record books will be due the Monday immediately following the weekend.
 - An FFA/Vo-Ag member must complete and turn in a record book form to the Moffat County Extension Office by September 10th to complete a livestock project.
- 2. A 4-H member is not required to show an animal in the County Livestock Show to complete their 4-H project. A 4-H member may complete a livestock project by completing 70% of his/her livestock record book and turning the livestock record book in by September 10th. If a member does not complete a record book, they will be given an incomplete in that project area and will not be allowed to take that project the next year.
- Pen Request A Livestock Pen Request form must be completed and turned into the Extension Office. Forms are available at the Extension Office. If a pen request form is not completed and turned in, pens will be assigned on a first come first serve basis during weighin

PLEASE NOTE: Pen assignments are permanent. Switching and/or re-numbering pens to suit personal needs, without superintendent approval, will not be tolerated! Persons found changing pen numbers without superintendent approval are subject to being asked to leave the grounds.

4. All Junior Division (4-H/FFA) members showing or selling market animals or showing breeding animals must attend an official Meat Quality Assurance Training provided by either the Colorado State University Extension Office or FFA once as a Junior/ Intermediate (8-13 year olds), and once as a Senior (14 & over). All members must provide documentation verifying their attendance at an official training program to the Extension Office by June 1.

Any 4-H or FFA member failing to provide such documentation will not be allowed to show in the Junior Division, sell at the Junior Livestock Sale, or participate in the rate of gain contest at the Moffat County Fair. He/she may participate in open showmanship classes only.

DRESS CODE

Colorado State 4-H Dress Code

This dress code is to be followed by all Junior Division (4-H/FFA) members as well as adult leaders, advisors, and chaperones at all Colorado State 4-H sponsored events including but not limited to the Colorado State Fair, Youth Fest, Leadership Development Conference, Colorado Leadership Camp, and State Conference. Deviations from the dress code will result in a request to change. This dress code is not subject to personal interpretation. A state officer, adult leader, advisor, extension agent, fair board member, 4-H foundation member, superintendent or chaperone may deem clothing inappropriate. In addition, some activities or events will have specific dress requirements that will need to be followed. Appropriate dress consists of:

Clothes are clean and in good repair, free of holes, tears, or slashes.

Clothes are free from violent or drug-related material, or anything that alludes to violations of the 4-H Code of Conduct.

Cover-ups are worn with swimsuits when not participating in water activities or sunbathing. Swimsuits will provide adequate coverage—no string bikinis or extremely revealing suits will be tolerated.

Shorts must be mid-thigh length. No cut-off shorts allowed.

All items designated as underwear are kept under cover.

No halter-tops, tube tops, or tops that expose undergarments.

No pants or shorts that expose undergarments.

No spaghetti straps on shirts or dresses, with the exception of formal attire.

No see-through garments or muscle shirts.

Hats need to be removed for meetings, workshops, meals, and other times when asked to remove them.

Shoes must be worn at all times deemed appropriate.

NOTE: Jeans or slacks and closed toe shoes are required during a show or sale.

WEIGH-IN/TAGGING

- All market beef, market swine, market lambs and market goats must be individually ear tagged by the ownership dates above. All market animals will be tagged by designated weigh-in and tagging crew. Weigh and tag dates are scheduled for each species each year. Junior Division (4-H and FFA) members are required to weigh in and tag all market animals during the specified dates. Market beef projects will be ear tagged and tattooed.
- 2. The management reserves the right to remove any animal from the fair for reasons of animal health. See special rules for horses.
- 3. Junior Division Exhibitors may tag 3 market animals per species at initial weigh-in day. Junior Division (4-H/FFA) exhibitors will be allowed to enter only two animals per exhibitor per species beef, swine, goats and sheep in market classes. These two animals must be declared at time of final weigh-in at County Fair. The third animal will not be eligible to be shown by Junior Division exhibitor at this fair. In market classes, 2 placings in single classes and one placing in group classes will be allowed to one owner. Breeding animals shown in the Junior Division show may be used for showmanship classes. One showmanship class per specie (in each age division) will be offered.
- 4. All market animals must be tagged on weigh and tag days that have been scheduled, to participate in the supreme animal awards and rate-of-gain awards. If a market animal loses the ear tag prior to the County Fair, Junior Division (4-H/FFA) members must make arrangements with the Extension Office or FFA Advisor to replace the ear tag as soon as possible.
- 5. All market lambs eligible for the rate-of-gain contest must be slick-shorn *prior* to the arrival at the Moffat County Fairgrounds for fair weigh-in. Any lambs arriving at fair weigh-in not slick-shorn will not be eligible for the rate-of-gain contest.
- 6. Eligibility will be determined on the basis of show weight at the time of weigh in. Animals not making minimum or exceeding maximum weight will show in special feeder / heavy weight classes and will not be eligible to sell.

In order to be eligible for sale or show, market steers must weigh no less than 1000 pounds; market heifers must weigh no less than 950 pounds. There is no maximum weight for market beef.

- In order to be eligible for sale or show, market lambs must weigh no less than 100 pounds. There is no maximum weight for market lambs.
- In order to be eligible for sale or show, market swine must weigh a minimum of 230 pounds and may not exceed the maximum weight limit of 280 pounds at county fair. Any market swine animals which do not meet the minimum 230 pounds or exceed the maximum 280 pounds at county fair will not be eligible to compete for championship or sell

- in the Junior Livestock Sale. This is to protect the quality of meat for our buyers.
- In order to be eligible for sale or show, market goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds and may not exceed the maximum weight limit of 115 pounds at county fair. Any market goat animals which do not meet the minimum 50 pounds or exceed the maximum 115 pounds, at county fair, will not be eligible to compete for championship or sell in the Junior Livestock Sale.
- Initial weigh-in weight on Fair Board designated certified scales will be the official weight. ABSOLUTELY NO RE-WEIGHTS!
- 8. All market animals in the Junior Division show will be screened for quality, irregardless of weight, at the time of weigh-in. Those not deemed to be of acceptable quality will be shown in a special feeder class but cannot be sold in the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 9. Scrotums must be dried up with obviously no viable testicular tissue present on all market animals prior to arriving at the initial mandatory weigh-in or you will not be allowed to weigh-in, show, or sell your animal(s).
- 10. All market beef animals need to be haltered and led onto the scales at the initial weigh-in or they do not weigh.
- 11. No Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member is allowed to weigh-in or have their name on more than three (3) market animals per specie for County Fair.

LIVESTOCK SHOW RULES

- 1. Only an animal's owner (4-H/FFA member) should prepare their project animal when it is being exhibited at the Moffat County Fair or 4-H Show. If assistance, for safety or educational reasons, is needed by a member, assistance may be provided by the parent/guardian, another 4-H member, or another Moffat County 4-H Leader/FFA Advisor. It is recommended that another Moffat County 4-H/FFA/Vo-Ag member be the first choice for assistance to a junior division member. If assistance is provided, the junior division (4-H/FFA/Vo-Ag) member enrolled in the project must be present to benefit from the teaching and instruction. Violation will result in the violating exhibitor being prohibited from showing that animal. Only the exhibitor should be in the ring during exhibition.
- Parents of children showing livestock will be excluded from the show ring during showing or judging of livestock class, with the exception of superintendent duties.
- 3. NOTE: No coaching is allowed from the rail or outside the arena by parents and/or leaders when a member is competing in the arena.
- 4. NOTE: Under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator badger, insult or be argumentative with the judge, ring steward, superintendent or show management. Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to the judge or

ring steward by or on behalf of the exhibitor may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and forfeiture of awards. The person(s) responsible for such action will be asked to leave the grounds by the superintendent or his designee.

- 5. The management reserves the right to remove any animal from the fair for reasons of animal health. See special rules for horses.
- 6. The same animal or group of animals will not be shown in both breeding and market classes.
- 7. The junior division classes in each breed or sub-division should be judged just prior to the open classes in the same breed or sub-division.
- 8. Each Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member enrolled in livestock projects will be provided 4-H/FFA Humane Animal Care Guidelines. These guidelines will be practiced by every person enrolled in or participating in 4-H/FFA animal projects.
- 9. Please note that the dress code rule does apply while showing or selling your animal(s). Please refer to the dress code rule section for complete rule.
- 10. Alternate will <u>not</u> be allowed to show an animal unless the Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member is unable to due to extenuating circumstances. If this does occur, <u>prior approval by the Fair Board must be obtained.</u>
- Grand Champion and Reserve Champion (Junior Division) Market animals including chickens, turkeys and rabbits are required to sell at the 4-H/FFA Junior Livestock Sale.
- 12. The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the Moffat County Fair as follows:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses must be free of drug or chemical residues.
 - Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods. Withdrawal periods must be followed.
 - Drug label directions for use and withdraw periods must be followed.
 - d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses of animals sold through sales connected with the Moffat County Junior Livestock Sale, said show will in no way be liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animal. Exhibitor forfeits all rights to the sale price. Before administering antibiotics and/or sulfonamides, consult a licensed practicing veterinarian, or label directions of the drug.
- 13. Junior Division (4-H/FFA) members must show their own animals in showmanship. Tag #'s will be checked by the superintendents prior to entering the show ring for showmanship.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

- 1. All Junior Division (4-H/FFA) members showing or selling market animals or showing breeding animals must attend an official Meat Quality Assurance Training provided by either the Colorado State University Extension Office or FFA once as a Junior/ Intermediate (8-13 year olds), and once as a Senior (14 & over). All members must provide documentation verifying their attendance at an official training program to the Extension Office by June 1.
 - Any 4-H or FFA member failing to provide such documentation will not be allowed to show in the Junior Division, sell at the Junior Livestock Sale, or participate in the rate of gain contest at the Moffat County Fair. He/she may participate in open showmanship classes only.
- 2. Each year every Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member will complete and sign a Wholesome Meat Act, which is available at the Extension Office. The sign-off must be presented to the superintendents when you weigh-in at County Fair or turned in to the Extension Office prior to fair. The Wholesome Meat Act must be signed by the Junior Division (4-H or FFA) member's parent.
- 3. Market animals for sale must be declared by 3:00 p.m. the day before the sale. If a Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member does not declare an animal for sale by 3:00 p.m., the 4-H/FFA member will not be eligible to sell an animal in the Junior Livestock Sale. Youth may drop an animal from the Junior Livestock Sale but may not change which animal will be sold after the superintendents have completed the livestock sale bill.
- 4. A public auction will be held for market classes of Junior Division (4-H/FFA) Livestock, rabbits, chickens, and turkeys at the fairgrounds. Sale of market animals will not be compulsory.
- 5. The order of sale will be based on the order of placings in the various classes, except the Champion and Reserve Champion animals will be sold first.
- The owner's name and animal's weight will be announced when each market animal is sold. Donation for resale will not be allowed.
- 7. Eligibility will be determined on the basis of show weight at the time of weigh in.
 - ▶ In order to be eligible for sale or show, market steers must weigh no less than 1000 pounds; market heifers must weigh no less than 950 pounds. There is no maximum weight for market beef.
 - In order to be eligible for sale or show, market lambs must weigh no less than 100 pounds. There is no maximum weight for market lambs.
 - In order to be eligible for sale or show, market swine must weigh a minimum of 230 pounds and may not exceed the maximum weight limit of 280 pounds at county fair. Any market swine animals which do not meet the minimum 230 pounds or exceed the maximum 280 pounds at county fair will

- not be eligible to compete for championship or sell in the Junior Livestock Sale. This is to protect the quality of meat for our buyers.
- In order to be eligible for sale or show, market goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds and may not exceed the maximum weight limit of 115 pounds at county fair. Any market goat animals which do not meet the minimum 50 pounds or exceed the maximum 115 pounds at county fair will not be eligible to compete for championship or sell in the Junior Livestock Sale..
- Also, in order to be eligible for sale, all livestock must be of acceptable grade, health and quality, irregardless of weight, as determined by a screening committee prior to the sale. Only animals first shown in the regular market classes are eligible for sale. All livestock must show proper prior identification with ear tag or tattoo.
- 8. Fair management reserves the right to test any animal.
- 9. Sale Deductions 1.) A 5% commission will be charged to all Junior Division consignors. This charge will be used to defray selling costs, security costs, insurance fees and costs for caring for the animals after 4:00 PM on the last day of the fair. 2.) Beef, lamb and pork check-offs will be collected as per law. 3.) Beef project members who enrolled in the beef insurance will have the insurance premiums deducted from their sale checks. 4.) A carcass contest fee will be deducted from the livestock sale check.
- The sale will be sponsored and managed by the Moffat County 4-H Foundation in cooperation with 4-H and FFA Groups.
- 11. No Junior Division (4-H/FFA) exhibitor will be allowed to offer more than one lot for sale, this includes poultry and rabbit pens. The exception to this rule will be if a 4-H or FFA member owns the champion or reserve champion market animal in more than one species or the same species. If this should occur, they will be required to sell each of their champion or reserve champion market animals. For Example, if a junior division exhibitor has both the champion and reserve champion in one or more species, they would have to sell those champion and reserve champion animals but no other animals. All grand and reserve champion market animals will be required to be sold at the Moffat County Junior Livestock Sale.

The following species will be available for sale:

- * Market Beef, Market Sheep, Market Swine, Market Goat, Market Chicken Pen(s), Market Turkey Pen(s) and Market Rabbit Pen(s)
- 12 Junior division livestock will be under control of the Moffat County 4-H Foundation after sale.
- 13. Due to transfer of ownership of all livestock upon completion of bidding at the Junior Livestock Sale, not all animals are guaranteed to be in the carcass contest.

- 14. Advertising for sale or sale of market animals, including beef, sheep, swine, rabbits, poultry, ducks and goats, not eligible for the Junior Livestock Sale, will not be permitted on the fairgrounds.
- 15. Sale consignors are responsible for feeding and watering their animals until the animals are taken to the packing house.
- 16. No market animals declared for the Junior Livestock Sale may be taken from the fairgrounds prior to the Junior Livestock Sale. Sale animals may not be taken from the fairgrounds after the sale, unless written authorization from the buyer is received by the Superintendents. Sale animals will remain at the fairgrounds until animals are taken to the packing house unless **prior** written authorization is received from the buyer.
- 17. Junior Division (4-H/FFA) member sale checks will be available at the Moffat County Extension Office approximately 2-3 weeks after the sale or after the buyer has paid. Checks will be released to 4-H/FFA members upon acknowledgement of receipt of their thank you from the buyer(s).
- 18. There shall be no artificial coloring (i.e., paint) on the animals during the sale.
- 19. 4-H/FFA members must sell their own animals. If extenuating circumstances exist, then an alternate may sell an animal if approved by the 4-H Foundation Board prior to the sale.

CARCASS CONTEST

(Livestock members only):

- 1. In order to be eligible for the carcass contest, no market lambs, market goats or market swine will be slaughtered before Sunday after the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 2. In order to be eligible for the carcass contest, no market beef will be slaughtered before Monday after the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 3. Only animals (all species) that are shown in a market class at county fair are eligible for the carcass contest. Any animals shown in feeder or heavy-weight classes will not be eligible for carcass contest. Only animals that are sold at the Junior Livestock Sale or are on the extra animal declaration sheet are eligible for the carcass contest. Animals that are loaded out by undesignated persons will not be eligible for carcass contest.
- 4. All species will be killed on the designated days (i.e., swine, goats and sheep on Sunday or Monday, market beef no earlier than Monday) to allow for equal/quality cooling time.

SHOWMANSHIP

There are no universally accepted standards for judging a showmanship class, and the winner is the one who, in the judge's estimation, does the best job of showing their dog. In showmanship, as opposed to obedience classes, the heaviest emphasis is placed on the handler's performance and presentation of dog. In 4-H Showmanship, conformation of the dog is specifically not to be considered.

Appearance of Handler

Cleanliness and neatness of handler—Appropriateness of apparel

Grooming of Dog

Brushing (mat, dead hair) trimmed toes and nails, clean teeth, groomed according to most apparent breed type.

Exhibitor's Handling of Dog

Front Set-up: judges side first, head high (no choking), feet placed directly beneath the shoulders—toes pointing straight forward, legs should fall vertical from shoulder and parallel (within limit of the most apparent breed),

Rear set-up: Legs slightly wider apart than front-adjust the leg that is most out of line first.

Gaiting: Ability to follow direction in judge's pattern. Dog always fully visible to judge. In gaiting position, smoothness in turns, gait proper to most apparent breed (when applicable). Ability to exhibit dog's movements according to most apparent breed.

Examination: Stand properly during entire examination, does not sit or move away before or during examination. Does not growl or snap. Any dog attempting to bite a handler or anyone else in the ring, will be dismissed from the ring. Dog is happy and attentive to handler.

SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

Novice classes are for those members who have no outside showmanship experience as determined by the county. If prior experience is determined by the county, the exhibitor must move into open class in their appropriate age group.

NOVICE SHOWMANSHIP

These classes are for those members who are in their first year of 4-H dog project and have no prior outside showmanship experience.

Below is a list of the additional 4-H and/or FFA awards available. For complete information concerning the rules and criteria for each award, please contact the Extension Office.

HERDSMAN AWARD:

- All 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters will be eligible to compete for an award sponsored by the Moffat County 4-H Foundation. This will be to the club or chapter that best demonstrated their ability in the art of herdsmanship. Factors to be considered in judging are:
- Attractiveness of club or chapter display. Signs identifying club or chapter and individual animals and their exhibitors are encouraged.
- Personal appearance and attitude of club or chapter members.
- Participation in showmanship contest and all its aspects.
- Cooperation with superintendents including sportsmanship.
- Proper care of animals including disposal of waste materials and manure.
- Neatness and cleanliness of feed and water utensils and prompt removal of same when not in use.

Club awards will be given, after fair, in the following species: beef, sheep/goats, hogs, small animals.

The traveling trophy will be presented to the overall top club/chapter chosen for Herdsmanship.

SUPREME BEEF, SHEEP, GOAT AND SWINE AWARDS:

All 4-H and FFA exhibitors with market beef, sheep, goat and swine entered for placing in the show ring, rate of gain and carcass contest are automatically entered in competition for the Moffat County Supreme Awards. Only animals earmarked on weigh-in are eligible for supreme awards, unless prior arrangements were made through the Extension Office.

HOMEGROWN STEER AWARD:

- 1. Steer must be from 4-H member or FFA member's own herd. Cannot be considered if steer is from family member's herd.
- 2. 4-H/FFA members must identify animal at time of weigh-in in February.
- 3. Points are awarded for the following areas: Class Placing; Rate of Gain; Carcass Contest Placing; Record Book Score.
- 4. 4-H / FFA member with highest number of points will be given the Homegrown Steer Award at Achievement Night.

THE PRODUCERS CHOICE AWARDS:

The producers in Moffat County and the Routt Moffat Woolgrowers and the Colorado Woolgrowers would like to offer various awards at this year's fair. The awards will be based on show placing, carcass, rate-of-gain, oral interview, and record book scores. This award is open to all 4-H and FFA market lamb members. To be eligible for these awards you will need to do the following:

- 1. Sign up for this award at beginning weigh-in.
- 2. Have signs on your fair pens saying you are participating in this awards program.
- 3. You will need to follow the following criteria:
 - a. Lambs will have fresh clean water at all times.
 - b. Pens will be clean and well kept.
 - c. Free choice feed or sufficient feed so they don't eat bedding.
 - d. Mandatory rate-of-gain of at least .40 lbs. per day.
 - e. If a member chooses to be eligible for this award, they must do so with <u>all</u> lambs in their market lamb project.
 - f. Agree to an oral interview: questions taken from members project manuals.
 - g. Will practice good sportsmanship at all times.
 - h. There will be no unethical treatment of lambs at anytime while on fairgrounds.
 - i. There will be no holding lambs front feet off the ground in the show ring
 - j. There will be no muzzles allowed
 - k. There will be only slight bracing of the lamb, only when the judge is handling your lamb
 - 1. All lambs will be completely slick shorn prior to arriving at the fair.

Awards will be in the form of trophies, ribbons, and savings bonds. Our goals are to teach members to produce what the consumer wants and to raise a good quality market lamb.

OUTSTANDING ANGUS EXHIBITOR:

The Outstanding Angus Exhibitor award is presented each year to a 4-H/FFA member. The Outstanding Angus Exhibitor award is based upon the following criteria:

- 1. The animals must be predominantly Angus.
- 2. Angus breeding herd points are given for each class placing in the Angus Breed Division as follows:
 - a. Showmanship points
 - b. Market Beef points points are awarded for exhibiting a Angus market beef
